RE: Veto of County Board File No. 17-374 which denies the use of non-tax levy settlement dollars for the creation of a new exhibit at the zoo.

I am vetoing County Board File No. 17-374. As Supervisors know, the State's zoo interchange project took away a large portion of available parking for the zoo, causing a negative impact to zoo visitors. To mitigate this impact, the State gave the County funds to create a new entrance, new parking lot and a new exhibit at the new entry – the otter exhibit. These new amenities would significantly improve the zoo experience for our visitors and would not have any adverse financial impact on Milwaukee County. In fact, the enhanced experience at the zoo could serve to boost revenues, allowing us to invest more funds into one of the region's most beloved cultural attractions.

The zoo director emailed the County Board on May 22, 2017 with all of these details but the County Board still denied - with no explanation - the use of these mitigation dollars and, in turn, these improvements to the zoo. I believe these improvements are critical to keeping the zoo as one of the top attractions statewide.

Our Milwaukee County Zoo had a \$155 million economic impact in the Milwaukee area in 2015, according to researchers from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. Researchers expect that number to rise in the coming years based on planned upgrades, like the otter exhibit and new entrance.

The zoo has kept the Board updated on this project every step of the way (see additional attachments), including all necessary approvals. If the Board does not approve this fund transfer immediately, the bid will expire and the zoo will be forced to rebid the project, which will likely cost the County tens of thousands of dollars and delay improvements that the community is eager to enjoy.

I ask that you sustain my veto and, subsequently, approve these critical projects as soon as possible.

SUBJECT: Report on Impact of the WISDOT Zoo Interchange Reconstruction Project on Zoo Facilities and Operations and Approval of Proposed Mitigation Plans and Authorization to Enter Into an Agreement with WISDOT for the Acquisition of Land

Issue

The Zoo Interchange reconstruction project will require the acquisition by WISDOT of various property interests, including approximately eight acres of Zoo property comprising a parking lot with 700 car capacity. Approval is requested of the Zoo's mitigation program including an auxiliary entrance for Zoo guests, parking facilities, and the relocation of entrance/exit drives and replacement of landscaping and the sale of the Zoo land to WISDOT.

Background

WISDOT plans for the reconstruction of the Zoo Interchange are impacting Zoo grounds, facilities, and operations. The plans also include the WISDOT's acquisition of the Zoo's easternmost parking lot with a capacity of 700 cars. Driveways and parking associated with the Zoofari Conference Center as well as the Zoo's entrance/exit drive will have to be reconfigured.

The Zoo engaged several professional consultants to develop plans for the parking lot replacement and a description of additional facilities needed to create an auxiliary entrance. Fortunately, the Zoo owns eight undeveloped acres on the western edge of the Zoo bordering HWY 100 and Bluemound Road.

Zoo staff has utilized the expertise of the outside legal counsel previously engaged by Milwaukee County to assist in negotiating with the WISDOT to obtain equitable compensation for the Zoo regarding the "cost to cure" all Zoo components impacted by the Zoo Interchange reconstruction project at an equivalent function and quality.

Zoo staff and outside counsel have met on several occasions with WISDOT and are close to finalizing a compensation package adequate to fund the attached cost to cure plan.

Recommendation

The Zoological Department Director recommends approval of the Zoo's mitigation plan and land sale to the WISDOT. It is anticipated that the compensation package will be final by the May 13, 2014 Parks, Energy and Environment Committee and an updated report seeking authorization to enter into an agreement with Wisconsin Department of Transportation will be submitted along with an updated fiscal note and resolution.

As part of entering into this agreement, expenditure and revenue authority will be created for the mitigation project. It is anticipated that the compensation package from the WISDOT will be final for the May 13 meeting of the Parks, Energy and Environment Committee and a revised fiscal note will be submitted.
 - B. The Zoo's cost to cure program is estimated at \$8,087,115. Attached is a breakdown of areas affected by the land sale and the associated cost to cure.
 - C. Revenues anticipated from the land sale to the WISDOT will cover all mitigation plans.
 - D. Zoo staff has engaged several professional consultants to develop plans for the parking lot replacement and a description of additional facilities needed to create an auxiliary entrance. Zoo staff also worked with contractors and other professionals to develop costs for the other areas that will be impacted by the construction of the Zoo Interchange.

Issue

Previously, the Zoo requested and received authorization to receive and expend proceeds from Zoo property being acquired through eminent domain by the Wisconsin Department of Transportation in conjunction with the Zoo Interchange renovation project (County Board Reference Number 14-499). More specifically, the Zoo will be losing its 700 car auxiliary parking lot. This parking capacity must be replaced by Memorial Day Weekend, 2015. In order to meet this deadline, the Zoo requests the authority to extend the contract of Master Plan Consultant PGAV for the following reasons.

Contracting a qualified design firm via the standard County RFP process will take more than three months, delaying the start of design until November 2014, subsequently delaying the opening of the parking lot until past the summer of 2015, and the opening of the entrance facilities and new exhibit until past the summer of 2016. To meet the intended opening dates a more expeditious process of contracting a design firm must be considered.

Background

The firm of PGAV who had prepared the studies, conceptual design and cost estimates for the compensation negotiation with the WisDOT is a world renowned expert in animal exhibits and destination facilities complex design. PGAV is currently under contract for the Zoo Master Plan. They were selected using a formal RFP process in 2012. In order to provide services to implement the ancillary entrance complex PGAV has proposed a competitive fee, an expeditious process, a substantial commitment to engage local architectural and engineering firms, and a minimum of 25% commitment in DBE participation. The implementation of the mitigation program within the intended time frame will be well served by extending the Master Planning contract of PGAV to include the full design service for the ancillary entrance complex.

Recommendation

The Zoological Department Director recommends approval the contract extension of Master Plan Consultant PGAV for the purpose of fast tracking the design of the new auxiliary Zoo entrance and parking facilities.

WHEREAS, the firm of PGAV who had prepared the Zoo Master Plan and the studies, conceptual design and cost estimates for the new auxiliary entrance and parking facilities is a world renowned expert in animal exhibits and destination facilities complex design, and the contract for the Zoo Master Plan remains open; and for providing services to implement the ancillary entrance complex has proposed a competitive fee, an expeditious process, a substantial commitment to engage local architectural and engineering firms, and a minimum of 25% commitment in DBE participation, the implementation of the mitigation program within the intended time frame; and

WHEREAS, the approval of the Milwaukee County Board is required of the extension of such a contract; now, therefore,

Thank you for the invitation to submit this proposal for design services related to the West Zoo Entrance. Please find an outline of the project scope and proposed PGAV services:

Project Outline:

Due to the highway reconstruction, a new west entry and parking lot addition is required to meet zoo capacity. The new entry will provide an equitable experience to that at the main entry on the east and will feature an integrated small aquatic animal exhibit. Based on the capacity of the new parking lot, a gift shop and snack stand will be integrated into one building in order to minimize operational needs. Toilets and separate turnstiles will also be included. The snack bar will include service windows from both interior and exterior. The new west entry will include an exhibit adjacent to the gift shop and snack bar. Additionally, a picnic area will be set into the woods nearby allowing use of the snack stand and toilets.

General assumptions PGAV made in the preparation of this proposal:

- The design process will pick up from the concept and programmatic information developed for the Master Plan concept and cost estimate completed in 2013.
- The project will open in late spring 2016. Parking lot will be completed prior to Memorial Day 2015. Design will be completed at the end of 2014 or in spring of 2015.
- The overall project budget is \$7,000,000 including soft costs and contingencies.
- PGAV will contract for these services using the AIA B101 Agreement between Owner and Architect.
- · The method of project procurement will be via Design-Bid-Build process.
- MCZ may engage a local contractor for preconstruction services to estimate the project at the DD or CD phase of design. PGAV will coordinate any estimates produced via preconstruction services.



Specialty Items:

- Animal holding caging, doors, transfers, exhibit viewing panels, etc. will be advanced to
 the Design Development level and a selected vendor will be solely responsible for the
 final design and engineering. In collaboration with the Zoo, PGAV will provide
 sufficient description and specifications for bidding and design completion by subcontractors or vendors.
- Engineering of circulation, filtration, and disinfection systems for bodies of water that are in animal exhibits or holding areas.
- Structural Engineering of self-supporting rockwork or rockwork retaining walls less than 3 feet in height shall be accomplished by the Rockwork Contractor as part of the Shop Drawing phase.
- Landscape and Irrigation Design will be advanced to the Design Development level and a selected local vendor will be solely responsible for the final design.
- Design for thematic surfaces (built into the project via the construction documents) will be documented by PGAV in a Character Reference Guide,
- PGAV services include two renderings, depicting the visitor experience or overall views.
- The design of Graphics, Interpretives, and Props is included and will be provided by PGAV as a separate package for fabrication and installation by a specialized contractor or vendor. Related structural and MBP items will be coordinated into the construction documents by the design team.
- The Construction Phase is assumed to be 14 months in length. The design team will
 provide supplemental drawings; review submittals including RFIs, Shop Drawings, and
 Product Data and Samples; and participate in weekly meetings (or as scheduled) via
 phone (or in person when present), as well as prepare certificate of Substantial
 Completion, and Punch List.
- The design team will provide site visits every two months for review of work, and art
 direction of thematic, exhibit, and interpretive elements. It is assumed that the
 Owner's staff or CM will review contractor pay applications, percentage complete
 certificates, and daily interaction with the construction process.
- Production of a physical model for the purpose of depicting exhibit scope and detailed clay modeling of rockwork is included (should it be deemed necessary for communication and bidding of the project).
- The project will not require the design and integration of a stand-alone generator.



Background

As you are aware the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (DOT) is renovating the Zoo Interchange. Construction started in 2014 and is expected to last through 2019. This project has directly affected the Milwaukee County Zoo and its operations. Most significantly is the loss of the Zoo's 8 acre 700 car auxiliary parking lot on the east side of the Zoo bordering US Highway 45. The Zoo uses this parking lot several times during the busy season and must retain this parking capacity in order to accommodate the Zoo's 1.3 million visitors.

Once the DOT's final renovation plans were developed and the project's effect on Zoo grounds was known, Zoo and County officials, assisted by outside legal counsel, began negotiations with the DOT. Following an analysis of the final plans, the Zoo developed a list of effects on Zoo property and their estimated cost. This document has been referred to as the "Cost to Cure". This list included a new entrance, parking lot, and entry exhibit to be located on the former Bliffert Lumber Co. site owned by the Zoo at the corner of Bluemound Road and Hwy 100. Preliminary estimates of the "Costs to Cure" were just over \$8 million, excluding the value of the land.

As part of the negotiation process, the County and DOT each retained professional appraisers. When the County's outside counsel and the DOT could not agree on a final settlement amount, negotiations ceased and the DOT proceeded to take the Zoo property through eminent domain. On June 30, 2014 (the "Date of Taking"), the DOT provided the Zoo an \$8.5 million Award of Damages. A short time later, the County's outside counsel notified the DOT of its intent to appeal the "Taking" and the payment and began filing the appropriate submittals through the courts legal system.

The legal procedures continued over the next two years. During this time period, many "Cost to Cure" projects were designed and re-estimated and/or bid out for the start of construction. New estimates for the "Cost to Cure" now exceeded \$13 million. On July 22, 2016, the County's outside counsel and attorneys from Wisconsin Department of Justice (DOJ, representing the DOT) entered mediation. The DOJ's final offer was deemed insufficient and the mediation ended. The DOJ was informed that the legal appeal would proceed to trial. After several delays, a final trial date was set for February 13, 2017. As the date approached, the court appointed mediator continued to contact the DOJ regarding a settlement prior to going to trial. On February 1, 2017, the mediator notified the County's outside counsel that significant progress had been made. On advice of outside counsel, the County accepted a final offer of \$4.2 million. This brought the DOT's total payment for the "Cost to Cure" list to \$12.7 million.

Legislative History

During the May, 2014 meeting cycle of the County Board, the Zoo Director submitted a report (14-449) regarding the impact of the Zoo Interchange renovation project on the Zoo's property. This information also included the "Cost to Cure" list which included a new entrance, parking lot, and new entry exhibit and a cost estimate. At both the Parks, Energy and Environment and Finance and Audit Committee meetings and in anticipation of receiving a settlement offer from the DOT, the Zoo Director and County's outside counsel requested the opportunity in closed session to discuss the progress of negotiations. The packet provided to the two Board committees also included a resolution providing the Zoo the authority to accept and use any DOT award funds for the "Renovation Plan" (Cost to Cure List) and giving the Department of Administrative Services authority to administratively transfer the funds and establish expenditure authority. The resolution passed in both committees on May 13 and 15, 2014 respectively and subsequently by the full Board on May 22, 2014.

During the July, 2014 meeting cycle of the County Board, the Zoo Director submitted legislation (14-609) seeking to extend the contract of Zoo master plan consultant PGAV for the purpose of designing a new entrance including admission facilities, restrooms, concession and merchandise facilities, a new aquatic animal entrance exhibit, and adjacent parking lot. The new entrance exhibit was more clearly identified as a North American River Otter exhibit during this item's discussion at the Finance and Audit Committee Meeting. The item was passed by both committees on July 22 and 24, respectively, and subsequently by the full Board on July 31, 2014.

On August 7, 2014, the Department of Administrative Services processed an administrative fund transfer of the initial \$8.5 million DOT settlement funds and established the projects, including a new entrance exhibit, on the "Cost to Cure" list.

On May 18, 2017, the Department of Administrative Services submitted a fund transfer providing additional expenditure authority from the final DOT settlement for the completion of the "Cost to Cure" list. The Finance and Audit Committee passed the fund transfer and forwarded it to the full County Board.

Project Progress

Following completion of design in August, 2015, construction began on the west entrance parking lot. Site utility work also began. Unforeseen unstable soil conditions at the site hindered construction and began to escalate the cost. In 2016, construction began on the footings and foundations of the buildings, including the otter exhibit. Construction stopped in late 2016, pending the receipt of additional settlement funds from the DOT. Those funds were received in March, 2017 and construction of the building, excluding the otter exhibit was started. The completion of the otter exhibit is pending the final passage of the May 18, 2017 fund transfer request.

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
