In 2023, nearly 40% Milwaukee County Transit System (MCTS) revenues came from state operating assistance funds (s. 85.20 funds). Farebox revenues consist of roughly 17% of MCTS funding, while Milwaukee County funds make up another 17% (i.e. tax levy and Vehicle Registration Fees).	Not included in adopted budget. While the state has increased GTA funding to counties in recent years, counties still receive a lower percentage of the "share of costs" compared to ten years ago. This action will reduce the substantial subsidy Milwaukee County has to provide each year to cover the gap in funding these mandated services. Per the Americans with Disabilities Act, WisDOT is required to provide paratransit aids to assist eligible mass transit operating assistance recipients. Funding is provided to all fixed route bus systems in the state based on each system's percentage of expenses and revenue miles. In 2023 MCTS provided more than 350,000 paratransit rides and this number is projected to increase with an aging population.	Included in adopted budget.
