### What is going well for the War Memorial Center:

We are grateful for the generous funding provided each year by Milwaukee County to support our stewardship of this iconic Milwaukee County landmark facility. This 66-year plus public/private partnership has enabled the War Memorial to focus its fundraising and earned revenue efforts towards supporting our mission to honor the dead and serve the living by providing inspiring exhibits that honor the sacrifices of our veterans, critical veteran mental health programs, and educational programs for our youth and community. As evidenced in the attached 2023 Annual Report, the War Memorial Center has advanced remarkable initiatives in serving the needs of our veterans and the Milwaukee community all while honoring all of our community's Killed in Action, Missing in Action, Prisoners of War, and their loved ones.

### Concerns/challenges faced by the War Memorial Center:

The Eero Saarinen-designed building occupied by the War Memorial Center is an historic and architecturally significant landmark in Milwaukee County envisioned by community leaders in the 1940s, funded by the Milwaukee community, and erected on land owned by Milwaukee County. Maintaining this iconic Milwaukee treasure for future generations has been a shared responsibility between Milwaukee County and the War Memorial Center for over 66 years. Shifting the full financial burden for the stewardship of this Milwaukee community landmark to the War Memorial Center will result in significant reduction or elimination of critical program support provided to our veterans, their families, and the community at a time when their need for support has never been greater.

Under the Cooperation Agreement currently in place, the financial support provided by Milwaukee County will be reduced from \$486,000 in 2024 to \$266,000 over the next five years, with funding eliminated by 2034. While the War Memorial Center continues to implement creative revenue-generating initiatives and increase its base of community support for our veteran services and programs, the budget shortfall resulting from the sunsetting of County funding poses a significant hurdle.

### Impact of the current funding agreement between the War Memorial Center and Milwaukee County:

The planned reductions in County support as outlined in the 2017 agreement would have an impact on the level of programs WMC provides to veterans and community, including the following:

- Reduction/elimination in veteran programs
- Reduction/elimination in education programs
- Reduction in custodial services which will lead to a decline in facility appearance and negatively impact facility rental revenue
- Reduction in preventative maintenance

Milwaukee County's continued support is critical to maintaining this County landmark and community memorial to our fallen heroes. As a living memorial open to the public, we do not charge admission or membership fees, enabling access for all to pay their respects, learn about the sacrifices made, and to reflect on their own experiences in this sacred place. This is truly a community resource supported through a public-private partnership of County support, private donations, and earned revenue.

We value our continued partnership with Milwaukee County and appreciate the opportunity for further discussions regarding the future support for the War Memorial Center.




# **OUR HISTORY**




Open to the public on Veterans Day 1957, the War Memorial Center became a symbol of sacrifice, honor, and dedication to all our men and women who wore the uniform and bore the burden of war.



The idea of a cultural-community center dedicated to honoring Milwaukee County's war dead was conceived in 1944. Three local women's groups (Altrusa, Business and Professional Women's Club, and Zonta Club) led the way in establishing the War Memorial Center.



Designed and built by Finnish-born American architect Eero Saarinen, who served in the Office of Strategic Services (OSS) during World War II. Saarinen was given the War Memorial Center commission following the death of his father, Eliel Saarinen, who was previously awarded the project.



Wisconsin is honored to count the War Memorial Center among Eero Saarinen's prolific mid-century modern accomplishments. Saarinen also designed the iconic Gateway Arch in St. Louis, Missouri along with buildings commissioned by Dulles and JFK Airports, John Deere, and Yale University.



Nationally recognized artist and WWII veteran Edmund Lewandowski was asked by Saarinen to transform the west facing facade of the War Memorial Center. On Veterans Day 1959, two years after the memorial's dedication, Lewandowski's 1.4 million piece mural was unveiled. It features Roman numerals with the start and end dates of World War II and the Korean War.





The War Memorial Center's longtime tenant, the Milwaukee Art Museum, undergoes expansions in 1975, 2001 and 2015 that change the exterior space of the memorial.




The War Memorial Center stands as a testament to the community's desire for a vibrant multi-use memorial to Honor the Dead by Serving the Living. Built with private funds on land owned by Milwaukee County, this cultural institution remains a jewel for Milwaukee. Recognized in State of Wisconsin statute, the WMC operates with 26% public funding. The remaining funds come from private donations, rental agreements with tenants, event rentals and parking fees.




# WHO WE SERVE

# ENSURE FINANCIAL STABILITY

Starting in 2024, Milwaukee County will begin to eliminate its annual tax levy payment to the War Memorial Center over a ten-year period. County funding currently represents 26% of revenue. To ensure financial stability, we will enhance:

### **NEW FUNDING STREAMS**

Through established and expanding partnerships, the War Memorial Center will continue to create new, diversified funding streams building upon the successes of events like the Beer Garden and Oktoberfest.

### **MODERNIZATION**

Efficiencies and cost-saving measures will be deployed by staff to reduce operational costs and reduce our energy consumption by improving our carbon footprint.

### HOSPITALITY

Improving our hospitality program, we will continue to grow and shape our facility rental processes with an emphasis on client satisfaction.

Engaging students from across Wisconsin to offer unique educational experiences for new and returning students.




