# TRANSPORTATION – YOUR CONNECTION TO COMMUNITY



Transportation connects us to our community and helps us to live healthy, active, and fulfilling lives. Without transportation, it is difficult to stay connected to friends and loved ones, remain involved with hobbies and wellness activities, and meet our daily needs, like getting groceries and getting to medical appointments. While we may be accustomed to driving ourselves to all of our daily destinations, it is important to know that other transportation options exist.

In Milwaukee County, there are a variety of transportation options that get older adults and people with disabilities to the places that they need to go. Milwaukee County Transit System (MCTS) operates one of America's best and most reliable bus transit systems. MCTS also operates Transit Plus, a county-wide paratransit service for those who are unable to ride the buses. Additionally, Milwaukee County offers a volunteer driver program provided through Eras Senior Network.

Lastly, Milwaukee County Aging and Disabilities Services (ADS) provides Older Adult Transportation Service (OATS) to connect eligible older adults to healthcare appointments, grocery shopping, senior centers, voting, and more. # MILWAUKEE COUNTY TRANSIT SYSTEM CONNECTION

#### **Same Day Pilot**

MCTS and Milwaukee County have launched a paratransit Same Day Pilot. This program gives Transit Plus clients an option for urgent same day medical or work rides that could not be scheduled the day before. Rides are provided by Via.

#### What is the Same Day Pilot?

Same Day means a ride to an unplanned work or health event that you weren't aware of yesterday. Pilot means it's a test – please expect some changes as we work on perfecting this service.

- Expect either a shared ride or a private ride, depending upon demand.
- Use the service regardless of your qualified disability – clients with mobility devices will be accommodated.
- Rides are available throughout Milwaukee County.
- Request a trip between 7:00 am and
   5:59 pm 7 days a week.
- Get picked up within an hour of booking your ride.
- Pay a one-way fare of \$10.
   Companions also pay \$10. (If you have a PCA designation on your Transit Plus card, your PCA can join you for free).
- Remember your Transit Plus ID card is required when boarding.
- This is a pilot. That means we're testing how the service will work best. We'll notify registered riders if any future changes are needed.

#### How to Sign up

All participants must be enrolled in Transit Plus and must sign a Service Agreement. The agreement can be found online at: RideMCTS.com/TransitPlusSameDayPilot or by calling the Transit Plus office.

Once your agreement has been processed, you will receive an email with instructions on how to book your rides.



#### October is Fire Safety Month:

Essential Tips for Seniors and Persons with Disabilities



October is Fire Safety Month, a vital reminder for everyone, especially for seniors and individuals with disabilities, to take proactive steps to ensure safety in case of a fire. Milwaukee County Office of Emergency Management is here to remind you that fires can escalate quickly, so being prepared is essential to protect yourself and your loved ones.

#### Why Proactive Measures Matter

For seniors and persons with disabilities, mobility challenges can make escaping a fire more difficult. Taking preventive steps can significantly enhance your safety and peace of mind. Here are some key actions to consider:



Check Smoke Alarm Batteries
Smoke alarms are crucial for early fire detection. Test the batteries regularly
and replace them as needed. Make sure alarms are installed in every bedroom and on every floor of your home to ensure you are alerted in case of a fire.



Ensure your fire extinguishers are accessible and fully charged. Familiarize yourself with how to use them. It's a good idea to keep one in the kitchen and another near any heating sources. Regularly inspect them to ensure they are in good working condition.



If you use space heaters, ensure they are safe and certified by a recognized testing laboratory. Keep them at least three feet away from flammable materials and never leave them unattended while in use. Unplug them when not in use to



Never Use a Gas Range or Oven to Heat Your Home
Using a gas range or oven to heat your home can lead to serious safety hazards, including fire and carbon monoxide poisoning. Always opt for safe heating alternatives designed specifically for home heating.



#### Be Aware of Carbon Monoxide Dangers

Carbon monoxide (CO) is a colorless, odorless gas that can be deadly. Install CO detectors on every floor of your home to detect this dangerous gas. Regularly check the batteries and ensure that the detectors are functioning properly.

#### Prepare for Medicare

Generally, Medicare covers most of the cost of medical services, but it is not free. Every year from October 15 - December 7, Medicare beneficiaries can choose their health coverage; this is known as the Medicare Annual Enrollment Period (AEP). AEP is the time to review Medicare coverage for the following year. During AEP, you can change or join a Medicare Advantage plan, stand-alone Medicare prescription drug (Part D) plan, or Medicare Supplement, or you can switch to Original Medicare with or without a Part D plan. It is important to review your Medicare choices every year even if you are satisfied with your current coverage. There may be plans that offer better health or drug coverage to meet your

It is vital to understand that everyone has unique Medicare needs because everyone's health needs are different, and Medicare does not offer plans for couples or families. Without learning, asking questions, and seeking assistance, navigating Medicare enrollment can be overwhelming. It is important to know that there is help available to you! #### Milwaukee County Announces Transition in Energy Assistance Program Administration

Milwaukee, WI— The Milwaukee County Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) announces a significant change in the administration of its Energy Assistance Program. Currently, the program is managed by DHHS-Housing Services in collaboration with two contracted provider agencies: United Migrant Opportunity Services (UMOS) and Community Advocates.

Effective September 1, 2024, the Wisconsin Department of Administration (DOA), Division of Energy, Housing and Community Resources (DEHCR) will assume oversight of the contracts with UMOS and Community Advocates for the upcoming 2025 energy season. This decision marks a departure from Milwaukee County's current subcontracting model, as the State of Wisconsin will contract directly with provider agencies as they do in counties across the state. The transition to State oversight follows DEHCR's goal to streamline fiscal and programmatic accountability.

"We remain committed to ensuring all residents in need of Energy Assistance are able to easily access the program. We are working closely with our partners UMOS and Community Advocates to ensure a seamless transition to their agencies," said Maricela Gaona, DHHS Housing Services Program Manager. "With the No Wrong Door model of customer service to connect people to services across the health and human services system of care, we are committed to connecting residents to the Energy Assistance Program."

In light of its reduced role and the substantial budgetary impact, DHHS has decided not to contract with DEHCR for the upcoming 2025 season beginning October 1, 2024. DHHS is committed to working with the State and local partners on a transition plan to ensure there is no disruption in service for customers.

1 s we age, many of us find that we could use extra help to remain independent. For those needing longterm care, the IRIS program is an option that can help you get the supports and services you need to remain living confidently in your own home. IRIS (Include, Respect, I Self-Direct) is Wisconsin's fully self-directed longterm care program for older adults and people with disabilities who are eligible for Medicaid. IRIS is designed to help you live life on your terms, while having trusted partners that you choose by your side to help reach your goals.

#### How it works

In IRIS, you have many choices in deciding how you want things done. When you join IRIS, a budget is established for you based on your long-term care needs and goals. However, you choose:

- What goods, supports and services you need;
- When and where you want your supports provided;
- Who will provide them; and
- How you use your IRIS monthly budget effectively and wisely.

All IRIS participants have a support and service plan. Your plan is based on your long-term care goals and how you want to achieve them, using your IRIS budget. When you build your plan, you'll think about the things that will maintain or improve the quality of your life. IRIS has a broad set of services available to you, including home-delivered meals, home modifications such as ramps, and transportation services.

#### Support from others

You will be responsible for managing your IRIS budget, acting as an employer to workers you choose to hire – which can include eligible

family or friends – and following IRIS program rules and policies. However, joining IRIS doesn't mean doing things all by yourself. Every IRIS participant chooses an IRIS Consultant Agency (ICA) and Fiscal Employer Agent (FEA) to help support them in self-direction.

IRIS Consultant Agencies
Your IRIS Consultant Agency can
help you self-direct and handle the
requirements of the IRIS program.
You will choose an IRIS Consultant
that works with you one-on-one.
They'll take time to get to know you
and learn what is important to you.

IRIS Fiscal Employer Agents Your IRIS fiscal employer agent can help do background checks on workers you hire, process payroll, and help with other employer tasks. Your fiscal employer agent also processes payments to other supports on your plan, like agency supports and other items you purchase to meet your goals.

#### New K3 Program Planned for Bucyrus Campus



In response to the <u>recent closure</u> of multiple nearby K3 locations, <u>St. Ann Center for Intergenerational</u> Care is planning to open a new K3 program at its Bucyrus Campus, 2450 W. North Ave.

Focused on learning through play — and embracing the same kind, compassionate care parents have relied on as part of St. Ann Center childcare programs for years — the new preschool will prepare children for success in K4 and beyond by:

- Empowering students to guide their own learning experience
- . Creating a culture of collaborative learning and working together
- Encouraging safe risk-taking and experimentation
- Promoting imaginative thinking

· Recognizing and accepting the different emotions play can create

"I know a lot about this community and what this area needs," says **St. Ann Center Bucyrus Campus Director of Childcare and Education, Bao Xiong**, who spearheads the new K3 program. Xiong is a veteran of day care and preschool education communities in both Milwaukee and Waukesha counties, and has successfully launched several child care centers of her own. "A lot of our children and families don't have access to transportation [to get to other early childhood programs]. This neighborhood needs a quality K-3 program."

Xiong also notes the high ratio of special needs learners in the Bucyrus Campus neighborhood — students she is eager to accommodate in her sunny, toy-filled classroom with large windows, plenty of room for imaginative play and two private, accessible bathrooms.

Xiong's family immigrated to America when she was just 3, and she still recalls her parents' insistence on a good education for each of their children. And the kindness and patience of her own early childhood teachers. "That's what drives me, because my parents always said education will get you everywhere," Xiong says. "Education. And that's what I want to give to these kids, because they won't get anywhere without education."

St. Ann Center also offers parents the <u>opportunity to build a childcare schedule that works best for their family</u>, adding wraparound childcare to morning or afternoon K3 programming. The Bucyrus Center is open from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays. St. Ann Center accepts the <u>Wisconsin Shares childcare subsidy</u>.
