POLICY

This report documents the update process for the natural areas and critical species habitat protection and management plan for southeastern Wisconsin. This update reflects physical changes in the Region, as well as new findings, which have occurred since the preparation of Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission (SEWRPC) Planning Report No. 42, A Regional Natural Areas and Critical Species Habitat Protection and Management Plan for Southeastern Wisconsin in September 1997.

BACKGROUND

A regional natural areas and critical species habitat protection and management plan for Southeastern Wisconsin was adopted by SEWRPC as an amendment to the regional park and open space plan in September 1997. The regional natural areas and critical species habitat plan is documented in SEWRPC Planning Report No. 42, A Regional Natural Areas and Critical Species Habitat Protection and Management Plan for Southeastern Wisconsin, September 1997. The planning effort was undertaken to identify the most significant remaining natural areas—irreplaceable, biodiverse remnants of the pre-European landscape—as well as other areas vital to the maintenance of endangered, threatened, and rare plant and animal species in the Region.

Promoting biodiversity, the plan represents an important additional element of the evolving comprehensive plan for Southeastern Wisconsin. It also provides an important supplement to the open space preservation recommendations of the regional land use, and park and open space plans. Under the plan, natural areas are defined as tracts of land or water so little modified by human activity, or which have sufficiently recovered from the effects of such activity, that they contain intact native plant and animal communities believed to be representative of the pre-European-settlement landscape. Critical species habitats are defined as additional tracts of land or water which support endangered, threatened, or rare plant or animal species. Last amended in 2010, the plan at that time identified a total of 494 natural areas and 271 critical species habitat sites.

In order to accurately reflect ongoing changes to the landscape and new discoveries, the natural areas plan is presently in the process of being updated and amended under the direction of the SEWRPC Technical Advisory Committee for the Protection and Management of Natural Areas.

The following major focus areas are being addressed by the natural areas plan:

- Updating the site inventory and mapping
- Modernizing data curation
- Creating site profiles to improve communication
- Addressing a wide variety of issues and concerns with the critical species habitat concept
- Revising and deploying an aquatic areas assessment scheme for surface waters
