This document and attached implementing resolution represents our joint recommendations for restructuring the Milwaukee County Arts Program. The task of restructuring the county's approach to the Arts took considerable time and effort and involved input from several sources, to include individual County Board members, a consortium for the Performing Arts, representatives of the performing and visual arts community and our own personal observations and experience.

Frankly, when we introduced our separate resolutions (File No. 86-466 and File No. 86-463) at the June, 1986 County Board meeting, we had both hoped to have the question of restructuring addressed prior to the Board's summer recess. Regardless of the delays, the recommendations contained in the attached revised resolution provide a solid foundation from which the county in future years can build a viable county sponsored arts program that will encourage artistic diversity and excellence, yet remain flexible to provide support and encouragement for small groups, local performers and new and innovative entertainment, as well as to provide for efficient administration, sensitive to the needs of the County Board and meet the concerns of the Arts.

Since submitting our original separate proposals, we have had the opportunity to discuss our differences and jointly evaluate alternative proposals and options. Where possible, we have incorporated many of the suggestions submitted to us from the cultural community, however, not all alternatives and options could be incorporated into our final recommendations without seriously jeopardizing the County's Arts Program.

In summary, the recommendations contained in the attached resolution provide for the following:

 The County Board shall function as the policy setting body for Milwaukee County's cultural and artistic programming fund. Lastly, we jointly agree that the \$3,000 allocation in 1986 for the Musicians Union to provide performances at the Child and Adolescent Treatment Center and at the Mental Health Center and other county facilities should be part of the Department of Health and Human Services 1987 budget. This program component originally proposed by Supervisor Dean is one that is not really open to the public and the performances are really part of a treatment program. We will together sponsor an amendment to the Department of Health and Human Services 1987 budget to include an appropriation to accomplish this purpose.

It is envisioned that this category would allow yearly opportunities to emphasize new priorities by County Board members and changing needs of the community.

Under this program allocation, Milwaukee County would on an annual basis determine the number and type of performances it desires to purchase through the solicitation of "Request for Proposals" based on approved eligibility criteria and guidelines.

B. Endowments and Grants Component

Under this program, Milwaukee County recognizes that many fine professional performing arts organization exist in the community and contribute to the quality of life in this community. With the objective of promoting new and existing arts organizations, these grants are designed to help art groups to meet their operational and programming expenses.

This program includes three types of grants:

(1) Performing Arts Matching Grants. This grant program is designed to provide, with no quid pro quo requirements, a direct subsidy to professional performing arts organizations that meet established criteria. Application

All applications for the **Purchase of Service** program shall be complete when submitted to The <u>Milwaukee Foundation</u>. They must be properly signed, with <u>fifteen sufficient</u> copies submitted by deadline date with all required documentation as indicated on the application form. Additional information or documentation may be requested by Milwaukee County.

The funding process is competitive and many deserving proposals may not be funded for the total amount requested. Previous financial support from Milwaukee County would not necessarily guarantee continued funding.

In reviewing applications, Milwaukee Gounty The Milwaukee Foundation and CAMPAC evaluates individual proposals based upon service and access to the public, community interest and support for the project, compatibility of proposal and related County Board objectives, and availability of comparable services in the community. The County Board, through the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture and GAMPAC also will review each project application recommended by CAMPAC with regard to the feasibility and quality of the proposal, the "track record" of the applicant organization's ability to provide the proposed service, and a careful analysis of project and organizational budgets.

MILWAUKEE COUNTY ARTS FUNDING

General Overview

The Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors on October 2, 1986, established the Milwaukee County Cultural, Artistic and Musical Programming Advisory Council (CAMPAC), as an advisory council to the Chairman of the County Board, the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture and the full Board. The primary purpose of the council is to advise the Board on how best to allocate budgeted county funds to community arts groups through purchase of services, endowments and grants for the provision of cultural arts programs that best serve and enhance the quality of life in the community.

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MILWAUKEE COUNTY ARTS FUNDING

General Overview

The Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors on July 17, 1986, established the Milwaukee County Cultural, Artistic and Musical Programming Advisory Council (CAMPAC), as an advisory council to the Chairman of the County Board, the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture and the full Board. The primary purpose of the council is to advise the Board on how best to allocate budgeted county funds to community arts groups through purchase of services, endowments and grants for the provision of cultural arts programs that best serve and enhance the quality of life in the community.

CAMPAC consists of seven members with an interest in the arts appointed by the County Board chairperson and confirmed by the full Board. No paid staff members or board members or any arts agencies receiving funding from Milwaukee County may serve on the council.

The County Board of Supervisors has delegated to a single authority, the Chairperson of the Board, responsibility for administering all cultural funds. Programs and Services A. Milwaukee County shall award Purchase of Service contracts for the presentation of events which conform to the following guidelines: 1. Events are designed expected to reach audiences of 500 or more per performance; exhibition or events commensurate with funding levels, and in proportion to norms for individual art forms. 2. Events are designed to reach a broad range of the county's residents, including those residents whose economic resources are severely restricted or limited. 3. Events should take place in county owned facilities on county owned land, or in other locations designed for use by a broad public. Priority will be given to those groups which use County facilities for some or all of their performances. B. "Music Under the Stars" awards are made on a noncompetitive basis for traditional Milwaukee County programming. Funding for the Artistic Consultant for Milwaukee County to Music Under the Stars is included in the appropriation. Criteria for Awarding Contracts Milwaukee County reserves the right to approve/disapprove awarding contracts to organizations making application for provision of cultural programming based upon the criteria listed below. 1. Quality of the event proposed. Evidence of quality shall include: - critical response to the applicant's recent work - evaluation of previous county sponsored events, if any - freshness of the event proposed to the target audience - educational or entertainment value of the event 2. Geographic distribution of the events underwritten. The County Board will consider the need to offer events in a variety of neighborhoods and locations. 3. Balance of artistic genres. The County Board will consider the need to underwrite a variety of artistic genres, styles, and flavors in selecting events to be underwritten. Care will be taken to consider the cultural diversity of the audiences served. - 3 -

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Application

All applications for the **Purchase of Service** program shall be complete when submitted. They must be properly signed, with fifteen copies submitted by deadline date with all required documentation as indicated on the application form. Additional information or documentation may be requested by Milwaukee County.

The funding process is competitive and many deserving proposals may not be funded for the total amount requested. Previous financial support from Milwaukee County would not necessarily guarantee continued funding.

In reviewing applications, Milwaukee County evaluates individual proposals based upon service and access to the public, community interest and support for the project, compatibility of proposal and related County Board objectives, and availability of comparable services in the community. The County Board, through the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture and CAMPAC also will review each project application with regard to the feasibility and quality of the proposal, the "track record" of the applicant organization's ability to provide the proposed service, and a careful analysis of project and organizational budgets.

Milwaukee County encourages the development of proposals which demonstrate a willingness to cooperate with other agencies through collaborative programs or services and those showing additional sources of financial support for the proposal.

Selection will be based on programs that make a contribution to the range of cultural experience available in the County by artistic discipline, seasonal schedule, target audiences, geographic area and overall impact.

Contracts

When Milwaukee County awards funding under the Purchase of Service program and "Music Under the Stars", it is contracting through its administrative agent with an organization to provide services to citizens of the County. The funds must be used as specified in the approved proposal. No changes may be made to the project without notifying the County Board through its administrative agent to request approval of changes in the contract. A revised project budget must be submitted if the applicant organization revises the scope of the program based on a reduction in funding from that originally requested.

The contract must be signed by both the County's designated administrative agent Board Ghairman, and by the individual authorized to sign by the organization under contract.

All applications made under the **Performing Arts Matching Grant** program shall be complete when submitted. They must be properly signed, and fifteen copies submitted by the deadline date with all required documentation as indicated on the application form. Absolutely no late applications will be accepted.

The County Board, through CAMPAC and the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture, will review each application.

Contracts

There will be no formal contract between Milwaukee County and the Matching Grant recipients. However, an "Acknowledgement of Receipt of Funding" form must be signed by both the Managing Director and Board Chairperson of the funded organization. This further requires the organization to submit its year end report containing financial statements and a list of performances, performance sites and estimated audiences. Payments will be made within three weeks of County Board approval of Matching Grant awards.

We applaud the interest of members of the County Board to restructure the County's arts programs into a more focused and effective entity. SUBJECT: Stars Productions' Press Release

Pursuant to your inquiry as to perceived errors in the Stars Productions' Press Release of August 26, 1986, it appears that there are some discernable factual differences. The basic problems center on attendance figures, administration and allocations and unit and per capita costs.

Clearly, all such attendance figures are less than exact, given the open nature of the venues, but there are significant differences between the Stars' estimates of 51,600 for its "six Music Under the Stars programs" and the 32,600 calculation by the Parks Department. If the Parks' figure is more accurate, the audience would actually be 63% of Stars' estimate, and the per capita cost becomes \$5.47 per audience member.

Using Stars Productions' figures for these same six major events, from their 1986 application forms, the average per event appears to be \$17,815 and not the "4,100 each" as presented by Stars. This is also substantially higher than the amount cited for other county funded series. Staff salaries, according to the Stars' application, exceed 18% of the total agency budget, and are additionally limited to 17.5% by a letter of April 10, 1986 from Stars' Treasurer. There may be some misunderstanding of the parameters of "administrative" services, but the difference between "only 5.7% of the county allocation" and 17.5% is sizeable. It also affects the claim that talent and production costs "constitute 95%" of the allocation. Operative figure.

It still does appear that Stars has provided a service to a significant audience at a reasonable price, and it is unfortunate that this press release should obscure otherwise useful services. Attached are the press release and the Stars contract materials for your further analysis.

SUBJECT: Advisory Legal Memorandum:

Registration of "Music Under the Stars" as a Trademark

You have requested that this office investigate as to whether "Music Under the Stars" has been registered or designated as a trademark by "Stars Production, Inc.," or by anyone else. It is my understanding of the law in this specialized field that a copyright cannot be obtained for titles, names, short phrases or even slogans. Moreover, in determining whether a federal trademark designation has been made here, this office was advised by the Office of U.S. Commissioner of Patents and Trademarks that they would not conduct a search in response to a telephone or mail request. However, they will perform a search if a registration number is provided. Since we have only a name, it would be necessary that we send someone to Washington, D.C., and undertake a search of their records ourselves or that we hire someone in Washington, D.C. to conduct a search on our behalf. Since this office does not have financial resources to undertake this matter, I would suggest that the Division of Intergovernmental Relations be consulted. They periodically send someone to Washington, D.C. to conduct business and they might be able to assume this assignment although, naturally, I cannot speak for them here.

However, this office was able to verify by telephone that "Music Under the Stars" has been registered as a form of advertising trademark by Stars Production, Inc., with the Wisconsin Secretary of State in Madison, Wisconsin. Registration of trademarks at the state level is governed by Chapter 132, Wisconsin Statutes. This Chapter has been revised considerably by 1985 Wisconsin Act 181 (effective April 18, 1986) a copy of which I have enclosed. Section 2 of this Act amended sec. 132.01, Stats. (title) and I have now condensed it as follows for purposes of brevity: Sec. 132.01, Stats., provides that "[a]ny ... corporation ... which has heretofore adopted or used or shall hereafter adopt or use any mark for the purpose of designating, making known, or distinguishing any goods, ware, merchandise, service, business or other product of labor or manufacture as having been produced, prepared ... by such ... corporation" can, by filing certain documents with and paying a fee to the Secretary of State, register that mark. (Emphasis added.) Sec. 132.001(2), Stats. (as created by Section 1 of Act 181) defines "mark" to include a "designation or form of advertisement that is adopted or

used by any person to designate, make known or distinguish any goods or service as having been made, prepared or provided by that person and is registered by that person under sec. 132.01." Therefore, it appears that the designation "Music Under the Stars" for public evening musical performances such as those traditionally held at Washington Park (and formerly Humboldt Park) qualifies as a "mark" within the meaning of those recently enacted statutes and that Stars Productions, Inc., has in fact registered it as such.

The effect of that registration, as I interpret it and as one might expect, is that no one else may use the designation or form of advertisement "Music Under the Stars" for the types of productions traditionally associated with that name without the consent of "Stars Productions, Inc." That prohibition may be enforced either criminally or civilly.

Sec. 132.02(3), Stats. (as amended by Section 3 of Act 181) and as condensed provides that "It shall be unlawful for any other person to make use with intent to deceive, of that mark or any counterfeit mark ..., or to utter or display the same orally, or in any printed or written form in the conduct of his or her business or any business transaction without the express consent, license, and authority of the ... corporation ... so owning the same ..." (Emphasis added.) You will further note that the element of "intent to deceive" was added only recently by 1985 Wisconsin Act 181, effective April 18, 1986. It perhaps was inserted into the statute rather clumsily. A strict grammatical reading is that "intent to deceive" is a necessary element of the offense only for "use" of the mark, but not for "uttering" or "displaying in any printed or written form." That reading might make better sense, and my impression is that the legislature may have intended the statute to apply to the more standard trademark-infringement-for-profit situation (e.g. fake designer jeans and Rolex watches).

The penalty for knowing and willful violation of sec. 132.02, Stats., is punishable by imprisonment for not more than six months or by a fine of not more than \$10,000. Sec. 132.03, Stats. (Section 4 of Act 181)

There is, in any event, a criminal prohibition against unauthorized use of a mark which does not include among its elements any "intent to deceive." Sec. 132.19, Stats. (Section 10 of Act 181) entitled "Use of mark without authority," provides:

"Every person who knowingly and willfully uses or displays the genuine mark of any person, association or union in any manner, or in or about the sale of goods or merchandise not being authorized so to do by such person, union or association shall be imprisoned for not more than 3 months or fined not more than \$100. ... "

Sec. 132.033, Stats. (Section 7 of Act 181) further provides a procedure for civil enforcement of the "mark" right by an action for injunction. It should be noted that a finding of a violation of a trademark (part of definition of "mark") entitles plaintiff to recover actual damages and in addition cost, including reasonable investigation and attorneys' fees (Section 8 of Act 181).

The procedure for challenging a registrant's right to a particular mark is set forth in sec. 132.01(8), Stats., 1983. That section as condensed provides that "(a) any person ... who claims a right to use of subject matter conflicting with any registration by another, may bring action against such other in the circuit court for the county in which such other resides, or in the circuit court for Dane County, and in any such action the right to the use and registration of such subject matter shall be determined as between the parties, and registration shall be granted or withheld or canceled by the secretary of state in accordance with the final judgment in any such action ..."

The issue of what exactly would be the substantive law in such a controversy and how the court would go about determining who has the right to the use of the designation or mark in question appears to be a rather complicated matter. To pursue the matter further would require extensive research including case reporting nationally.

If I can be of further assistance kindly advise.

AN ACT to renumber and amend 132.03 (1); to amend 132.01 (title), (1), (5) and (6), 132.02 (1) and (3), 132.031, 132.032, 132.033, 132.07 and 132.19; to repeal and recreate 132.20; and to create 132.001, 132.033 (2) (c) and (d), (4) and (5) and 132.25 of the statutes, relating to trademarks and providing penalties.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. 132.001 of the statutes is created to read:

132.001 Definitions. In this chapter, unless the context indicates otherwise:

(1) "Counterfeit mark" means a spurious mark that is identical to or substantially identical to a genuine mark and that is used or intended to be used on or in connection with goods or services for which the genuine mark is registered and in use. "Counterfeit mark" does not mean any mark or designation used in connection with goods or services if, at the time the goods or services were manufactured or produced, the holder of the right to use the mark authorized the manufacturer or producer to use the mark or designation for the type of goods or services manufactured or produced.

(2) "Mark" means a label, trademark, trade name, term, design, pattern, model, device, shopmark, drawing, specification, designation or form of advertisement that is adopted or used by any person to designate, make known or distinguish any goods or service as having been made, prepared or provided by that person and that is registered by that person under s. 132.01.

SECTION 2. 132.01 (title), (1), (5) and (6) of the statutes are amended to read:

132.01 (title) Marks. (1) Any person, firm, copartnership, corporation, association or union of workingmen, which has heretofore adopted or used or shall hereafter adopt or use any label, trademark, tradename, term, design, pattern, model, device, shopmark, drawing, specification, designation or form of advertisement, mark for the purpose of designating, making known, or distinguishing any goods, wares, merchan-

dise, service, business or other product of labor or manufacture as having been made, manufactured. produced, prepared, packed, or put on sale by such person, firm, copartnership, corporation, association, or union of workingmen, or by a member or members thereof, he or they, if residents of this or any other state of the United States, and such foreign corporations as may have been duly licensed to transact business in the state of Wisconsin, may file an original, a copy, or photographs, or cuts with specifications of the same for record in the office of the secretary of state, by leaving 2 such originals, copies, photographs, or cuts with specifications, the same being counterparts, facsimiles, or drawings thereof, with said secretary and by filing therewith a sworn statement, in such form as may be prescribed by the secretary of state, specifying the name of the person, firm, copartnership, corporation, association or union of workingmen, on whose behalf such label, trademark, term, trade name, pattern, model, design, device, shopmark, drawing, specification, designation or form of advertisement mark is to be filed, the class of merchandise and a separate description of the goods to which the same has been or is intended to be appropriated, the residence, location, or place of business of such party, that the party, on whose behalf such label, trademark, trade name, term, design, pattern, model, device, shopmark, drawing, specification, designation or form of advertisement mark is to be filed, has the right to the use of the same, and that no other person, or persons, firm, copartnership, corporation, association or union of workingmen has such right either in the identical form or in any such near resemblance thereto as may be calculated to deceive, and that the originals, copies, photographs, or cuts, counterparts, facsimiles or drawings filed therewith are correct.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. 132.001 of the statutes is created to read:

Section 991.11, WISCONAIN STATUTES 1983-84: Effective date of acts. "Every act and every portion of an act enacted by the legislature over the governor's partial veto which does not expressly prescribe the time when it takes effect shall take effect on the day after its date of publication as designated" by the secretary of state [the date of publication may not be more than 10 working days after the date of enactment].

(5) The secretary of state shall may not register any label, trademark, term, design, device or form of advertisement mark which consists of or comprises a replica or simulation of the flag, coat of arms, or insignia of the United States of America, or of any state or municipality or any foreign nation.

(3) And it It shall be unlawful for any other person to make use, with intent to deceive, of such label, trademark, trade name, term, design, pattern, model, device, shopmark, drawing, specification, designation, or form of advertisement so filed, that mark or any such likeness or imitation thereof counterfeit mark which is identical to or substantially identical to that mark, or to utter or display the same orally, or in any printed or written form in the conduct of his or her business or any business transaction without the express consent, license, and authority of the person, firm, copartnership, corporation, association, or union so owning the same, and such unauthorized and unlawful use may be prohibited and prevented by injunction or other proper proceeding in a court of competent jurisdiction without recourse to the penal statute providing a punishment for suca unlawful use. In case such association or union of workingmen is not incorporated such actions may be commenced and prosecuted by an officer or member of such association or union on behalf of and for the use of such association or union. This subsection does not apply to the purchase of merchandise in good faith from a distributor or the retail sale of that merchandise in good faith.

SECTION 4. 132.03 (1) of the statutes is renumbered 132.03 and amended to read:

132.03 Penalty. Every person who shall knowingly and wilfully violate so violates s. 132.01 or 132.02, except only those provisions relative to emergency repairs, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by imprisonment imprisoned for not more than six 6 months or by a fine of fined not more than two hundred dollars \$10,000 or both.

(f) Before the person, association or union registered a mark under s. 132.01 the defendant acquired the right under common law or federal law to manufacture, use, display or sell an identical mark.

MUSIC UNDER THE STARS 1986 REPORT

Despite rain-outs and threatening weather, more than 50,000 people attended the six Music Under the Stars programs this summer, according to figures released today by John Anello Jr., producer of Stars Productions, Inc.

The attendance figure jumps to over 63,000 when counting other programs presented so far this year by Stars Productions.

Music Under the Stars and related programs are free and funded in part by Milwaukee County. Stars Productions has a contract to present 36 programs, relieving the county of production duties.

The Music Under the Stars series draws by far the largest audiences of any programs sponsored by Milwaukee County. Audiences typically are 7,000 to 10,000 or more per performance, and would fill Uihlein Hall in the Performing Arts Center (capacity 2,331) three to four times. The Arena is the only other facility that could support an audience of this size in one seating.

"The hallmark of the Stars concept is the fact that this cultural experience is available to everyone--not merely those who can afford the price of a ticket," noted Anello.

"It's the best entertainment bargain offered by Milwaukee County," he added. "Our events cost the taxpayers an average of only \$4,100 each."

Records indicate that other county-funded musical series average out to cost as much as \$15,500 per event.

"When looking at Music Under the Stars alone, the per capita production cost is about \$3.15 per audience member," Anello reported. "Our archives show that this is about the same per capita cost that Music Under the Stars had in 1938--its first year at the Emil Blatz Temple of Music in Washington Park."

Music Under the Stars will celebrate its 50th birthday next year. It was born during the Depression as a WPA (Works Progress Administration) activity to help support unemployed musicians. Music Under the Stars entertained lovers of the fine arts long before the formation of the Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra, the Milwaukee Ballet Company and the Florentine Opera.

Music Under the Stars is produced on something of a shoestring. Thanks to austere management and skillful negotiation with out-of-town artists, Anello has kept production costs to an increase of only 1.7% over the last five years, without sacrificing the professional quality of performances.

Staff salaries constitute only 5.7% of the county allocation, which amounted to \$178,000 this year. Other income is derived from private donations and from the Music Performance Trust Fund, the charitable arm of the U.S. recording industry.

"Rising costs are making our work more difficult every year," Anello said.

Costs include fees and travel expenses for a handful of nationally acclaimed artists, performance payments to area union musicians and singers who constitute 95% of the talent, wages to union stage hands and county park attendants, costumes and scenery for the musical, and mechanical costs such as lights, sound and rehearsal hall rental.

Here is a brief report on attendance at the Stars programs this year. Figures are estimated based on seating capacities.

July $5--\underline{7,000}$ for the Steve Swedish and Nancy Miller program which opened the season at Washington Park.

July 6--490 for the Sunday night repeat performance in the rain at Humboldt Park. The orchestra squeezed together under the bandshell roof, Miss Miller sang in the rain, and audience members huddled under umbrellas. Normally this Humboldt Park concert draws about 3,000.

July 11 and 12--rained out. July 13--8,900 for the rain date performance of the musical, "The Student Prince." Rain dates usually draw from 35% to 45% of the regular attendance.

July $19-\frac{8,000}{1}$ for the John Gary concert despite rain until 6:30 p.m. and tornado watches effective until 10:30 p.m.

July 26--8,700 for Olivera and del Moral, the Spanish dancers.

Aug. 2-7,000 for the "Songs of Love" concert despite a forecast of rain and scattered showers throughout the county during the day.

Aug. 9-10,000 for the Lerner and Loewe concert.

Full houses were experienced at all six Milwaukee County High School Theater Festival showcase performances in late May. The three at the Todd Wehr Theater packed in over 1,500; and the three at the Pabst Theater brought in nearly 4,200.

Standing room only was the scene at the two "Sopramare Serenede" chamber concerts at Villa Terrace. The small room is set up for 125, but attendance was 155 and 227 for the June 22 and July 27 performances.

The six Cudworth American Legion Band Concerts at Humboldt Park on Tuesday nights in June and July drew just under 3,000, even though rain plagued a number of the concerts.

Two Polka Concerts at Humboldt Park in drew $\underline{900}$. Again, rain dampened one of the programs. A third concert is slated for Thursday, Aug. 28.

The Hi, Neighbor! Concert in Kosciuszko Park in July drew about $\underline{1,000}$. The Barbershop Quartets Concert at Washington Park in August attracted over $\underline{2,000}$.

The season is not quite over. Still to come are the popular Pillow Pops Concerts in the Bradley Pavilion of the Performing Arts Center on Oct. 20, Nov. 3 and Nov. 24, as well as the five moontime holiday concerts in the Courthouse rotunda just before Christmas.

Discussions with several board members have convinced me that both Supervisor Ament's and my proposal are compatible. The following are some refinements that I think you should consider as part of my proposal.

- 1. The Music Under the Stars program has really been a part of Milwaukee County's Parks marketing, whether we called it that or not. It would seem logical then that the Music Under the Stars program should not be subject to the same sort of application process as other arts organizations and programs. Therefore, I propose that the funds for Music Under the Stars be included in the Parks budget rather than in the Arts budget. That way it will be possible for Parks staff to better coordinate the musical productions that are scheduled for the Zoo and for the PAC with Music Under the Stars productions. This should be done in order to minimize conflict and make the best possible use of tax dollars. The Parks director should be required then to present his plans for Music Under the Stars during the annual county budget process.
- 2. Likewise, the \$3,000 amount for the Musicians Union to provide performances in Wauwatosa at the Child and Adolescent Treatment Center and at the Mental Health Center and other county facilities should be part of the Department of Health and Human Services budget. The rationale, of course, is that this program is one that is not really open to the public and the performances are really part of the treatment program in those facilities. The Musicians Union is doing us a favor by matching the funds that the county provides in order to provide the maximum number of performances. We should make the process as simple as possible for the Union and that would mean that this \$3,000 should be included in the Department of Health and Human Services budget not in the Arts budget.
- 3. The administrative consolidation which is detailed in Supervisor Ament's proposal can easily be accomplished then by contracting with a foundation like the Milwaukee Foundation or the Milwaukee Artists Foundation to provide the administrative services. The advantages are several. By contracting with a foundation that has a proven track record and interest in funding the arts in Milwaukee, we get a greater depth and breadth of staff experience than we could possibly get with a single staff person working for the County Board. We also gain the advantage of a greater potential for using public dollars, in this case county dollars, to leverage additional private dollars. In reviewing the activities of the major Milwaukee foundations, particularly by looking at their annual reports, it is very clear that the Milwaukee

1.0 Policy Issue

Development and implementation of a plan to create a public-private partnership to provide financial support to the county's arts organizations. The plan calls for "government support, in the form of tax levy, to be used as leverage to encourage and increase private sector contributions, through a public-private sector donor-match fund known as the Milwaukee County Arts Trust Fund. Administration of the Milwaukee County Arts Trust Fund (MCATF) would be provided through an agreement between the county and a private foundation.

2.0 Background and Rationale

Milwaukee County has traditionally provided substantial tax levy support for the performing and visual arts. The 1986 adopted County budget provided for a total appropriation of \$4,800,291. Included in this appropriation was an amount totalling \$1,239,285 which was divided into two separate and distinct funding allocations, comprised of \$567,500 for cultural contributions awarded on a contractual basis to various local community arts groups; and \$671,785 for the Performing Arts Matching Grant Program for which funds were awarded on a direct grant or subsidy basis. Additionally, Milwaukee County in 1986 appropriated an amount of \$3,561,006 to fund the operations of the following county cultural and artistic facilities:

2.1 County's 1986 Approach to Cultural Programming

As previously stated, Milwaukee County's approach to cultural programming during 1986 is divided into two separate appropriations, consisting of Org. Unit 1935 -

Since being established in 1982, the awarding of funds under the Cultural Contributions appropriation has not been clearly defined for lack of written eligibility criteria and application guidelines. Contract awards currently are made after submission of a proposal by an applicant agency to a review group (Cultural Council) appointed by the Chairman of the Parks Committee. Final allocation awards are approved by the County Board upon recommendation of the Parks, Recreation and Culture Committee.

Newly established in the 1986 Budget, the Performing Arts Matching Grant Program is to provide matching grants to professional performing arts organizations in Milwaukee County. The 1986 appropriation was divided into two funding components: (1) Performing Arts Matching Grant Program in the amount of \$250,000 for Non-UPAF groups; and (2) a Hall Rental Subsidy in the amount of \$421,785 for seven UPAF groups currently using the PAC.

The Performing Arts Matching Grant Program was established by several members of the County Board who wanted to demonstrate to community arts organizations that public funds could be awarded in a fair and equitable manner, based on written criteria and guidelines that include provisions designed to encourage diversity, excellence and exploration in the performing and visual arts. The program is by design "artistically blind and politically neutral." It is assumed that an organization capable of generating a stream of revenue from existing sources is worthy of public support. Grants were made on a matching basis and were intended to support the organization's general operations, not specific programs.

2.2 Future Role of County Arts Fund

In November, 1985, the Greater Milwaukee Committee UPAF Task Force issued a report examining the long range financial needs of arts funding in our community. The report concluded that "government funding for the performing arts must be encouraged at all levels. The performing arts play an essential economic development role that justifies a public sector role." The Task Force report noted that recent studies on the economic impact of government support have indicated that "for each dollar of public support, as much as \$7 of related spending in the local economy occurs." Furthermore, the Task Force report recognized interest shown by Milwaukee County in "adopting a unique funding program to provide support for performing arts groups, including Non-UPAF organizations."

The report noted that county support "could make a major difference in the long-term viability of performing arts in the community." The Task Force concluded that "while increased public sector funding is necessary, it must be understood that the private sector will play the lead role in supporting the performing arts. In order to enhance the financial impact of public sector contributions which are recognized to be limited, the Greater Milwaukee Committee recommends "that government support be used to match increases in private sector contributions."

I believe the recommendation of the Greater Milwaukee Committee Task Force clearly calls on the County Board to seriously reevaluate the way in which we as a government fund the arts.

In a recent report submitted to the County Board by Chairman Ament, it was noted that "obviously, current and projected budgetary revenue shortfalls will require that the Board carefully examine and manage our cultural dollars so as to provide the best mix possible, maintaining and supporting those traditional activities long identified in the Milwaukee entertainment community, while yet remaining flexible to provide support and encouragement for small groups, local performers and new and innovative entertainment medium." While public support must be maintained, it is clear that increased private support must continue to play the leading role if the arts in our community are to continue and flourish.

The recommendation to use public funds as leverage to increase private contributions could become the catalyst to maximize the use of precious county tax levy funds appropriated for cultural, artistic and musical programming. Implementation of plan to match public funds with private

1.0 Policy Issue

Development and implementation of a plan to create a public-private partnership to provide financial support to the county's arts organizations. The plan calls for "government support, in the form of tax levy, to be used as leverage to encourage and increase private sector contributions, through a public-private sector donor-match fund known as the Milwaukee County Arts Trust Fund. Administration of the Milwaukee County Arts Trust Fund (MCATF) would be provided through an agreement between the county and a private foundation.

2.1 County's 1986 Approach to Cultural Programming

As previously stated, Milwaukee County's approach to cultural programming during 1986 is divided into two separate appropriations, consisting of Org. Unit 1935 - Cultural Contributions and Org. Unit 1968 - Performing Arts Matching Grant Program. Both accounts are under the direct control of the County Board, however, the actual allocation of funds under each appropriation is structured very differently.

Established in the 1982 budget, the Cultural Contributions appropriation is intended to provide financial support to various community-based cultural, artistic and musical organizations, so as to provide the citizens of Milwaukee County with quality, family entertainment, free of charge. This allocation has served as the primary funding source for the county's Music Under the Star series. Remaining funds are allocated on a competitive basis to various community performing arts organizations for the provision of quality entertainment throughout the county park system.

Since being established in 1982, the awarding of funds under the Cultural Contributions appropriation has not been clearly defined for lack of written eligibility criteria and application guidelines. Contract awards currently are made after submission of a proposal by an applicant agency to a review group (Cultural Council) appointed by the Chairman of the Parks Committee. Final allocation awards are approved by the County Board upon recommendation of the Parks, Recreation and Culture Committee.

Newly established in the 1986 Budget, the Performing Arts Matching Grant Program is to provide matching grants to professional performing arts organizations in Milwaukee County. The 1986 appropriation was divided into two funding components: (1) Performing Arts Matching Grant Program in the amount of \$250,000 for Non-UPAF groups; and (2) a Hall Rental Subsidy in the amount of \$421,785 for seven UPAF groups currently using the PAC.

The Performing Arts Matching Grant Program was established by several members of the County Board who wanted to demonstrate to community arts organizations that public funds could be awarded in a fair and equitable manner, based on written criteria and guidelines that include provisions designed to encourage diversity, excellence and exploration in the performing and visual arts. The program is by design "artistically blind and politically neutral." It is assumed that an organization capable of generating a stream of revenue from existing sources is worthy of public support. Grants were made on a matching basis and were intended to support the organization's general operations, not specific programs.

In a recent report submitted to the County Board by Chairman Ament, it was noted that "obviously, current and projected budgetary revenue shortfalls will require that the Board carefully examine and manage our cultural dollars so as to provide the best mix possible, maintaining and supporting those traditional activities long identified in the Milwaukee entertainment community, while yet remaining flexible to provide support and encouragement for small groups, local performers and new and innovative entertainment medium." While public support must be maintained, it is clear that increased private support must continue to play the leading role if the arts in cur community are to continue and flourish.

The recommendation to use public funds as leverage to increase private contributions could become the catalyst to maximize the use of precious county tax levy funds appropriated for cultural, artistic and musical programming. Implementation of plan to match public funds with private

The Cultural Council and the Performing Arts Matching Grant Advisory Panel would be abolished and authority would be provided for the establishment, by a private foundation (Subsection 3), of a review panel to consider all applications. The review panel would make recommendations for awarding funds which will then be submitted for final approval to the Parks Committee and County Board.
