## AGREEMENT

## BETWEEN THE MILWAUKEE COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

## AND.

## THE MILWAUNCE POUNDATION

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into this \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, 198\_, by and between the MILWAUNEE COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS, hereinafter referred to as the "Board," and THE MILWAUKEE FOUNDATION, a community trust, hereinafter referred to as "MF."

#### WITSESSETH

WHEREAS, the COUNTY OF MILWAUMEE, has or intends to appropriate property tax funds in calendar year 1987 to suggest and encourage cultural and artistic activities in Milwaukee County (hereinafter referred to as the "Arts Fund"); and

WHEREAS, on October 2, 1986, the Board established the Milwaukee County Cultural, Artistic and Musical Programming Advisory Council (hereinafter referred to as "CAMPAC") to act as an advisory council to the Chairman of the Board, the Board and the Milwaukee County Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture (hereinafter referred to as the "Parks Committee"); and

WHEREAS, the primary purpose of CAMPAC is to advise the Board and the Parks Committee on how to best allocate the Arts Fund to community arts groups for the provision of cultural arts programs

that best serve and enhance the quality of life in Milwaukee County: and

WHEREAS, CAMPAC shall consist of nine (9) members confirmed by the Board; and

WHEREAS, the Board has authorized the Chairperson of the Board to enter into an agreement with NF for and on behalf of Milwaukee County, whereby NF shall be hired for the fee stated herein to administer and coordinate the county art program supported by the Arts Fund (the "Arts Program") in the manner stated herein; and

WHEREAS, the Board has, by resolution on \_\_\_\_\_\_\_, 1986 approved the form of this Agreement; and

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board and MF, in consideration of the mutual promises hereinafter set forth, do hereby promise and agree as follows:

- SERVICES TO BE PROVIDED BY MF. MF shall provide the following services under this Agreement:
- 1.1. MF shall advise the Board on matters regarding Milwaukee County's relationship with performing arts groups in the community generally.

- 1.2. MF shall act as staff for CAMPAC on all matters pertaining to the Arts Program.
- 1.3. MF shall coordinate and assist in the administration of the Arts Program in the following manner:
  - (a) MF shall solicit proposals for programs to be included in the Arts Program, consistent with the criteria and guidelines approved by the Board.
  - (b) MF shall analyze and review all submitted proposals for Arts Fund monies and make recommendations to CAMPAC regarding whether such proposals should be included in the Arts Program.
  - (c) After CAMPAC and the Board notify MF which proposals have been accepted for the Arts Program, MF shall, subject to Board approval, reach an understanding with each of the individuals and agencies approved for funding by the Board (the "Arts Groups") of the services they shall provide in exchange for such funding and MF shall provide the Board with a written summary of such understandings.
  - (d) The Board shall draw up and enter into contracts (including Acknowledgement of Receipt of Funding Contracts in connection with the grant subsidy program) with the Arts Groups (the "Contracts") where appropriate and shall indicate to MF those funded programs with respect to which MF's services shall not be required under this Agreement, if any. MF shall

have no responsibilities hereunder as to those funded programs so indicated.

- (e) MF shall provide staff assistance to the Board in connection with the administration of the Contracts, including the administration of payments to Arts Groups under the Contracts as provided in paragraph 1.4, below, and assistance in ascertaining compliance by the Arts Groups with the terms and conditions of the Contracts.
- 1.4. MF shall assist in administering contract payments as provided paragraph 1.3(e), above and such assistance shall be provided as follows:
  - (a) Not less frequently than monthly, MF shall provide to the Board, or such individual as the Board designates in writing, a summary of payments becoming due under the Contracts during the following month. Such summary shall indicate the name of the Arts Group entitled to payment, the date upon which payment is due and its amount, and a brief description of the services for which payment is to be made.
  - (b) Not later than the due dates specified in MF's notice, the Board shall make payments to the Arts Groups entitled thereto in the amounts specified in MF's notice or, if the Board disputes that any payment is due or its amount, the Board shall notify MF of such dispute and payment shall be withheld until the Board, MF and the Arts Group involved resolve such dispute.

- 1.5. MF shall provide assistance, coordination and supervision to the Arts Groups in the following manner:
  - (a) MF shall, where appropriate, provide general advice or advice relating to the availability of additional assistance, to Arts Groups concerning organizational matters, including advice regarding incorporation and organizational structure.
  - (b) MF shall, where appropriate, provide general advice or advice relating to the availability of additional assistance, to Arts Groups with respect to budgeting, establishing appropriate accounting procedures, recordkeeping procedures and monitoring procedures; and
  - (c) MF shall provide general advice and direction upon request as to the availability of assistance in the areas of advertising and public relations, business management and/or fund raising.
- 1.6. MF shall work cooperatively with Milwaukee County staff, department heads, public officials and with the Arts Groups toward the successful completion of the Arts Program.
- 1.7. MF shall recommend such changes in the guidelines and eligibility criteria for the Arts Program as it considers appropriate to the changing needs and circumstances of the Arts Program.

1.8. The Board acknowledges that, as a grant-making community trust, MF is currently screening and administering grants to arts groups in the greater Milwaukee community (including groups which are likely recipients of county funds) and that it is the expectation of the parties that the services to be performed by MF hereunder may be coordinated with, and performed as an incident to, the services presently provided by MF's staff in connection with the administration and supervision of MF's own community programs. The Board further agrees that if MF at any time determines, in its sole discretion, that the performance of services for the Board hereunder unreasonably burdens MF's staff and detracts from the ability of MF's staff members to perform their regular duties for MF, then MF may, upon ninety (90) days prior notice to the Board, terminate this Agreement. In the event of early termination of this Agreement, the total amount due to MF under paragraph 3.2., below, shall be prorated based upon the total number of months in which MF shall provide services hereunder. The Board shall pay to MF a total amount hereunder equal to Four Thousand One Hundred and Twenty-Five Dollars (\$4,125.00) per month for services rendered. If the amount paid to MF under paragraph 3.2., below is greater than the amount determined to be owing in accordance with this paragraph, MF agrees to refund any excess not later than the effective date of termination hereof. If MF elects to terminate this Agreement before May 17, 1987, effective after that date, the Board shall pay MF, on May

17, 1987, the remainder of the total prorated amount due pursuant to this paragraph.

- 2. RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE BOARD. The Board shall have the following responsibilities hereunder:
- 2.1. The Board shall prepare the Contracts in a manner which conforms to the understanding outlined in the written summaries provided to the Board by MF under paragraph 1.3(c), above. After preparation and execution of the Contracts, the Board shall provide copies thereof to MF and shall indicate to MF, which funded programs, if any, shall not require MF's administrative services, pursuant to paragraph 1.3(d), above. Additionally, the Board shall obtain written receipts from the Arts Groups upon payment thereto and shall provide copies of such receipts to MF.
- 2.2. The Board agrees to indemnify and hold MF, the members of its Board, its Trustees and their respective employees and agents harmless from and against any and all claims, loss, damage, cost and expense (including reasonable attorneys fees and amounts paid in settlement with the Board's consent) which may be suffered or incurred by any of them as a result of any claim, action or proceeding relating to or arising out of the performance of services by MF hereunder, with the sole exception of any such claims, actions or proceedings arising out of any willful or negligent acts or omissions of MF, its Board, its Trustees and their respective agents or employees. Without limitation, the indemnification hereunder shall extend to any claims asserted against MF by any Arts

Group alleging nonperformance or otherwise arising out of any Contract between the Board and such Arts Group. MF agrees to indemnify and hold the Board, the members of the Board and its employees and agents harmless from and against any and all claims, loss, damage, cost and expense which may be suffered or incurred by any of them as a result of willful or negligent acts or omissions of MF or its agents or employees arising out of MF's duties hereunder.

- 2.3. The Board shall work cooperatively with MF staff to assure that MF is able to properly provide its services hereunder.
  - 3. TERM OF AGREEMENT AND PAYMENT FOR SERVICES.
- 3.1. Subject to termination as provided in Paragraph 1.8, above, the term of this Agreement shall be one year and shall run from October 15, 1986 through October 14, 1987. It is understood that MF's responsibilities hereunder shall relate only to the Arts Fund (as defined above) for 1987 and shall not relate to any programs funded out of 1986 or 1988 Milwaukee County budget dollars.
- 3.2. The Board shall compensate MF for the services provided hereunder through October 14, 1987 in the total amount of Forty-nine Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$49,500.00) which is intended by the parties to be the sole amount payable to MF hereunder for the term hereof. Compensation shall be payable in two (2) equal installments of Twenty-four Thousand Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$24,750.00) each, the first payment to be made upon signing the contract and the second to be made on May 15, 1987. It is

understood that this Agreement may only be extended beyond October 14, 1987 by written agreement of the parties and that, in the event of an extension hereof, additional compensation shall be paid to MF in accordance with the terms negotiated at that time.

- 4. MF REPORTING REQUIREMENTS. MF hereby agrees to report to the Board in the following manner:
- 4.1. MF agrees to submit to the Board, on or before the date requested by the Board (which date shall provide MF a reasonable opportunity to compile the desired information), in such detail and form as Milwaukee County officials may request, all requests received from community groups for Arts Fund monies.
- 4.2. MF agrees to notify the Board of the individuals who will maintain the records and reports required under this Agreement and who will be supervising the administration of the Arts Program on behalf of MF. MF shall inform the Board of any change in any such person within fifteen (15) days of said change.
- 4.3. MF agrees that it will retain all financial and business records relating to this Agreement for a period of six (6) years following the completion of this Agreement; provided, however, that if MF desires to dispose of any such records prior to the expiration of such period, MF shall give a written notice to the Board offering to deliver such records to the Board, and may thereafter destroy or otherwise dispose of any such records which are not claimed by the Board within sixty (60) days after delivery of such

notice. The Board may, upon request, at reasonable times and upon reasonable intervals, inspect the records of MF as they relate to the services provided hereunder and MF shall make such records available to the Board and the Board's auditor upon the Board's request. MF shall also make available to the Board its annual audited financial statements upon the Board's request.

## 5. NONDISCRIMINATORY PROVISIONS.

MF agrees that the provisions of Section 56.17 of the Milwaukee County General Ordinances, as set forth in the attached Certificate of Compliance (attached hereto as Appendix A), is incorporated herein by reference.

- 6. <u>ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS</u>. The Board and MF furthermore mutually agree as follows:
- 6.1. The Board and MF assure and certify to the other party hereto that they, respectively, possess the authority to execute this Agreement.
- 6.2. MF assures and certifies that it will establish safeguards to protect against employees and participants from using their positions for private gain for themselves or others.
- 6.3. MF understands that this Agreement in no way affects MF's obligation to comply with all applicable laws, ordinances and codes of the federal, state and local governments.

6.5. MF agrees that it will procure and thereafter maintain worker's compensation, employer's liability, comprehensive general liability (bodily injury) and property damage in amounts satisfactory to the Board, and such other insurances as may be required by law in amounts satisfactory to the Board; however, it is understood that such amounts will be reasonable under the circumstances. The comprehensive liability insurance policy shall be for a minimum of \$500,000, procured, maintained and enforced during the lifetime of the Agreement and naming Milwaukee County as additional insured. A copy of the Insurance Certificate must be furnished to the Board not later than MF's receipt of the first payment hereunder.

6.6. It is further understood and agreed that MF is an independent contractor and not the agent or the employee of the Board. All personnel performing the services contemplated by the Agreement shall be the employees of MF and not of the Board and MF will make all necessary provisions for the payment of their salaries and for the withholding of appropriate deductions for state and federal income tax, social security and, in addition thereto, shall provide worker's compensation insurance and all other prerequisites of the employer-employee relationship.

7. NOTICES. Any notices or communications required to be given under this Agreement shall be sufficient if in writing and hand-delivered, or if mailed, by certified or registered mail, postage prepaid, as follows:

Pursuant to County Board resolutions #84 4466 abd #86-463 adopted on October 2, 1986 which established guidelines and criteria for awarding County Arts funds, the County Cultural, Artistis and Musical Programming Advisory Council (CAMPAC) has received and reviewed the recommendations of the Milwaukee Artists Foundation for project grants and technical assistance under the County Arts Sub-grant program.

Panels of the Milwaukee Artists Foundation have reviewed the requests and made recommendations for grants in three categories as follows:

- Dance, music and interdisciplinary	\$19,542
- Visual arts applicants	12,750
- Writing and theater	-1,768 17,68
TOTAL	\$49,980

In addition, \$16,500 is payable to Milwaukee Artists Foundation as subgrants administrator, thus bringing the grand total to \$66,480 against the budgeted \$66,500. The Milwaukee Artists Foundation has done a thorough review of the applications and has documented its conclusions appropriately. I am presently engaged in a comparative study of Mexican, American, and Canadian energy policies. Such a study promises to be beneficial and timely in terms of course preparations and publication. At the same time, I am researching the background and formation of Australia's early policy toward the states of Africa between 1957 and 1981. While similar to my earlier Canadian study, the content and conclusions promise to be both different and controversial. I spent the 1988-81 academic year as a research fellow at the National University of Australia. Administrative responsibilities since then have prevented me from completing a manuscript on Canadian and Australian attitudes toward Southern Africa. During the summer of 1984, time spent at the Canadian Institute of International Affairs in Toronto resulted in an article on Canadian foreign policy in the post-Trudeau era and an article on Trudeau and the press.

You will note from the listing of publications that I have edited a collection of papers for the Organization for Economic Development and Cooperation in Paris, entitled Toward a Redefinition of Development. This effort, in collaboration with two of France's foremost sociologists, Alain Birou and Paul-Marc Henry, was a task of considerable dimension. It involved translating extensive material from French and German into English, selection of content, editing of papers, and the determination of the final format. My own solicited contribution, in essay form (pages 96-97), was my initial contact with the project and its sponsors. The preface, introduction, and sectional introductory notes are mine in both the English and the French editions.

Another major publication is my doctoral thesis. Published in 1978, it is entitled The Deceptive Ash: Bilingualism and Canadian Policy in Africa 1957-1971. As an original piece of research, it remains the only major overview of the Canadian presence in sub-Saharan Africa done to date. Canadian and African scholars concede this work to be of significance as background for their own research. Several articles, papers, and lectures have been generated from this original research.







# BETWEEN THE MILWAUKEE COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

#### AND

### THE MILWAUKEE FOUNDATION

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into this \_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, 198\_, by and between the MILWAUKEE COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS, hereinafter referred to as the "Board," and THE MILWAUKEE FOUNDATION, a community trust, hereinafter referred to as "MF."

#### WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the COUNTY OF MILWAUKEE, has or intends to appropriate property tax funds in calendar year 1987 to support and encourage cultural and artistic activities in Milwaukee County (hereinafter referred to as the "Arts Fund"); and

WHEREAS, on October 2, 1986, the Board established the Milwaukee County Cultural, Artistic and Musical Programming Advisory Council (hereinafter referred to as "CAMPAC") to act as an advisory council to the Chairman of the Board, the Board and the Milwaukee County Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture (hereinafter referred to as the "Parks Committee"); and

WHEREAS, the primary purpose of CAMPAC is to advise the Board and the Parks Committee on how to best allocate the Arts Fund to community arts groups for the provision of cultural arts programs

- 1.4. MF shall assist in administering contract payments as provided paragraph 1.3(e), above and such assistance shall be provided as follows:
  - (a) Not less frequently than monthly, MF shall provide to the Board, or such individual as the Board designates in writing, a summary of payments becoming due under the Contracts during the following month. Such summary shall indicate the name of the Arts Group entitled to payment, the date upon which payment is due and its amount, and a brief description of the services for which payment is to be made.
  - (b) Not later than the due dates specified in MF's notice, the Board shall make payments to the Arts Groups entitled thereto in the amounts specified in MF's notice or, if the Board disputes that any payment is due or its amount, the Board shall notify MF of such dispute and payment shall be withheld until the Board, MF and the Arts Group involved resolve such dispute.

- 1.5. MF shall provide assistance, coordination and supervision to the Arts Groups in the following manner:
  - (a) MF shall, where appropriate, provide general advice or advice relating to the availability of additional assistance, to Arts Groups concerning organizational matters, including advice regarding incorporation and organizational structure.
  - (b) MF shall, where appropriate, provide general advice or advice relating to the availability of additional assistance, to Arts Groups with respect to budgeting, establishing appropriate accounting procedures, recordkeeping procedures and monitoring procedures; and
  - (c) MF shall provide general advice and direction upon request as to the availability of assistance in the areas of advertising and public relations, business management and/or fund raising.
- 1.6. MF shall work cooperatively with Milwaukee County staff, department heads, public officials and with the Arts Groups toward the successful completion of the Arts Program.
- 1.7. MF shall recommend such changes in the guidelines and eligibility criteria for the Arts Program as it considers appropriate to the changing needs and circumstances of the Arts Program.

1.8. The Board acknowledges that, as a grant-making community trust, MF is currently screening and administering grants to arts groups in the greater Milwaukee community (including groups which are likely recipients of county funds) and that it is the expectation of the parties that the services to be performed by MF hereunder may be coordinated with, and performed as an incident to, the services presently provided by MF's staff in connection with the administration and supervision of MF's own community programs. The Board further agrees that if MF at any time determines, in its sole discretion, that the performance of services for the Board hereunder unreasonably burdens MF's staff and detracts from the ability of MF's staff members to perform their regular duties for MF, then MF may, upon ninety (90) days prior notice to the Board, terminate this Agreement. In the event of early termination of this Agreement, the total amount due to MF under paragraph 3.2., below, shall be prorated based upon the total number of months in which MF shall provide services hereunder. The Board shall pay to MF a total amount hereunder equal to Four Thousand One Hundred and Twenty-Five Dollars (\$4,125.00) per month for services rendered. If the amount paid to MF under paragraph 3.2., below is greater than the amount determined to be owing in accordance with this paragraph, MF agrees to refund any excess not later than the effective date of termination hereof. If MF elects to terminate this Agreement before May 17, 1987, effective after that date, the Board shall pay MF, on May

- 2. <u>RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE BOARD</u>. The Board shall have the following responsibilities hereunder:
- 2.1. The Board shall prepare the Contracts in a manner which conforms to the understanding outlined in the written summaries provided to the Board by MF under paragraph 1.3(c), above. After preparation and execution of the Contracts, the Board shall provide copies thereof to MF and shall indicate to MF, which funded programs, if any, shall not require MF's administrative services, pursuant to paragraph 1.3(d), above. Additionally, the Board shall obtain written receipts from the Arts Groups upon payment thereto and shall provide copies of such receipts to MF.
- 2.2. The Board agrees to indemnify and hold MF, the members of its Board, its Trustees and their respective employees and agents harmless from and against any and all claims, loss, damage, cost and expense (including reasonable attorneys fees and amounts paid in settlement with the Board's consent) which may be suffered or incurred by any of them as a result of any claim, action or proceeding relating to or arising out of the performance of services by MF hereunder, with the sole exception of any such claims, actions or proceedings arising out of any willful or negligent acts or omissions of MF, its Board, its Trustees and their respective agents or employees. Without limitation, the indemnification hereunder shall extend to any claims asserted against MF by any Arts

Group alleging nonperformance or otherwise arising out of any Contract between the Board and such Arts Group. MF agrees to indemnify and hold the Board, the members of the Board and its employees and agents harmless from and against any and all claims, loss, damage, cost and expense which may be suffered or incurred by any of them as a result of willful or negligent acts or omissions of MF or its agents or employees arising out of MF's duties hereunder.

- 2.3. The Board shall work cooperatively with MF staff to assure that MF is able to properly provide its services hereunder.
  - 3. TERM OF AGREEMENT AND PAYMENT FOR SERVICES.
- 3.1. Subject to termination as provided in Paragraph 1.8, above, the term of this Agreement shall be one year and shall run from October 15, 1986 through October 14, 1987. It is understood that MF's responsibilities hereunder shall relate only to the Arts Fund (as defined above) for 1987 and shall not relate to any programs funded out of 1986 or 1988 Milwaukee County budget dollars.

Compensation shall be payable in two (2) equal installments of Twenty-four Thousand Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$24,750.00) each, the first payment to be made upon signing the contract and the second to be made on May 15, 1987. understood that this Agreement may only be extended beyond October 14, 1987 by written agreement of the parties and that, in the event of an extension hereof, additional compensation shall be paid to MF in accordance with the terms negotiated at that time.

- 4. MF REPORTING REQUIREMENTS. MF hereby agrees to report to the Board in the following manner:

MF agrees to notify the Board of the individuals who will maintain the records and reports required under this Agreement and who will be supervising the administration of the Arts Program on behalf of MF. MF shall inform the Board of any change in any such person within fifteen (15) days of said change.
- 4.3. MF agrees that it will retain all financial and business records relating to this Agreement for a period of six (6) years following the completion of this Agreement; provided, however, that if MF desires to dispose of any such records prior to the expiration of such period, MF shall give a written notice to the Board offering to deliver such records to the Board, and may thereafter destroy or otherwise dispose of any such records which are not claimed by the Board within sixty (60) days after delivery of such

notice. The Board may, upon request, at reasonable times and upon reasonable intervals, inspect the records of MF as they relate to the services provided hereunder and MF shall make such records available to the Board and the Board's auditor upon the Board's request. MF shall also make available to the Board its annual audited financial statements upon the Board's request.

### 5. NONDISCRIMINATORY PROVISIONS.

MF agrees that the provisions of Section 56.17 of the Milwaukee County General Ordinances, as set forth in the attached Certificate of Compliance (attached hereto as Appendix A), is incorporated herein by reference.

- 6. <u>ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS</u>. The Board and MF furthermore mutually agree as follows:
- 6.1. The Board and MF assure and certify to the other party hereto that they, respectively, possess the authority to execute this Agreement.
- 6.2. MF assures and certifies that it will establish safeguards to protect against employees and participants from using their positions for private gain for themselves or others.
- 6.3. MF understands that this Agreement in no way affects MF's obligation to comply with all applicable laws, ordinances and codes of the federal, state and local governments.

6.5. MF agrees that it will procure and thereafter maintain worker's compensation, employer's liability, comprehensive general liability (bodily injury) and property damage in amounts satisfactory to the Board, and such other insurances as may be required by law in amounts satisfactory to the Board; however, it is understood that such amounts will be reasonable under the circumstances. The comprehensive liability insurance policy shall be for a minimum of \$500,000, procured, maintained and enforced during the lifetime of the Agreement and naming Milwaukee County as additional insured. A copy of the Insurance Certificate must be furnished to the Board not later than MF's receipt of the first payment hereunder.

6.6. It is further understood and agreed that MF is an independent contractor and not the agent or the employee of the Board. All personnel performing the services contemplated by the Agreement shall be the employees of MF and not of the Board and MF will make all necessary provisions for the payment of their salaries and for the withholding of appropriate deductions for state and federal income tax, social security and, in addition thereto, shall provide worker's compensation insurance and all other prerequisites of the employer-employee relationship.

All personnel performing the services contemplated by the Agreement shall be the employees of MF and not of the Board and MF will make all necessary provisions for the payment of their salaries and for the withholding of appropriate deductions for state and federal income tax, social security and, in addition thereto, shall provide worker's compensation insurance and all other prerequisites of the employer-employee relationship.

This document and attached implementing resolution represents our joint recommendations for restructuring the Milwaukee County Arts Program. The task of restructuring the county's approach to the Arts took considerable time and effort and involved input from several sources, to include individual County Board members, a consortium for the Performing Arts, representatives of the performing and visual arts community and our own personal observations and experience.

Frankly, when we introduced our separate resolutions (File No. 86-466 and File No. 86-463) at the June, 1986 County Board meeting, we had both hoped to have the question of restructuring addressed prior to the Board's summer recess. Regardless of the delays, the recommendations contained in the attached revised resolution provide a solid foundation from which the county in future years can build a viable county sponsored arts program that will encourage artistic diversity and excellence, yet remain flexible to provide support and encouragement for small groups, local performers and new and innovative entertainment, as well as to provide for efficient administration, sensitive to the needs of the County Board and meet the concerns of the Arts.

Since submitting our original separate proposals, we have had the opportunity to discuss our differences and jointly evaluate alternative proposals and options. Where possible, we have incorporated many of the suggestions submitted to us from the cultural community, however, not all alternatives and options could be incorporated into our final recommendations without seriously jeopardizing the County's Arts Program.

In summary, the recommendations contained in the attached resolution provide for the following:

 The County Board shall function as the policy setting body for Milwaukee County's cultural and artistic programming fund.

Lastly, we jointly agree that the \$3,000 allocation in 1986 for the Musicians Union to provide performances at the Child and Adolescent Treatment Center and at the Mental Health Center and other county facilities should be part of the Department of Health and Human Services 1987 budget. This program component originally proposed by Supervisor Dean is one that is not really open to the public and the performances are really part of a treatment program. This program category represents Milwaukee County's traditional approach to cultural programming. Under this category a contract(s) would be allocated on a noncompetitive basis with one or more local arts groups designed to deliver arts programming to Milwaukee County.

(2) Purchase of Service

This program category would provide Milwaukee County the opportunity to go beyond its traditional approach to cultural and artistic programming by allowing for a mix of arts programs based on public input, needs and wants. It is envisioned that this category would allow yearly opportunities to emphasize new priorities by County Board members and changing needs of the community.

Under this program allocation, Milwaukee County would on an annual basis determine the number and type of performances it desires to purchase through the solicitation of "Request for Proposals" based on approved eligibility criteria and guidelines.

## B. Endowments and Grants Component

Under this program, Milwaukee County recognizes that many fine professional performing arts organization exist in the community and contribute to the quality of life in this community. With the objective of promoting new and existing arts organizations, these grants are designed to help art groups to meet their operational and programming expenses.

This program includes three types of grants:

(1) Performing Arts Matching Grants. This grant program is designed to provide, with no quid pro quo requirements, a direct subsidy to professional performing arts organizations that meet established

criteria. Only groups with an annual operating budget of less than \$300,000, after exclusions itemized under section entitled "Criteria for Matching Grant" as contained in attached criteria and guidelines, will be eligible to apply for a direct subsidy grant.

- (2) United Performing Arts Fund (UPAF) Group Rental Subsidy. Under this program Milwaukee County would provide a direct hall rent subsidy as an incentive for professional arts groups to utilize the PAC. All funds under this account would be forwarded to the PAC. The PAC will, in turn, issue a rent credit in the appropriate amount for each group.
- (3) "County Arts Program" Subgrant. Under this program, an agency is asked to coordinate a County arts subgrant program involving County-based arts groups. Project grants and technical assistance are provided to individual artists, arts organizations not served by a major fund drive, and community organizations sponsoring arts programs, currently using criteria established by the Milwaukee Artists Foundation.
- 5. # MILWAUKEE COUNTY ARTS FUNDING

### General Overview

The Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors on October 2, 1986, established the Milwaukee County Cultural, Artistic and Musical Programming Advisory Council (CAMPAC), as an advisory council to the Chairman of the County Board, the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture and the full Board. The primary purpose of the council is to advise the Board on how best to allocate budgeted county funds to community arts groups through purchase of services, endowments and grants for the provision of cultural arts programs that best serve and enhance the quality of life in the community.

CAMPAC consists of seven <u>nine</u> members with an interest in the arts appointed by the County Board chairperson and confirmed by the full Board. No paid staff members or board members or any arts agencies receiving funding from Milwaukee County may serve on the council.

The County Board of Supervisors has delegated to a single authority, authorized the Chairperson of the Board, responsibility for the authority to enter into a contract with The Milwaukee Foundation for the purpose of administering all cultural funds. The County Board has annually appropriated property tax funds to support and encourage cultural and artistic activities in this community. The Board's long standing financial commitment to the arts is based on the belief that such activities have a direct relationship to the economic well being and quality of life of the community.

This commitment, however, should not be construed to lock the County in future budget years to the previous years funding level. It is the desire of the County Board, on an annual basis, to reexamine this commitment to ensure that our cultural dollars provide the best mix possible, maintaining and supporting those traditional activities long identified in the community, while yet remaining flexible to provide support and encouragement for small groups, local performers artists and new and innovative entertainment. Funding by the County carries no commitment for future support beyond the term of the project.

CAMPAC, under authority granted by the County Board, will use the following rules and guidelines in making their recommendations to the County Board through the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture.

### CULTURAL, ARTISTIC AND MUSICAL PROGRAMMING (Purchase of Service and Music Under the Stars)

### Eligibility

- A. Any organization submitting proposals to Milwaukee County through its administrative agent, The Milwaukee Foundation, for funding under the Purchase of Services program must conform to the following eligibility rules:

- B. Traditional cultural programming under the auspices of "Music Under the Stars" shall be proposed to the County using the Gounty's CAMPAC's purchase of service application format. The agency shall conform to the above eligibility requirements.

Programs and Services A. Milwaukee County shall award Purchase of Service contracts for the presentation of events which conform to the following guidelines: 1. Events are designed expected to reach audiences of 500 or more per performance, exhibition or event- commensurate with funding levels, and in proportion to norms for individual art forms. 2. Events are designed to reach a broad range of the county's residents, including those residents whose economic resources are severely restricted or limited. 3. Events should take place in county owned facilities on county owned land, or in other locations designed for use by a broad public. Priority will be given to those groups which use County facilities for some or all of their performances. B. "Music Under the Stars" awards are made on a noncompetitive basis for traditional Milwaukee County programming. Funding for the Artistic Consultant for Milwaukee County to Music Under the Stars is included in the appropriation. Criteria for Awarding Contracts Milwaukee County reserves the right to approve/disapprove awarding contracts to organizations making application for provision of cultural programming based upon the criteria listed below. 1. Quality of the event proposed. Evidence of quality shall include: - critical response to the applicant's recent work - evaluation of previous county sponsored events, if any - freshness appropriateness of the event proposed to the target audience - educational or entertainment value of the event 2. Geographic distribution of the events underwritten. The County Board will consider the need to offer events in a variety of neighborhoods and locations. 3. Balance of artistic genres. The County Board will consider the need to underwrite a variety of artistic genres, styles, and flavors in selecting events to be underwritten. Care will be taken to consider the cultural diversity of the audiences served. - 3 -

#### Application

All applications for the **Purchase of Service** program shall be complete when submitted to The Milwaukee Foundation. They must be properly signed, with fifteen sufficient copies submitted by deadline date with all required documentation as indicated on the application form. Additional information or documentation may be requested by Milwaukee County.

The funding process is competitive and many deserving proposals may not be funded for the total amount requested. Previous financial support from Milwaukee County would not necessarily guarantee continued funding.

In reviewing applications, Milwaukee Gounty The Milwaukee Foundation and CAMPAC evaluates individual proposals based upon service and access to the public, community interest and support for the project, compatibility of proposal and related County Board objectives, and availability of comparable services in the community. The County Board, through the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture and GAMPAG also will review each project application recommended by CAMPAC with regard to the feasibility and quality of the proposal, the "track record" of the applicant organization's ability to provide the proposed service, and a careful analysis of project and organizational budgets.

Milwaukee County encourages the development of proposals which demonstrate a willingness to cooperate with other agencies through collaborative programs or services and those showing additional sources of financial support for the proposal.



Restrictions on Funds At this time, there are no formal restrictions on the use of funds received under the Matching Grant program. Application All applications submitted to The Milwaukee Foundation made under the Performing Arts Matching Grant program shall be complete when submitted. They must be properly signed, and fifteen sufficient copies submitted by the deadline date with all required documentation as indicated on the application form. Absolutely no late applications will be accepted. The Gounty Board Milwaukee Foundation, through CAMPAC, and the Gommittee on Parks, Recreation and Gulture, will review each application and make recommendation as to grant award to the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture and County Board. Contracts There will be no formal contract between Milwaukee County and the Matching Grant recipients. However, an "Acknowledgement of Receipt of Funding" form must be signed by both The Managing Director The Milwaukee Foundation and Board Chairperson of the funded organization. This further requires the organization to submit its year end report containing financial statements and a list of performances, performance sites and estimated audiences. Payments will be made within three weeks of County Board approval of Matching Grant awards. - 8 -

Grants will be awarded on a sliding scale with smaller organizations receiving a proportionately larger grant. The actual grant awarded will depend on the number of organizations that qualify for support. The more that qualify, the smaller the individual award.

## Allowable Expenses

In the Matching Grant program, funds are intended to support the organization's general operations, not specific programs.

## Restrictions on Funds

At this time, there are no formal restrictions on the use of funds received under the Matching Grant program.

## Application

All applications made under the **Performing Arts Matching Grant** program shall be complete when submitted. They must be properly signed, and fifteen copies submitted by the deadline date with all required documentation as indicated on the application form. Absolutely no late applications will be accepted.

The County Board, through CAMPAC and the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture, will review each application.

#### Contracts

There will be no formal contract between Milwaukee County and the Matching Grant recipients. However, an "Acknowledgement of Receipt of Funding" form must be signed by both the Managing Director and Board Chairperson of the funded organization. This further requires the organization to submit its year end report containing financial statements and a list of performances, performance sites and estimated audiences. Payments will be made within three weeks of County Board approval of Matching Grant awards.

## General Overview

The Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors on July 17, 1986, established the Milwaukee County Cultural, Artistic and Musical Programming Advisory Council (CAMPAC), as an advisory council to the Chairman of the County Board, the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture and the full Board. The primary purpose of the council is to advise the Board on how best to allocate budgeted county funds to community arts groups through purchase of services, endowments and grants for the provision of cultural arts programs that best serve and enhance the quality of life in the community.

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This commitment, however, should not be construed to lock the County in future budget years to the previous years funding level. It is the desire of the County Board, on an <u>annual basis</u>, to reexamine this commitment to ensure that our cultural dollars provide the best mix possible, maintaining and supporting those traditional activities long identified in the community, while yet remaining flexible to provide support and encouragement for small groups, local performers and new and innovative entertainment. Funding by the County carries no commitment for future support beyond the term of the project.

CAMPAC, under authority granted by the County Board, will use the following rules and guidelines in making their recommendations to the County Board through the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture.

- A. Milwaukee County shall award Purchase of Service contracts for the presentation of events which conform to the following guidelines:
  - Events are designed expected to reach audiences of 500 or more per performance; exhibition or event, commensurate with funding levels, and in proportion to norms for individual art forms.
  - Events are designed to reach a broad range of the county's residents, including those residents whose economic resources are severely restricted or limited.
  - 3. Events should take place in county owned facilities on county owned land, or in other locations designed for use by a broad public. Priority will be given to those groups which use County facilities for some or all of their performances.
- B. "Music Under the Stars" awards are made on a noncompetitive basis for traditional Milwaukee County programming. Funding for the Artistic Consultant for Milwaukee County to Music Under the Stars is included in the appropriation.

## Criteria for Awarding Contracts

Milwaukee County reserves the right to approve/disapprove awarding contracts to organizations making application for provision of cultural programming based upon the criteria listed below.

- 1. Quality of the event proposed. Evidence of quality shall include:
  - critical response to the applicant's recent work
  - evaluation of previous county sponsored events, if any
  - freshness of the event proposed to the target audience
  - educational or entertainment value of the event
- Geographic distribution of the events underwritten. The County Board will consider the need to offer events in a variety of neighborhoods and locations.
- 3. Balance of artistic genres. The County Board will consider the need to underwrite a variety of artistic genres, styles, and flavors in selecting events to be underwritten. Care will be taken to consider the cultural diversity of the audiences served.

- 4. Effectiveness of the plan for broad public access. The County Board requires an admissions plan which ensures the access of individuals of restricted economic resources. Plans may stipulate free admission to all, free admission to selected portions of the audience, reduced rate approaches, ticket vouchers, or the like. Applicants should explain their approach and rationale in detail.
- 5. Balance of Audiences Served. The County Board will attempt to balance its program to serve a variety of audiences including various ethnic groups, various age groups, and residents both in the community and living in restricted settings.

## Allowable Expenses

In contracting for services, the following costs are eligible for support:

- 1. artistic fees and benefits
- administrative fees and benefits not to exceed 15% of the Project's budget
- 3. technical personnel fees and benefits
- direct expenses for the production, exhibition, or event including supplies, space rental, royalties, printed programs or catalogs, equipment rental, etc.
- 5. promotional costs
- 6. insurance and bonding.

## Restrictions on Funds

Milwaukee County will not provide funds to reduce existing deficits, or subsidize activities, operating and administrative expenses unrelated to the contract award. Milwaukee County does not provide funds for direct grants, tuition or fellowships to individuals, fund-raising efforts, interest or litigation costs, prizes, entertainment or funds for projects which discriminate against or preclude any group.

Milwaukee County does not fund:

- 1. Capital Projects or expenditures (over \$500)
- 2. Benefit performances, exhibitions or events
- 3. Refreshments

#### Application

All applications for the **Purchase of Service** program shall be complete when submitted. They must be properly signed, with fifteen copies submitted by deadline date with all required documentation as indicated on the application form. Additional information or documentation may be requested by Milwaukee County.

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Milwaukee County encourages the development of proposals which demonstrate a willingness to cooperate with other agencies through collaborative programs or services and those showing additional sources of financial support for the proposal.

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The contract must be signed by both the County's designated administrative agent Board Chairman, and by the individual authorized to sign by the organization under contract.

8. Shall have independent fund-raising capabilities and demonstrate same by raising contributions from outside sources. 9. Be able to focus on the employment of local talent originating from or residing in Milwaukee County, be able to demonstrate new and innovative ideas for providing community entertainment with limited resources and should attempt to use County facilities for some or all of the performances. B. Eligibility for the PAC WPAF Group Rental Subsidy is determined by use of the PAC and is recommended by the Performing Arts Center to the County Board, through CAMPAC and the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture. C. Eligibility under the "County Arts Program" subgrant is currently determined using criteria established by the Milwaukee Artists Foundation's "1985 County Arts Program Guidelines" (see Exhibit 1). Recommendations are submitted to the County Board through CAMPAC and the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture. Programs and Services A. Under the Performing Arts Matching Grant program, any performing arts organization capable of generating a stream of revenue from existing sources is considered by Milwaukee County to be worthy of support. Grants are made on a matching basis and are intended to support the organization's general operations. B. PAC UPAF Group Rental Subsidy is used for hall rental by professional arts groups utilizing the Performing Arts Center. C. Individual artists, arts organizations not served by a major fund drive and community organizations sponsoring arts programs are eligible under the "County Arts Program" Subgrant. Allowable expenses, restrictions on funds, application, reporting and contractual arrangements are all made between the subgrant administrator and the qualifying arts group. Criteria for Matching Grant Milwaukee County's grant under the Performing Arts Matching Grant program will be based on an organization's operating income, considering both earned and contributed income, excepting the following: 1. in-kind contributions 2. income dedicated to capital improvement (i.e. purchase of real estate, construction or purchases of equipment costing over 3. contributions for an endowment campaign 4. contributions received for regranting - 7 -

We applaud the interest of members of the County Board to restructure the County's arts programs into a more focused and effective entity. 



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

The Council shall be advisory to the County Board, the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture, and consist of seven members, all of whom shall have an interest in the arts. Appointments to the Council shall be made by the Chairman of the County Board and confirmed by the full Board. Of the persons so appointed, the initial terms of three members shall be for two years, and those of the remaining four members shall be for four years, so that all appointments to CAMPAC do not expire at one time. Dear Chairman Ament:

I have read your report of June 19 and its attachments with great interest. The direction you propose -- administrative consolidation and focusing of limited resources -- is necessary.

I am particularly pleased to read your statements regarding "the important role this Board believes that [the arts] have on economic well being and quality-of-life" and "remaining flexible enough to provide support and encouragement for small groups, local performers, and new and innovative entertainment medium."

The Milwaukee Artists Foundation (MAF) couldn't agree more. Artists and arts organizations are a significant resource, able at this point to play an important part in shaping the entire community's future. Even in this era of Federal and State "squeezes" it is possible for Milwaukee to become one of the professional art centers of the country, bringing with it the national attention that amateur sports have brought to Indianapolis.

The resources are here and the process, to a certain extent, has begun. To take a position of national leadership and effective local development, it is time to examine how Milwaukee County can achieve a true public/private partnership by meshing the resources of County government with major non-profit agencies. Such a process can make best use of all of the community's resources.

In line with this, the MAF's major interest is that administrative consolidation take place in a way that meets government's concerns and maximizes benefits for the entire community. This is where the critical issue lies. We think that the County can meet its administrative needs and establish important leadership directions for the community.

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AMEDITING DISSIPTION

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For your information, I have enclosed a copy of the history and description of the MAF. Also enclosed is a report on the sucessfully completed application, review, and recommendation panel process run by the MAF for the County Arts Program. It illustrates a number of points: the size and complexity of just one of the County's programs, the need for more than one staff member to effectively run the mechanics of the process, the need for discipline based panels, and the ability of the MAF.

Finally, enclosed is a copy of the current guidelines developed by the MAF for the Milwaukee Foundation's first year of their Fund for the Arts, an operating support program. It illustrates these points: a compatability of guidelines with the County's matching grant program that would make public/private meshing relatively easy; clear and effective panel membership criteria; and a special set of criteria for new organizations.

The MAF was able to develop these guidelines through an interactive process involving artists, the Milwaukee Foundation, and other current community efforts. As you will note, the Milwaukee Foundation retains policy and decision making control.

It was while developing these guidelines that the MAF realized the benefits to the community that could be derived from a cooperative application and "fund-pooling" process involving major supporters of non-UPAF artists and arts organizations.

The MAF is dedicated to developing stable community support for Milwaukee's professional artists and arts organizations. We see such a cooperative as a key means of developing such support. With such support, Milwaukee can move ahead by utilizing the arts as one of our unique resources to shape a positive future for the entire community.

In addition to examining ways to create an effective public/private partnership, there are a number of questions about the current proposal that we feel must be addressed before the County Board takes final action on this matter. Some examples of these questions are:

- 1. What criteria will assure a balance of disciplines, knowledge, and community representation within the council? How long will members serve?
- 2. Can any group of seven volunteers effectively deal with the wide range of proposals? With a volume of proposals greater than 100?
- 3. Does the proposed body basically duplicate other processes already operating effectively within the community?

- 4. How could one person credibly administer allocations, coordinate cultural events, provide technical assistance, monitor performance, serve as staff to the Board, serve as staff to an advisory council, and run the application process?
- 5. Could this administration be better done, and more cost-effectively accomplished, by contracting a service that already is being done privately within the community?
- 6. Why should organizations receiving an appropriation less than their total expenses hire only local performers?
- 7. What is the meaning of the phrase "contracts(s) would be awarded on a non-competitive basis"? Why was this method suggested for only one program? What advantages does non-competition create? What disadvantages?

These are questions asked to help you, your fellow Supervisors, the County's citizens, and its artists get the most out of the new directions that are proposed.

To allow time to answer questions and to consider ways to best consolidate and use all of the community's resources, we will be asking the Parks, Finance, Personnel, and Audit committees to lay the matter over.

We are very pleased that you and the County Board both see and support the arts for their many benefits to the people and the development of Milwaukee County.

I look forward to discussing this matter with you.

#### HISTORY AND DESCRIPTION

The Milwaukee Artists Foundation (MAF) is an arts service and support organization for the greater Milwaukee area. The MAF exists to develop a community of support for the diversity of the area's professional visual and performing artists and arts groups. To do this, it continually seeks the means to support, nurture, publicize, advocate for, and represent Milwaukee area artists, their achievements, needs, and many benefits to the quality and development of the community.

The MAF is unique in its ability to carry out this role for Milwaukee. No other arts organization in the area can work as effectively across the broad range of artistic and political spectra. Allied to no one group or grouping, independent of any political structure, and committed to all the arts, the MAF has the flexibility to develop networking, advocacy, and development crucial to the arts. Organizationally, the MAF retains the entrepreneurial quality that allows it to adjust rapidly to the needs of the arts.

Begun in 1977 as the Arts Development Council, the organization's original purpose was to administer Milwaukee County's Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) arts program. With the decline of CETA and the creation of a joint program with the Milwaukee Public Schools, the organization's mission was broadened, and its name was changed to the Milwaukee Artists Foundation. The MAF now serves individual professional artists as well as emerging, small, and medium-sized professional arts organizations.

The MAF is the only Milwaukee arts organization whose program thrusts change as it continually attempts to seize opportunities for its constituents in the areas of financial support, individual development, publicity, advocacy, and representation. The MAF's current goals are these:

- A. Establish the tenet of Milwaukee's arts as a whole fabric, <u>all</u> of whose components require support.
- B. Seek and administer funds to support professional performing artists.

4. beginning work to create a joint approach to arts funding for individual artists along with emerging, small, and medium-sized arts groups;

5. developing Showcasing Community Arts, a project to market the works of Wisconsin visual and performing artists to business (and bring cash to the artists);

6. managing "Lincoln Center for the Arts", a Milwaukee Public Schools' program that offers studio and performance space to a varied group of working visual and performing artists who also function in an educational capacity;

 studying a survey on space needs done recently by Future Milwuakee, a local community interest group;

8. and planning an MAF newsletter.

Beyond these programs, the MAF hopes to identify and develop new spaces for artists, create new marketing approaches to boost the arts, create a joint box office for its constituency, and improve informational resource services for Milwaukee's arts.

#### MAF OPERATING STRUCTURE

The MAF is a private, non-stock, not-for-profit corporation operated by a twenty-four member board of directors. It is a working board with five standing committees: Development, Program, Finance, Nominating, and Executive. Members of the

board are drawn from throughout the community and represent the arts, education, politics, and business. The board is self-perpetuating, with members serving a maximum of two three-year terms.

The current MAF staff consists of an executive director (full-time), program coordinator (full-time), office manager (part-time), Showcasing Community Art coordinator (part-time), and two assistant office managers (part-time). In addition, the MAF plans to hire a full-time development director beginning with its upcoming 1986-87 fiscal year. Bookkeeping services are contracted, and there are regular audits.

Funding for the MAF comes from a variety of sources: Milwaukee County, foundation support, private contributions, and earned income. In the current fiscal year, ending June 30, it is anticipated that the MAF will break even. In the upcoming year, the Development Committee will be considering additional ways to increase the MAF's self-sufficiency.

#### MAF'S OVERALL ROLE IN MILWAUKEE

The MAF's growth and development is in keeping with the recent study titled Goals for Greater Milwaukee 2000, a community-wide assessment of the elements vital to Milwaukee's success in the future. The study says the following:

Goals 2000 recommends the establishment of a Regional Arts Council to support and promote individual and organizational arts development in the four county region [Milwaukee, Ozaukee, Washington, and Waukesha]. The purposes of the Council are to study the needs for arts programming, develop creative community planning, act as an advocate for the arts, promote private and public financial support and aid in establishing local priorities. The Council should be a strong voice on behalf of individual artists and performing arts organizations.

The role of the MAF, is precisely in keeping with the directions cited above. With a new executive director and a strengthened board, the MAF is committed to successfully serving the people and artists of greater Milwaukee.

#### MILWAUKEE FOUNDATION FUND FOR THE ARTS:

#### 1986 PROGRAM GUIDELINES

#### I. INTRODUCTION

The Fund for the Arts has been created by the Milwaukee Foundation to serve as a permanent source of support for small and medium sized arts organizations in the metropolitan Milwaukee area. It has been established as a result of a challenge grant awarded to the Foundation by the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA). Under the terms of this grant, the Milwaukee Foundation will receive \$35,000 a year for four years, beginning in 1986, on the condition that it raise twice that amount each year in new private dollars. The Milwaukee Foundation plans to exceed the minimum yearly goal and raise at least \$500,000 by 1989, thus creating an endowment which will be able indefinitely to provide yearly grants at the current level or better.

This fund is expected to be an important resource for both new and existing organizations. It should result in a greater depth and diversity of the arts in the Milwaukee community and make the arts more accessible to its residents.

Having met the first year match requirement, the Milwaukee Foundation is now inviting applications from qualified organizations for the \$35,000 in NEA funds. The Milwaukee Foundation will be assisted in the application and review process by the Milwaukee Artists Foundation (MAF). The Milwaukee Artists Foundation will coordinate application procedures, technical assistance, and the review panel process. Recommendations resulting from this process will be made to the Milwaukee Foundation whose board of directors will make all final decisions regarding support for applicants.

#### II. PURPOSE

Milwaukee is fortunate to have a number of dynamic and high caliber arts organizations that contribute to its cultural richness and diversity. Many of these are small and medium sized organizations whose impact on the community is typically much greater than the size of their budgets. Many of them have served Milwaukee for ten, fifteen, or more years. In any season, they reach a collective audience of more than 300,000 people. A number of them have brought national and international recognition to Milwaukee.

Traditionally, however, they have had less access to the funding support that all organizations need in order to maximize their benefit to the community. They have been particularly affected by a lack of adequate operating support.

The purpose of the Fund for the Arts is to provide a permanent source of support for small and medium sized arts organizations, in order to enhance both artistic quality and financial stability.

The objectives of the Fund are two-fold:

- promote a professional arts scene for Milwaukee that is filled with diversity, excellence, and exploration;
- encourage a professional arts community whose activities include "traditional" members, minorities, children, those with low incomes, and those with special needs;

There are two means by which this will be accomplished in 1986. The first is the distribution of the NEA funds, perhaps in combination with other Milwaukee Foundation monies, in the form of operating support to qualifying small and medium sized organizations. The second is the creation of a panel to interact with all applicants.

By distributing operating support and interacting with applicants, the Fund will:

- assist to stabilize, maintain, and further develop existing professional arts organizations whose artistic contributions to the community are of high merit and who have a history of managerial excellence;
- assist in the emergence of new organizations of high quality and excellent potential;
- help to improve the management and business capabilities of professional arts organizations.

#### III. ELIGIBILITY AND REVIEW CRITERIA

In general, professional nonprofit arts organizations located and working in the Milwaukee area are eligible for operating support from the Fund for the Arts. The term "professional arts organizations" refers to the full range of arts groups, including producing companies, presenting agencies, galleries and service groups. There are two classes of arts organizations that would be considered for funding: existing organizations, defined as those who have been in continuous operation for the previous three fiscal years; and emerging organizations, defined as those who have been in continuous operation for the previous 18 months, but less than three years.

The following are the respective eligibility requirements and review criteria for these two groups.

#### A. Existing Organizations

- 1. Eligibility requirements for existing organizations are:
  - a. the primary purpose must be the production and/or presentation of the arts to the general public, or the support of professional artists that do so;

- b. the equivalent of one paid staff member on an annual basis and payment of professional artistic personnel;
- c. tax exempt status under Section 501 (c)(3) of the
- d. continuous operation for the previous three fiscal years;
- e. formal approval of Fund for the Arts application by the board of directors;
- f. total annual operating budget of less than \$300,000.
- 2. In reviewing existing organizations, the panel will consider the following criteria:

  - b. the quality and effectiveness of the organization's business management;
  - c. demonstrated ability to develop and maintain a stable funding base through earnings and contributed income;

#### IV. GENERAL FUNDING POLICIES

#### B. Term of Support

Fund for the Arts support carries no commitment for future support beyond the terms stipulated in the grant agreement.

#### C. Use of Funds

Operating support is, in general, unrestricted support to be applied by the organization in the way it deems most effective. Some examples of how it may be used are: salaries and fees, honoraria, production and related expenses, administrative costs, utility charges, year-round and short-term space and equipment rental, travel costs, marketing and publicity.

Fund for the Arts support may <u>not</u> be used for such purposes as: scholarships, fellowships, tuition assistance or student projects; long-standing accumulated debts; political activities and support; anything that is in violation of applicable local, state or federal law.

#### V. REVIEW PANEL

#### A. Membership

The review panel will be composed of nine members drawn from the Milwaukee Foundation's Board and staff, the Milwaukee Artists Foundation Board, artists, arts advocates, arts administrators, business people, and community leaders. The following stipulations will apply to panel membership and composition:

- a. Three of the panel members will be working artists
- b. Panel members will be appointed for three year terms. Terms will be staggered so that one-third of the panel will be replaced each year.
- c. No member may serve successive full terms on the panel without being off the panel for at least one year.
- d. Conflict of interest rules used by the Milwaukee Foundation will govern all panelists and review proceedings.
- e. The Milwaukee Artists Foundation Program Committee will work with the Milwaukee Foundation staff to develop panel member recommendations for the Milwaukee Foundation Board, which shall have final approval of all panel members.

#### B. Responsibilities

The panel shall be responsible for the following:

- a. Determination of those organizations that qualify for Fund support, following the criteria in these guidelines.
- b. Recommendation to the Milwaukee Foundation of support amounts for each qualifying organization, both emerging and existing.
- c. Referring applicants not receiving support to programs that can assist them to prepare for future qualification. Examples of such programs are the Milwaukee Management Support Organization (MMSO), Milwaukee Associates in Urban Development (MAUD), and the Association of College, University Arts Administrators (ACUCAA).
- d. Receiving an interim report from each of the organizations receiving support from the Fund.
- e. Attending at least two events by each organization receiving Fund support. (This refers to the panel as a whole, whose members may work out how to achieve it among themselves.)
- f. Advising the Milwaukee Foundation on ways in which to improve both Fund guidelines and overall community operational support for these arts groups.

In all matters to be decided by the panel, a simple majority shall be required for approval.

Late or incomplete applications will not be reviewed. C. All applications will be checked for eligibility and completeness and forwarded to the review panel, with incomplete and ineligible applications noted as such. The panel will not review incomplete and ineligible applications, except to verify their status. D. After an initial review, panel comments will be summarized and communicated to applicants. E. Applicants will have an opportunity to speak with the panel at an open hearing, when the panel meets a second time to make its recommendations. Following the hearing, the panel will consider each application and make a recorded decision based on the purpose, criteria, and funding policies set forth in these Guidelines. F. Dear Chairman Ament:

I have read your report of June 19 and its attachments with great interest. The direction you propose -- administrative consolidation and focusing of limited resources -- is necessary.

I am particularly pleased to read your statements regarding "the important role this Board believes that [the arts] have on economic well being and quality-of-life" and "remaining flexible enough to provide support and encouragement for small groups, entertainment medium."

The Milwaukee Artists Foundation (MAF) couldn't agree more. Artists and arts organizations are a significant resource, able at this point to play an important part in shaping the entire community's future. Even in this era of Federal and State "squeezes" it is possible for Milwaukee to become one of the professional art centers of the country, bringing with it the national attention that amateur sports have brought to Indianapolis.

The resources are here and the process, to a certain extent, has begun. To take a position of national leadership and effective local development, it is time to examine how Milwaukee County can achieve a true public/private partnership by meshing the resources of County government with major non-profit agencies. Such a process can make best use of all of the community's resources.

In line with this, the MAF's major interest is that administrative consolidation take place in a way that meets government's concerns and maximizes been fits for the entire community. This is where the critical issue lies. We think that the County can meet its administrative needs and establish important leadership directions for the community.

Chairman F. Thomas Ament June 26. 1986 -- Page Two For your information, I have enclosed a copy of the history and description of the MAF. Also enclosed is a report on the sucessfully completed application, review, and recommendation panel process run by the MAF for the County Arts Program. It illustrates a number of points: the size and complexity of just one of the County's programs, the need for more than one staff member to effectively run the mechanics of the process, the need for discipline based panels, and the ability of the MAF. Finally, enclosed is a copy of the current guidelines developed by the MAF for the Milwaukee Foundation's first year of their Fund for the Arts, an operating support program. It illustrates these points: a compatability of guidelines with the County's matching grant program that would make public/private meshing relatively easy; clear and effective panel membership criteria; and a special set of criteria for new organizations. The MAF was able to develop these guidelines through an interactive process involving artists, the Milwaukee Foundation, and other current community efforts. As you will note, the Milwaukee Foundation retains policy and decision making control. It was while developing these guidelines that the MAF realized the benefits to the community that could be derived from a cooperative application and "fund-pooling" process involving major supporters of non-UPAF artists and arts organizations. The MAF is dedicated to developing stable community support for Milwaukee's professional artists and arts organizations. We see such a cooperative as a key means of developing such support. With such support, Milwaukee can move ahead by utilizing the arts as one of our unique resources to shape a positive future for the entire community. In addition to examining ways to create an effective public/private partnership, there are a number of questions about the current proposal that we feel must be addressed before the County Board takes final action on this matter. Some examples of these questions are: 1. What criteria will assure a balance of disciplines, knowledge, and community representation within the council? How long will members serve? 2. Can any group of seven volunteers effectively deal with the wide range of proposals? With a volume of proposals greater than 100? 3. Does the proposed body basically duplicate other processes already operating effectively within the community?

- 4. How could one person credibly administer allocations, coordinate cultural events, provide technical assistance, monitor performance, serve as staff to the Board, serve as staff to an advisory council, and run the application process?
- 5. Could this administration be better done, and more cost-effectively accomplished, by contracting a service that already is being done privately within the community?
- 6. Why should organizations receiving an appropriation less than their total expenses hire only local performers?
- 7. What is the meaning of the phrase "contracts(s) would be awarded on a non-competitive basis"? Why was this method suggested for only one program? What advantages does non-competition create? What disadvantages?

These are questions asked to help you, your fellow Supervisors, the County's citizens, and its artists get the most out of the new directions that are proposed.

To allow time to answer questions and to consider ways to best consolidate and use all of the community's resources, we will be asking the Parks, Finance, Personnel, and Audit committees to lay the matter over.

We are very pleased that you and the County Board both see and support the arts for their many benefits to the people and the development of Milwaukee County.

I look forward to discussing this matter with you.

These goals were developed from 1985 MAF Board planning meetings, constituents' voiced needs, and the obversations of the President and Executive Director. They are multi-year goals with 1986-87 objectives. To accomplish these goals, the MAF is currently:

1. acting as lead agency for the Milwaukee Arts Challenge Alliance, a joint fundraising effort for fourteen professional arts organizations. The 1986 joint fundraising goal is \$150,000:

2. administering the County Arts Program, a re-grant program that has made awards to a wide range of individual artists and arts groups. The MAF has administered this program since its creation five years ago. This year, the MAF will administer the re-granting of over \$48.000:

3. working with the Milwaukee Foundation to develop guidelines for and implementation of the first year of their Fund for the Arts. The goal of the Fund is to create a \$500,000 endowment for the large number of professional arts groups that are too small to create a functional endowment for themselves. Through this program, \$35,000 will be

4. beginning work to create a joint approach to arts funding for individual artists along with emerging, small, and medium-sized arts groups:

5. developing Showcasing Community Arts, a project to market the works of Wisconsin visual and performing artists to business (and bring cash to the artists):

6. managing "Lincoln Center for the Arts", a Milwaukee Public Schools' program that offers studio and performance space to a varied group of working visual and performing artists who also function in an educational capacity;

7. studying a survey on space needs done recently by Future Milwuakee, a local community interest group:

8. and planning an MAF newsletter.

Beyond these programs, the MAF hopes to identify and develop new spaces for artists, create new marketing approaches to boost the arts, create a joint box office for its constituency, and improve informational resource services for Milwaukee's arts.

#### MAF OPERATING STRUCTURE

The MAF is a private, non-stock, not-for-profit corporation operated by a twenty-four member board of directors. It is a working board with five standing committees: Development, Program, Finance, Nominating, and Executive. Members of the

All applications were received at the Milwaukee Artists Foundation office until 5:00 p.m. on May 16, the deadline. On May 22 and 23, packets containing complete copies of all application material were delivered to panelists.

Both panels held their first meetings on May 29 at the Milwaukee Art Museum, which contributed meeting rooms, audio-visual equipment, and beverages. An evening meal was contributed by Benjamin's Too.

At the May 29 meeting, each panel accomplished the following: introductions, appointment or selection of a chairperson, viewing work samples and support materials, discussion of guidelines and procedures for review of applications, discussion of proposals, and developing questions, if any, for each proposal. Richard Ryan chaired the Performance Art Panel and Terrence Coffman chaired the Visual Arts Panel.

By June 1, a letter with panelists' questions was mailed to applicants from whom additional information was needed. Written responses were requested to be returned to the MAF office by June 11. On June 13, copies of all answers that had been received were delivered to each panel member.

On June 9, letters were mailed to all applicants informing them of the time and location for their one-on-one meeting with the appropriate panel. During the week of June 9, panel members were called to confirm the June 18 meeting.

On June 18, the panels held their final review meetings at the War Memorial Center. After meeting one half-hour in full session, each panel was split evenly to meet all applicants personnally -- for a maximum of ten minutes each. When all

applicants had been heard, each panel reassembled to make its recommendations to the MAF Board. The Art Museum again provided beverages. The MAF supplied an evening meal. The final review procedures within each panel are listed below. PERFORMANCE ARTS PANEL The panel discussed each application. Immediately after the discussion of each application, each panel member indicated his or her rating of it as either A, B, or C. The responses were then recorded by James Inde, the non-voting staff member. The thought behind the rankings was that an A signified the panelist would recommend full funding, if the money was available. B signified partial funding, if the money was available. C signified no funding. No "running tally" was kept. Each application was reviewed without regard to the rankings recorded before it. Only after all applications were reviewed was an overall ranking prepared. Applications were ranked as A, B, or C based on which designation had the highest number of responses from the panel. In cases of ties, the application was given the higher ranking. The grouping of applications was as follows: RANK "A": Antler, Milwaukee Chamber Music Society, Clavis Theatre, Elma Gonzales Radke, Ko-Thi Dance Company, Wisconsin Painters & Sculptors, People's Theatre, David Kenney, Friends Mime Theatre, Milwaukee Chamber Theatre, Colorlines, Theatre School, Paradox Studio Theatre, Theatre Tesseract, Bauer Contemporary Ballet, Thallis Hoyt Drake. RANK "B": Bruce Renner, Debra Loewen, Theatre X, Betty Salamun and Dancecircus, Milwaukee Music Ensemble, Milwaukee Opera Company. RANK "C": Next Generation Theatre, New Concepts "Each One Reach One", New Concepts "Kids Against Child Abuse", James Pease, Great Lakes Opera, Mary Mebane, Susie Bauer, Henri Deutsch, Dancecircus/Fine Arts Division of Alverno College. It was then determined that full funding for all those rated A would far exceed the money available for allocation, which was \$26,420. (See Appendix One, page 5.) The panel then voted -- 2 --

applicant will not be awarded a grant."

After this process, the panel unanimously adopted the following recommendations:

- The "first ten" applicants should each receive two-thirds of their request.
- II. The "second six" should receive \$1,410 each.
- III. Recipients should each be asked to submit a budget revised to account for the amount of County Arts Program funds granted. Should any recipient turn down the recommended grant, the MAF's Program Committee should decide where the returned money should be used.

In making these recommendations, the panel felt that it had achieved a decision that would assist the applicants' projects to take place and best fulfill the purposes and intents of the County Arts Program.

#### VISUAL ARTS PANEL

The panel discussed each application and gave it a tentative rating of A for full funding, B for partial funding, or C for no funding. The ratings were recorded by Julie Enslow, the non-voting MAF staff representative. After all applications were reviewed with the additional input from the personal interviews, the job of alloting money began. \$22,055 was available for allocation. (See Appendix One, page 5.)

There were initially five applicants who received an A rating: Great Lakes Film and Video, Taffnie Bogart/Sandra Gruel, David Bolyard, Dennis Darmek, and Terese Agnew. Their requests totaled \$10,635. The applicants initially rated B were generally given 80% of their request. One, John Gleason, was moved up to A status and a couple were dropped to C. Toward the end of the process, with limited funds left, there were five applicants on which the panel could not reach consensus. These were then rated 1 to 5, the ratings added, and the remaining funds distributed to the top three. The other two were dropped to the C category. The applicants recommended for partial funding were: Cheryl Franklin, Paul Calhoun, Moe Meyer, Dennis Cary, Woodland Pattern, Evelyn Terry, Kristine Gunther, and John Balsley. Written comments on each of the applicants were then reviewed with the total panel and recorded by Julie Enslow.

#### MILWAUKEE FOUNDATION FUND FOR THE ARTS:

1986 PROGRAM GUIDELINES

#### I. INTRODUCTION

The Fund for the Arts has been created by the Milwaukee Foundation to serve as a permanent source of support for small and medium sized arts organizations in the metropolitan Milwaukee area. It has been established as a result of a challenge grant awarded to the Foundation by the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA). Under the terms of this grant, the Milwaukee Foundation will receive \$35,000 a year for four years, beginning in 1986, on the condition that it raise twice that amount each year in new private dollars. The Milwaukee Foundation plans to exceed the minimum yearly goal and raise at least \$500,000 by 1989, thus creating an endowment which will be able indefinitely to provide yearly grants at the current level or better.

This fund is expected to be an important resource for both new and existing organizations. It should result in a greater depth and diversity of the arts in the Milwaukee community and make the arts more accessible to its residents.

Having met the first year match requirement, the Milwaukee Foundation is now inviting applications from qualified organizations for the \$35,000 in NEA funds. The Milwaukee Foundation will be assisted in the application and review process by the Milwaukee Artists Foundation (MAF). The Milwaukee Artists Foundation will coordinate application procedures, technical assistance, and the review panel process. Recommendations resulting from this process will be made to the Milwaukee Foundation whose board of directors will make all final decisions regarding support for applicants.

#### II. PURPOSE

Milwaukee is fortunate to have a number of dynamic and high caliber arts organizations that contribute to its cultural richness and diversity. Many of these are small and medium sized organizations whose impact on the community is typically much greater than the size of their budgets. Many of them have served Milwaukee for ten, fifteen, or more years. In any season, they reach a collective audience of more than 300,000 people. A number of them have brought national and international recognition to Milwaukee.

Traditionally, however, they have had less access to the funding support that all organizations need in order to maximize their benefit to the community. They have been particularly affected by a lack of adequate operating support.

The purpose of the Fund for the Arts is to provide a permanent source of support for small and medium sized arts organizations, in order to enhance both artistic quality and financial stability.

The objectives of the Fund are two-fold:

- promote a professional arts scene for Milwaukee that is filled with diversity, excellence, and exploration;
- encourage a professional arts community whose activities include "traditional" members, minorities, children, those with low incomes, and those with special needs;

There are two means by which this will be accomplished in 1986. The first is the distribution of the NEA funds, perhaps in combination with other Milwaukee Foundation monies, in the form of operating support to qualifying small and medium sized organizations. The second is the creation of a panel to interact with all applicants.

By distributing operating support and interacting with applicants, the Fund will:

- assist to stabilize, maintain, and further develop existing professional arts organizations whose artistic contributions to the community are of high merit and who have a history of managerial excellence;
- assist in the emergence of new organizations of high quality and excellent potential;
- help to improve the management and business capabilities of professional arts organizations.

#### III. ELIGIBILITY AND REVIEW CRITERIA

In general, professional nonprofit arts organizations located and working in the Milwaukee area are eligible for operating support from the Fund for the Arts. The term "professional arts organizations" refers to the full range of arts groups, including producing companies, presenting agencies, galleries and service groups. There are two classes of arts organizations that would be considered for funding: existing organizations, defined as those who have been in continuous operation for the previous three fiscal years; and emerging organizations, defined as those who have been in continuous operation for the previous 18 months, but less than three years.

The following are the respective eligibility requirements and review criteria for these two groups.

#### A. Existing Organizations

- 1. Eligibility requirements for existing organizations are:
  - a. the primary purpose must be the production and/or presentation of the arts to the general public, or the support of professional artists that do so;

- the equivalent of one paid staff member on an annual basis and payment of professional artistic personnel;
- c. tax exempt status under Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code;
- d. continuous operation for the previous three fiscal years;
- e. formal approval of Fund for the Arts application by the board of directors;
- f. total annual operating budget of less than \$300,000.
- In reviewing existing organizations, the panel will consider the following criteria:
  - a. the merit and quality of the organization's role within and contributions to the community;
  - the quality and effectiveness of the organization's business management;
  - demonstrated ability to develop and maintain a stable funding base through earnings and contributed income;
  - an active board of directors that meets on a regular basis and is involved in support of the organization;
  - e. payment of local professional artistic personnel at a level appropriate to the organization's size and budget with a commitment to attain an equitable level of compensation.

Each organization will be reviewed individually with regard to its own internal logic, and not in comparison with any other applicant. There will be no ranking process.

#### B. Emerging Organizations

- 1. Eligibility requirements for emerging organizations are:
  - a. the primary purpose must be the production and/or presentation of the arts to the general public, or the support of the professional artists that do so;
  - b. payment of professional artistic personnel;
  - c. tax exempt status under Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. If the organization has not received this status, it must be in the process of application to the Internal Revenue Service and be sponsored by an organization that is tax exempt under Section 501 (c)(3);

- d. continuous operation for the previous 18 months but less than three years;
- e. formal approval of the Fund for the Arts application by the board of directors;
- f. total annual operating budget of less than \$300,000.
- In reviewing emerging organizations, the panel will consider the following criteria:
  - a. the merit and quality of the organization's role within and contributions to the community. This includes consideration of the uniqueness of the organization's programs, especially: attention to new or underserved audiences; audience development potential; and enhancement or nonduplication of existing programs;
  - maintenance of an established record keeping system and the ability to develop business management practices and procedures appropriate to its needs;
  - evidence of a plan to develop and maintain a stable funding base through earnings and contributed income;
  - a working board of directors with a regular meeting format and structure;
  - e. payment of local professional artistic personnel should be at a level appropriate to the organization's size budget with a commitment to attain an equitable level of compensation.

#### IV. GENERAL FUNDING POLICIES

#### A. Apportionment of Funds

For 1986 grants from the Fund for the Arts will be apportioned as follows:

- 1. Up to fifteen percent (15%) of the funds will be reserved for eligible emerging organizations filing complete and timely applications and meeting the review criteria. If no organization(s) qualify(ies), this money, or whatever portion of it remains unspent, will be added to the sum to be shared by existing organizations.
- Eighty-five percent (85%) of the funds will be allocated to all eligible existing organizations filing complete and timely applications and meeting the review criteria.

#### B. Term of Support

Fund for the Arts support carries no commitment for future support beyond the terms stipulated in the grant agreement.

#### C. Use of Funds

Operating support is, in general, unrestricted support to be applied by the organization in the way it deems most effective. Some examples of how it may be used are: salaries and fees, honoraria, production and related expenses, administrative costs, utility charges, year-round and short-term space and equipment rental, travel costs, marketing and publicity.

Fund for the Arts support may <u>not</u> be used for such purposes as: scholarships, fellowships, tuition assistance or student projects; long-standing accumulated debts; political activities and support; anything that is in violation of applicable local, state or federal law.

#### V. REVIEW PANEL

#### A. Membership

The review panel will be composed of nine members drawn from the Milwaukee Foundation's Board and staff, the Milwaukee Artists Foundation Board, artists, arts advocates, arts administrators, business people, and community leaders. The following stipulations will apply to panel membership and composition:

- a. Three of the panel members will be working artists
- b. Panel members will be appointed for three year terms. Terms will be staggered so that one-third of the panel will be replaced each year.
- c. No member may serve successive full terms on the panel without being off the panel for at least one year.
- d. Conflict of interest rules used by the Milwaukee Foundation will govern all panelists and review proceedings.
- e. The Milwaukee Artists Foundation Program Committee will work with the Milwaukee Foundation staff to develop panel member recommendations for the Milwaukee Foundation Board, which shall have final approval of all panel members.

#### B. Responsibilities

The panel shall be responsible for the following:

- a. Determination of those organizations that qualify for Fund support, following the criteria in these guidelines.
- b. Recommendation to the Milwaukee Foundation of support amounts for each qualifying organization, both emerging and existing.
- c. Referring applicants not receiving support to programs that can assist them to prepare for future qualification. Examples of such programs are the Milwaukee Management Support Organization (MMSO), Milwaukee Associates in Urban Development (MAUD), and the Association of College, University Arts Administrators (ACUCAA).
- d. Receiving an interim report from each of the organizations receiving support from the Fund.
- e. Attending at least two events by each organization receiving Fund support. (This refers to the panel as a whole, whose members may work out how to achieve it among themselves.)
- f. Advising the Milwaukee Foundation on ways in which to improve both Fund guidelines and overall community operational support for these arts groups.

In all matters to be decided by the panel, a simple majority shall be required for approval.

County Board Members and Other Interested Parties:

I am submitting for introduction at the June 19, 1986, meeting of the County Board a report regarding Milwaukee County's future approach to funding cultural, artistic and musical programming. The report includes a series of recommendations which I am proposing for County Board consideration.

Key recommendations included in the report are:

- The County Board shall function as the policy setting body for Milwaukee County's Cultural and artistic programming fund.
- The County Board shall establish through the annual budget review process the appropriation level, determine the allocation for each program component and approve awards to individual arts agencies.
- The establishment of a single appropriation account under administrative authority of the County Board, rather than two non-departmental accounts.
- The establishment of written guidelines and criteria for awarding contracts and grants.
- 5. The creation of a Milwaukee County Cultural, Artistic and Musical Programming Advisory Council (CAMPAC) consisting of seven members, appointed by the Chairman of the County Board and confirmed by the Board. The council shall be advisory to the County Board's Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture and shall have authority to review all applications for county funding.
- The creation of a position of County Cultural Coordinator to administer and monitor cultural programming and the allocation of county cultural funds.

County Board review of the recommendations will be provided through the standing committees of Parks, Recreation and Culture; Finance; Personnel and Audit. Public input and review will be welcome at each of the aforementioned committees as they conduct their review of the report and act on the recommendations.

#### General Overview

The Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors on July 17, 1986, established the Milwaukee County Cultural, Artistic and Musical Programming Advisory Council (CAMPAC), as an advisory council to the Chairman of the County Board, the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture and the full Board. The primary purpose of the council is to advise the Board on how best to allocate budgeted county funds to community arts groups through purchase of services, endowments and grants for the provision of cultural arts programs that best serve and enhance the quality of life in the community.

CAMPAC consists of seven members with an interest in the arts appointed by the County Board chairperson and confirmed by the full Board. No paid staff members or board members or any arts agencies receiving funding from Milwaukee County may serve on the council.

The County Board of Supervisors has delegated to a single authority, the Chairperson of the Board, responsibility for administering all cultural funds. The County Board has annually appropriated property tax funds to support and encourage cultural and artistic activities in this community. The Board's long standing financial commitment to the arts is based on the belief that such activities have a direct relationship to the economic well being and quality of life of the community.

This commitment, however, should not be construed to lock the County in future budget years to the previous years funding level. It is the desire of the County Board, on an <u>annual basis</u>, to reexamine this commitment to ensure that our cultural dollars provide the best mix possible, maintaining and supporting those traditional activities long identified in the community, while yet remaining flexible to provide support and encouragement for small groups, local performers and new and innovative entertainment. Funding by the County carries no commitment for future support beyond the term of the project.

CAMPAC, under authority granted by the County Board, will use the following rules and guidelines in making their recommendations to the County Board through the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture.

Component One CULTURAL, ARTISTIC AND MUSICAL PROGRAMMING (Purchase of Service and Music Under the Stars) Eligibility A. Any organization submitting proposals to Milwaukee County for funding under the Purchase of Services program must conform to the following eligibility rules: 1. Be a not for profit institution located within Milwaukee County as determined by corporate address and the principle location of arts activities. 2. Be organized for the primary purpose of the production, presentation, exhibition, or performance of artistic works. 3. Be independent and professional with at least one professional paid staff. Should employ a paid administrative and fund raising staff or affiliate itself with an outside agency with paid administrative staff. 4. Have been in continuous operation for three years and/or able to demonstrate a history of the production, presentation, exhibition or performance of artistic works of exemplary quality. 5. Be able to provide and maintain financial records in accordance with standard accounting practices. 6. Be able to provide an annual financial statement of income with application. 7. Should have independent fund-raising capabilities and demonstrate same by raising contributions from outside sources. 8. Be able to focus on the employment of local talent originating from or residing in Milwaukee County, be able to demonstrate new and innovative ideas for providing community entertainment with limited resources and should attempt to use County facilities for some or all of the programming. B. Traditional cultural programming under the auspices of "Music Under the Stars" shall be proposed to the County using the County's purchase of service application format. The agency shall conform to the above eligibility requirements. - 2 -

Programs and Services A. Milwaukee County shall award Purchase of Service contracts for the presentation of events which conform to the following guidelines: 1. Events are designed to reach audiences of 500 or more per performance, exhibition or event. 2. Events are designed to reach a broad range of the county's residents, including those residents whose economic resources are severely restricted or limited. 3. Events should take place in county owned facilities on county owned land, or in other locations designed for use by a broad public. Priority will be given to those groups which use County facilities for some or all of their performances. B. "Music Under the Stars" awards are made on a noncompetitive basis for traditional Milwaukee County programming. Funding for the Artistic Consultant for Milwaukee County to Music Under the Stars is included in the appropriation. Criteria for Awarding Contracts Milwaukee County reserves the right to approve/disapprove awarding contracts to organizations making application for provision of cultural programming based upon the criteria listed below. 1. Quality of the event proposed. Evidence of quality shall include: - critical response to the applicant's recent work - evaluation of previous county sponsored events, if any - freshness of the event proposed to the target audience - educational value of the event 2. Geographic distribution of the events underwritten. The County Board will consider the need to offer events in a variety of neighborhoods and locations. 3. Balance of artistic genres. The County Board will consider the need to underwrite a variety of artistic genres, styles, and flavors in selecting events to be underwritten. Care will be taken to consider the cultural diversity of the audiences served. 4. Effectiveness of the plan for broad public access. The County Board requires an admissions plan which ensures the access of individuals of restricted economic resources. Plans may stipulate free admission to all, free admission to selected portions of the audience, reduced rate approaches, or the like. Applicants should explain their approach and rationale in detail. - 3 -

5. Balance of Audiences Served. The County Board will attempt to balance its program to serve a variety of audiences including various ethnic groups, various age groups, and residents both in the community and living in restricted settings.

#### Allowable Expenses

In contracting for services, the following costs are eligible for support:

- 1. artistic fees and benefits
- 2. administrative fees and benefits not to exceed 15% of the Project's budget
- 3. technical personnel fees and benefits
- direct expenses for the production, exhibition, or event including supplies, space rental, royalties, printed programs or catalogs, equipment rental, etc.
- 5. promotional costs
- 6. insurance and bonding.

#### Restrictions on Funds

Milwaukee County will not provide funds to reduce existing deficits, or subsidize activities, operating and administrative expenses unrelated to the contract award. Milwaukee County does not provide funds for direct grants, tuition or fellowships to individuals, fund-raising efforts, interest or litigation costs, prizes, entertainment or funds for projects which discriminate against or preclude any group.

Milwaukee County does not fund:

- 1. Capital Projects or expenditures (over \$500)
- 2. Benefit performances, exhibitions or events
- 3. Refreshments

#### Application

All applications for the  $\frac{Purchase}{properly}$  of Service program shall be complete when submitted. They must be  $\frac{Purchase}{properly}$  signed, with fifteen copies submitted by deadline date with all required documentation as indicated on the application form. Additional information or documentation may be requested by Milwaukee County.

The funding process is competitive and many deserving proposals may not be funded for the total amount requested. Previous financial support from Milwaukee County would not necessarily guarantee continued funding.

In reviewing applications, Milwaukee County evaluates individual proposals based upon service and access to the public, community interest and support for the project, compatibility of proposal and related County Board objectives, and availability of comparable services in the community. The County Board, through the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture and CAMPAC also will review each project application with regard to the feasibility and quality of the proposal, the "track record" of the applicant organization's ability to provide the proposed service, and a careful analysis of project and organizational budgets.

Milwaukee County encourages the development of proposals which demonstrate a willingness to cooperate with other agencies through collaborative programs or services and those showing additional sources of financial support for the proposal.

Selection will be based on programs that make a contribution to the range of cultural experience available in the County by artistic discipline, seasonal schedule, target audiences, geographic area and overall impact.

#### Contracts

When Milwaukee County awards funding under the Purchase of Service program and "Music Under the Stars", it is contracting with an organization to provide services to citizens of the County. The funds must be used as specified in the approved proposal. No changes may be made to the project without notifying the County Board to request approval of changes in the contract. A revised project budget must be submitted if the applicant organization revises the scope of the program based on a reduction in funding from that originally requested.

The contract must be signed by both the County Board Chairman, and by the individual authorized to sign by the organization under contract.

Funds will not be available until the County has a signed, valid contract. Contracts are usually signed in January. Ten percent (10%) of the funds allocated will be reserved until the organization submits its final reports. Payments will be made prior to commencement of project but no more than two (2) months prior to a project. Final reports, including narrative, financial project information, are due within 30 days of completion of each contracted program.

Component Two

#### ENDOWMENTS AND GRANTS (Performing Arts Matching Grant, UPAF Rental Subsidy and County Arts Program Subgrant)

#### Eligibility

A. Any organization submitting proposals to Milwaukee County for funding under the Performing Arts Matching Grant program must conform to the following eligibility rules:

- 1. Be a non-UPAF group with an annual operating budget of less than \$300,000, after exclusions itemized under section below entitled "Criteria for Matching Grant".
- 2. Be a not for profit institution located within Milwaukee County as determined by corporate address and the principle location of arts activities. May not be a Milwaukee County owned institution.
- 3. Be organized for the purpose of production of performing arts within Milwaukee County or presentation of the performing arts within Milwaukee County, with at least 25% of activities dedicated to the production of performing arts.
- 4. Be independent and professional with at least one professional paid staff. Additionally be able to employ a paid administrative and fund raising staff or affiliate itself with an outside agency with paid administrative staff.
- 5. Have been in continuous operation for the previous three years. Continuous operation means regular program of public performances during each of the previous three years.
- 6. Be able to provide and maintain financial records in accordance with standard accounting practices.
- 7. Be able to provide an annual financial audit of income with application and prior to dispersal of matching grant.
- 8. Shall have independent fund-raising capabilities and demonstrate same by raising contributions from outside sources.
- 9. Be able to focus on the employment of local talent originating from or residing in Milwaukee County, be able to demonstrate new and innovative ideas for providing community entertainment with limited resources and should attempt to use County facilities for some or all of the performances.

depend on the number of organizations that qualify for support. The more that qualify, the smaller the individual award.

#### Allowable Expenses

In the Matching Grant program, funds are intended to support the organization's general operations, not specific programs.

#### Restrictions on Funds

At this time, there are no formal restrictions on the use of funds received under the Matching  ${\tt Grant\ program.}$ 

#### Application

All applications made under the <u>Performing Arts Matching Grant program</u> shall be complete when submitted. They must be properly signed, and fifteen copies submitted by the deadline date with all required documentation as indicated on the application form. Absolutely no late applications will be accepted.

The County Board, through CAMPAC and the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture, will review each application.

#### Contracts

There will be no formal contract between Milwaukee County and the Matching Crant recipients. However, an "Acknowledgement of Receipt of Funding" form must be signed by both the Managing Director and Board Chairperson of the funded organization. This further requires the organization to submit its year end report containing financial statements and a list of performances, performance sites and estimated audiences. Payments will be made within three weeks of County Board approval of Matching Grant awards.

# MILWAUKEE ARTISTS FOUNDATION 1985 COUNTY ARTS PROGRAM GUIDELINES

#### INTRODUCTION

The Milwaukee Artists Foundation (MAF) is a private, non-profit organization whose primary purpose is to support arts activities in the Milwaukee area. MAF programs include the management of Lincoln Center for the Arts in cooperation with the Milwaukee Public Schools centralized administrative services to artists and arts organizations, audience development programming and financial and technical assistance.

The MAF makes financial assistance for arts projects available to eligible organizations and individual professional artists through its COUNTY ARTS grants program. With funding from Milwaukee County government, the COUNTY ARTS Program is designed to encourage and support artistic and managerial excellence and promote the growth and self-sufficiency of local professional individual artists, emerging and mid-level arts organizations and professionally-directed community and neighborhood arts programs which provide diverse high quality cultural programming for the citizens of Milwaukee County.

#### The objectives of the COUNTY ARTS Program are

- 1. Encourage and support new and existing programs of high quality which stimulate and/or leverage new or additional public/private support for COUNTY ARTS grantees
- 2 Encourage and support programs and projects that fit into a plan to further grantee growth and stability through artistic innovation, greater visibility in the community and expansion of fund-raising potential;
- 3. Support programs that employ local professional arts personnel;
- 4. Provide diverse cultural programming and services to the citizens of Milwaukee County, particularly those communities which are unserved or underserved by traditional arts programming (community is defined as having common demographic, geographic, ethnic or economic characteristics);
- 5. Provide technical and managerial assistance as needed to both grantee and non-grantee artists and organizations.

#### BASIC ELIGIBILITY

Individual professional artists and non-profit organizations located in and having substantial operations in Milwaukee County are eligible for COUNTY ARTS grants.

#### Organizational applicants must:

- 1. Be exempt from federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and to which donations are allowable as a charitable contribution under Section 170(c) of the Internal Revenue Code as amended or apply jointly with a fiscal agent which meets these requirements.
- 2. Have an active Board of Directors or advisors that meets on a regular basis and which has formally approved all COUNTY ARTS applications;
- 3. Have an on-going program of activities and services which serves the general public.

individual applicants must:

- 1. Be a resident of Milwauke ounty for at least one year prior to got application;
- $2\,$  Submit evidence of recognized accomplishment in the form of substantial exhibition or performance credits
- ${f 3.}$  Demonstrate a commitment to publicly exhibit or perform works in Milwaukee County within the project period.
- 4. Not be a degree credit student.

#### GENERAL FUNDING POLICIES

COUNTY ARTS grants will support activities that are directed to audiences and participants in Milwaukee County. Grant funds can be used for artist salaries and fees, honoraria, production and related administrative costs, equipment rent al, in-County travel costs, marketing and publicity.

# COUNTY ARTS grant funds cannot be used for such purposes as

- Scholaships, fellowshire, tuition assistance or student projects

- Capital expenditures which include real or personal property with a value of more than \$300 and/or a usable life greater than one year

- Costs incurred before or after the effective dates of the grant contract

- Delicit financing

- Activities or travel outside Milwaukee County

- Fund-raising events

- Hospitality costs, prizes or awards

- Publication of works not created as part of COUNTY ARTS-funded project

- Activities intended primarily for an organization's membership or which do not serve the general public

- Projects that would raise funds for profit-making groups - Administrative costs unrelated to the proposed budget

- Projects receiving direct funding from Milwaukee County government

- Indirect costs

#### MATCHING FUNDS

COUNTY ARTS grants are not meant to be the sole source of funding for a project or an organization. Grants generally must be matched with one dollar for every dollar awarded. Proposals that demonstrate evidence of a plausible cash match from earned income, individual, corporate, foundation or government grants will receive priority.

ratual tunuing of the intending requirement with in-kind services is acceptable if the in kind in contributed space, materials, loaned equipment or professional services. Professional services must be determined on a local wage scale acceptable to the MAF. Nonprofessional volunteer time cannot be considered an in-kind service. In-kind donations must be verified by the donor.

Continued funding of the same or similar project over succeeding grant periods will generally require increasing amounts of matching cash.

A COUNTY ARTS grant carries no commitment for future support beyond the term of the project.

Applicants are encouraged to realistically assess and thoroughly document the amount they actually need to complete the project identified in the proposal. Applicants' requests should be made with the understanding that COUNTY ARTS funding is finite and the MAF has the prerogative to approve an amount less than requested. Generally, if the MAF cannot fund 80% or more of an organizational project request, the applicant will not be awarded a grant.

All organizations that meet the Basic Eligibility requirements may apply for COUNTY ARTS grants, but those organizations with operating budgets of less than \$250,000 will receive priority.

Applicants meeting the Besic Eligibility Requirements may submit more than one application per funding round, but they must prioritize their requests.

- 1) Organizational Projects. Organizations whose primary function is to create and produce regular, on-going programming in the literary, performing and visual arts are eligible for funding in this category. Grants in this area are for supplementary funding of new programming, such as performances, exhibitions, workshops, artists residencies, etc. Funds may be used for artists salaries, fees, production, administrative, marketing and publicity costs related to the COUNTY ARTS-funded services. Priority will be given to well-planned projects that foster the professional growth of the applicant through the provision of the proposed community services. Organizational Projects grants will range from \$500 to \$3,000.
- 2) Individual Artist Projects. Recognized professional visual, literary and performing artists with substantial exhibition and performance credits may apply for funding to produce or complete their own work for exhibition or performance to the general public in Milwaukee County. Gl

Individual Artist Awards will be limited to up to five awards of \$2,000. Eligible artists may apply to (a) create a body of new work for performance/display to the public in Milwaukee County within one year of the award or (b) provide arts services to the public through extended residencies in community and senior citizen centers, libraries, parks, and other sites open to the public and located in Milwaukee County (schools are generally not eligible for residencies). Proposals to combine both (a) and (b) are also encouraged. Artists awarded grants for (a) above will receive \$1,500 to create the work and \$500 for production/exhibition of the completed work in Milwaukee County. Artists will be selected based on the quality of past work. Awards will be made to artists in a plurality of art forms. No matching will be required. Artists awarded grants for (b) will be judged on the quality of their work, prior experience in public venues and innovation/diversity of the services to be provided and the number/variety of locations to be served. Institutions where services are to be provided generally will be required to provide a cash match.

#### APPLICATION AND REVIEW PROCEDURES

COUNTY ARTS grants will be awarded once in 1985. The application deadline will be 500 p.m. May 16, 1986 for projects occurring between June 15, 1986 and June 15, 1987.

All applications must be made on application forms available from the MAF and must be fully completed and returned to the MAF by the application deadline. Because of the need to meet review deadlines late or incomplete applications will not be accepted!

All applications will be reviewed for completeness by MAF staff and assigned to the appropriate review panel. Review panels will consist of MAF Board members and arts professionals from the community selected by the MAF Board.

After an initial review, panel comments and questions will be communicated to applicants. Applicants will have ten days to respond in writing,

Applicants will have the opportunity to attend an open hearing on their application when the panels meet a second time to make recommendations. Panels will consider the application and make a narrative judgment based on the following criteria:

- Appropriateness of the project to the focus of the COUNTY ARTS program
- Artistic merit of the project
- Anticipated benefit to the applicant's artistic/managerial growth and stability
- Community need, benefit, interest and involvement
- Degree to which local professional artists and arts personnel are employed
- Audience development potential, especially in new or undergreed constituencies
- Applicant's ability to successfully implement the project and, where applicable, the ability to continue the project
- Applicants need for COUNTY ARTS funding to implement the project
- Degree of matching resources, especially cash contributions
- The relationship of the project budget to the organization's total budget
- Degree of innovation in proposed programming and non-duplication of existing programming

Panel recommendations on sich applications will be funded and for hat amount will be presented to the full MAF Board of Directors at an open meeting. Recommendations approved by the MAF Board of Directors will then be forwarded to the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors for final action.

As noted previously, the application deadline is May 16, 1985 at 5:00 p.m. All materials must be at the MAF office by that time. The timeline for panel review will be announced after all applications have been received. The MAF Board meeting to consider panel recommendations will be held on June 25, 1986. Notification letters will be sent by the MAF office by July 1, 1986.

Announcements of grant decisions will be made by letter, mailed to all applicants. Payment of grant funds will be made in keeping with the project timeline submitted with the application. Generally 45% of the grant award will be made at the beginning of the project period, 45% at the mid-point of the project and 10% after all required reports have been submitted upon completion of the project. Payments will begin after signed contracts are received by the MAF.

Projects must be completed and funds expended within the project period stipulated in the grant contract.

#### GRANTEE RESPONSIBILITIES

In addition to compliance with all relevant laws, rules and regulations stipulated in the grant contract, each grantee assumes full liability and responsibility for the conduct of the project and agrees to indemnify the Milwaukee Artists Foundation and Milwaukee County, their employees and representatives for any sum which the above entities may become liable to pay in correquence of activities performed in the project. The conduct of any COUNTY ARTS-funded project is the sole

Funds provided through COUNTY ARTS grants shall be expended solely for the activities described in the approved application. Changes in the approved project can be made only after the Milwaukee Artists Foundation has given written approval to a written request from the grantee. Grantees must maintain records, documents or papers which show proper expenditure of grant funds.

Final narrative and expenditure reports will be required from each grantee within 45 days of project completion or termination.

All promotional material and public announcements must indicate that the project is "supported in part by a grant from the Milwaukee Artists Foundation with funding from Milwaukee County completion of the project."

Subject: Focus on the Future of Milwaukee County's Cultural, Artistic and Musical Programming -- Findings and Recommendations

#### 1.0 Policy Issue

At the January, 1986 meeting of the above named committees, resolution file no. 85-927 authorizing the Director of Parks, Recreation and Culture to assume administrative authority for all county cultural program funds was laid over. The rationale for this request was to afford me the opportunity to review the recently completed consultants report for funding guidelines and criteria for the Cultural Contributions Program, and upon such review to formulate a set of recommendations which would address the county's future approach to funding cultural activities. Subsequently, I have reviewed this matter thoroughly and respectfully submit this report containing my observations and recommendations.

#### 2.0 Background

Milwaukee County's approach to cultural programming in 1986 is bifurcated into two non-departmental appropriations, Org. Unit. 1935, Cultural Contributions, and Org. Unit 1968, Performing Arts Matching Grant Program. Both accounts are administered by the County Board. A brief summary of each account is provided below:

#### 2.1 Cultural Contributions Org. Unit 1935

This non-departmental appropriation was established in the adopted 1982 budget to provide contributions to various cultural, artistic and musical organizations. Prior to 1982, cultural activity programs were funded through an array of non-departmental appropriations under jurisdiction of the Park Commission and administered within the Park Department's Cultural Activities program. The Park Commission was abolished in 1981 and funding and administrative responsibility for cultural activities was placed under the jurisdiction of the County Board.

Since 1982, annual allocations for cultural contributions have been made by the County Board. The adopted budget for 1986 includes an appropriation of \$567,500 in Org. Unit 1935. Provisions contained in the budget write-up for Unit 1935 recommend that contracts be awarded to those organizations that have independent fund-raising capabilities and who demonstrate this by raising contributions from outside sources. It is further recommended that each agency will be limited

to a County contribution to be determined by the County Board, and in no case shall the County contribution exceed the amounts contributed from outside sources. Additionally, organizations receiving an appropriation should hire only <a href="Local">Local</a> performers, and should demonstrate new and innovative ideas for providing community entertainment with dramatically reduced resources.

The chairman of the Parks, Recreation and Culture Committee, in April, 1983, appointed a Cultural Council, composed of six citizen members to hear proposals, review cultural activities and make recommendations to the Parks Committee. The Council has subsequently contracted with Opinion Research Associates to produce recommendations for funding guidelines and criteria to frame its annual arts funding process. In preparing this report I have reviewed a draft report from Opinion Research Associates, and have incorporated several suggestions made by them in this presentation.

The County Board by adopting resolution File no. 84-553(a)(c) on December 19, 1985, clarified the role of the council by adopting a recommendation that "the Cultural Council, as part of its review of funds to be allocated from the Cultural Contributions (Org. 1935), is directed to solicit proposals for the entire appropriation contained within this non-departmental account, so as to offer the County a series of options as to the services it will receive."

# 2.2 Performing Arts Matching Grant Program Org. Unit 1968

This appropriation, newly established in the adopted 1986 Budget, is to provide matching <u>grants</u> to professional performing arts organizations in Milwaukee County. The 1986 appropriation is divided into two programs: (1) a Hall Rental Subsidy in the amount of \$421,785 for seven UPAF groups currently using the PAC and (2) a Performing Arts Matching Grant Program in the amount of \$250,000 for non-UPAF groups.

The Performing Arts Matching Grant Program has with the approval of the County Board established some very basic funding criteria. Additionally, the award of county funds are made on a grant basis, rather than through a contract agreement as currently required under the Cultural Contributions Program.

Under the Performing Arts Matching Grant Program, the Managing Director of the PAC was recruited during 1986 for recommending grant awards to the Finance Committee of the County Board. The adopted budget establishes a policy to grant the Managing Director of the PAC the authority to utilize a volunteer advisory panel to assist in determining recommendations for grant awards. All professional non-profit performing arts organizations in Milwaukee County which qualify under the eligibility guidelines will be funded.

The actual grant received by an eligible organization will be calculated as a percentage of that organization's current income.

Grants will be awarded on a sliding scale with smaller organizations receiving a proportionately larger grant. The actual grant awarded will also depend on the number of organizations that qualify for support. The more that qualify, the smaller the individual awards.

#### 3.0 Observations/Comments

Within the Adopted 1986 Budget, Milwaukee County has two separate and distinct appropriations for cultural and artistic programming. One approach involves the awarding of contracts after the submission of a proposal and a lengthy review process, with the final award recommendation submitted to the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture Committee and approved by the County Board. The other approach involves the awarding of a grant after the submission of an application and a review process, with the final award being made to all eligible organizations as submitted to the Finance Committee and approved by the County Board.

The County Board has delegated to itself the responsibility for administering all cultural funds in Unit numbers 1935 and 1968. It is assumed for the purposes of this report that the Board will continue the County's long standing commitment to fund cultural, artistic and musical programs, projects and activities. This commitment, however, should not be construed to lock the County in future Budget years to a specific funding level. The erosion of our Federal and State Revenue base will impact severely on the amount of property tax levy funds that can be allocated for cultural and artistic programs in the future. The approach taken in 1986 to fund two separate cultural accounts in the County Budget may not be the most appropriate course to take in future budget years.

The fact that the County Board has annually appropriated funds for cultural and artistic activities in this community clearly highlights the important role this Board believes that such activities have on the economic well being and "quality-of-life". Obviously, current and projected budgetary revenue shortfalls will require that the Board carefully examine and manage our cultural dollars so as to provide the best mix possible, maintaining and supporting those traditional activities long identified in the Milwaukee entertainment community, while yet remaining flexible to provide support and encouragement for small groups, local performers and new and innovative entertainment medium.

Consistent with these comments, the recommendations that follow have as their purpose the goal to bring uniformity to the overall administration and management of the County's cultural commitment. Additionally, the recommendations address the development of a more consistent and coordinated approach to the awarding of the County's entertainment dollars.

Grants will be awarded on a sliding scale with smaller organizations receiving a proportionately larger grant. The actual grant awarded will also depend on the number of organizations that qualify for support. The more that qualify, the smaller the individual awards.

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Consistent with these comments, the recommendations that follow have as their purpose the goal to bring uniformity to the overall administration and management of the County's cultural commitment. Additionally, the recommendations address the development of a more consistent and coordinated approach to the awarding of the County's entertainment dollars.

4.0 Recommendations: Recommend that the attached resolution/ordinance be adopted which encompasses the following recommendations: 4.1 That the County Board continue to function as the policy setting body for Milwaukee County's cultural and artistic programs, and retain authority to establish and approve the total amount of cultural dollars to be spent in the community annually, including the allocation by program component, and approval of the final allocation of awards, whether by contract, grant, loan, subsidy, etc., to individual organizations and groups. 4.2 That the County Board through the annual budget review process, establish the appropriation level for each of the five program components, and that the Committee on Parks, Recreation, and Culture be responsible for recommending the amount of dollars to be allocated to individual organizations and agencies; and submit same for County Board approval. 4.3 That the Cultural Contributions, non-departmental Unit No. 1935 and the Performing Arts Matching Grant Program, non-departmental Unit No. 1968 be abolished in the 1987 budget and; a new non-departmental account, under administrative jurisdiction of the County Board, be established with the appropriations in the account to be distributed among the following components: Cultural, Artistic, and Musical Programming Component Under this program, Milwaukee County would enter into contractual relationships with community organizations providing, either at a nominal charge or free to the public, specified cultural, artistic and musical performances, with priority given to those using county facilities. This program includes two types of service categories which have been funded since 1981 under Non-Departmental Org. Unit 1935, Cultural Contributions. 1. Music Under the Stars This program category represents Milwaukee County's traditional approach to cultural programming. Under this category, a contract(s) would be allocated on a noncompetitive basis with one or more local arts groups designed to deliver arts programming to Milwaukee County. 2. Purchase of Service This program category would provide Milwaukee County the opportunity to go beyond its traditional approach to

cultural and artistic programming by allowing for a mix of arts programs based on public input, needs and wants. It is envisioned that this category would allow yearly opportunities to emphasize new priorities by County Board members and changing needs of the community.

Under this program allocation, Milwaukee County would on an annual basis determine the number and type of performances it desires to purchase through the solicitation of "Request for Proposals" based on County Board approved eligibility criteria and guidelines.

#### b. Endowments and Grants Component

Under this program, Milwaukee County recognizes that many fine professional performing arts organizations exist in the community and contribute to the quality of life in this community. With the objective of promoting new and existing arts organizations, these grants are designed to help art groups to meet their operational and programming expenses.

This program includes three types of grants:

- Performing Arts Matching Grants. This grant program is designed to provide, with no quid pro quo requirements, a direct subsidy to professional performing arts organizations that meet established criteria. Only non-UPAF groups will be eligible to apply for a direct subsidy grant.
- 2. United Performing Arts Fund (UPAF) Group Rental Subsidy. Under this program Milwaukee county would provide a direct hall rent subsidy as an incentive for professional arts groups to utilize the PAC. All funds under this account would be forwarded to the PAC. The PAC will, in turn, issue a rent credit in the appropriate amount for each group.

During 1986 the above two programs were funded under the Performing Arts Matching Grant Program, Org. Unit 1968.

3. "County Arts Program" Subgrant. Under this program, an agency is assigned to coordinate a County Arts subgrant program involving county based arts groups. Project grants and technical assistance are provided to individual artists, arts organizations not served by a major fund drive, and community organizations sponsoring arts programs, currently using criteria established by the Milwaukee Artists Foundation in their "1985 County Arts program guidelines". Funding for this program has been traditionally provided under the county's Cultural Contributions, Org. Unit 1935.

- 4.6 That the County Board create a Milwaukee County Cultural, Artistic and Musical Programming Advisory Council (CAMPAC). The Council shall be advisory to the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture, and consist of seven members all of whom shall have an interest in the arts. Appointments to the Council shall be made by the Chairman of the County Board and confirmed by the full Board. Membership shall be limited to persons who do not currently serve on boards which receive arts funding from Milwaukee County. The Council shall have authority to review all applications received under the cultural, artistic and musical programming and endowment and grant components of County arts funding and to make recommendation for awarding county funds to the County Board through the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture. Additional duties and responsibilities may be assigned as determined appropriate by the County Board.
- 4.7 That the County Board adopt the guidelines and criteria for awarding county arts dollars as attached.

#### General Overview

The Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors on July 17, 1986, established the Milwaukee County Cultural, Artistic and Musical Programming Advisory Council (CAMPAC), as an advisory council to the Chairman of the County Board, the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture and the full Board. The primary purpose of the council is to advise the Board on how best to allocate budgeted county funds to community arts groups through purchase of services, endowments and grants for the provision of cultural arts programs that best serve and enhance the quality of life in the community.

CAMPAC consists of seven members with an interest in the arts appointed by the County Board chairperson and confirmed by the full Board. No paid staff members or board members or any arts agencies receiving funding from Milwaukee County may serve on the council.

The County Board of Supervisors has delegated to a single authority, the Chairperson of the Board, responsibility for administering all cultural funds. The County Board has annually appropriated property tax funds to support and encourage cultural and artistic activities in this community. The Board's long standing financial commitment to the arts is based on the belief that such activities have a direct relationship to the economic well being and quality of life of the community.

This commitment, however, should not be construed to lock the County in future budget years to the previous years funding level. It is the desire of the County Board, on an <u>annual basis</u>, to reexamine this commitment to ensure that our cultural dollars provide the best mix possible, maintaining and supporting those traditional activities long identified in the community, while yet remaining flexible to provide support and encouragement for small groups, local performers and new and innovative entertainment. Funding by the County carries no commitment for future support beyond the term of the project.

CAMPAC, under authority granted by the County Board, will use the following rules and guidelines in making their recommendations to the County Board through the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture.

- A. Milwaukee County shall award <u>Purchase of Service</u> contracts for the presentation of events which conform to the following guidelines:
  - Events are designed to reach audiences of 500 or more per performance, exhibition or event.
  - Events are designed to reach a broad range of the county's residents, including those residents whose economic resources are severely restricted or limited.
  - 3. Events should take place in county owned facilities on county owned land, or in other locations designed for use by a broad public. Priority will be given to those groups which use County facilities for some or all of their performances.
- B. "Music Under the Stars" awards are made on a noncompetitive basis for traditional Milwaukee County programming. Funding for the Artistic Consultant for Milwaukee County to Music Under the Stars is included in the appropriation.

#### Criteria for Awarding Contracts

Milwaukee County reserves the right to approve/disapprove awarding contracts to organizations making application for provision of cultural programming based upon the criteria listed below.

- 1. Quality of the event proposed. Evidence of quality shall include:
  - critical response to the applicant's recent work
  - evaluation of previous county sponsored events, if any
  - freshness of the event proposed to the target audience
  - educational value of the event
- Geographic distribution of the events underwritten. The County Board will consider the need to offer events in a variety of neighborhoods and locations.
- 3. Balance of artistic genres. The County Board will consider the need to underwrite a variety of artistic genres, styles, and flavors in selecting events to be underwritten. Care will be taken to consider the cultural diversity of the audiences served.
- 4. Effectiveness of the plan for broad public access. The County Board requires an admissions plan which ensures the access of individuals of restricted economic resources. Plans may stipulate free admission to all, free admission to selected portions of the audience, reduced rate approaches, or the like. Applicants should explain their approach and rationale in detail.

In reviewing applications, Milwaukee County evaluates individual proposals based upon service and access to the public, community interest and support for the project, compatibility of proposal and related County Board objectives, and availability of comparable services in the community. The County Board, through the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture and CAMPAC also will review each project application with regard to the feasibility and quality of the proposal, the "track record" of the applicant organization's ability to provide the proposed service, and a careful analysis of project and organizational budgets.

Milwaukee County encourages the development of proposals which demonstrate a willingness to cooperate with other agencies through collaborative programs or services and those showing additional sources of financial support for the proposal.

Selection will be based on programs that make a contribution to the range of cultural experience available in the County by artistic discipline, seasonal schedule, target audiences, geographic area and overall impact.

#### Contracts

When Milwaukee County awards funding under the Purchase of Service program and "Music Under the Stars", it is contracting with an organization to provide services to citizens of the County. The funds must be used as specified in the approved proposal. No changes may be made to the project without notifying the County Board to request approval of changes in the contract. A revised project budget must be submitted if the applicant organization revises the scope of the program based on a reduction in funding from that originally requested.

The contract must be signed by both the County Board Chairman, and by the individual authorized to sign by the organization under contract.

Funds will not be available until the County has a signed, valid contract. Contracts are usually signed in January. Ten percent (10%) of the funds allocated will be reserved until the organization submits its final reports. Payments will be made prior to commencement of project but no more than two (2) months prior to a project. Final reports, including narrative, financial project information, are due within 30 days of completion of each contracted program.

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# ENDOWMENTS AND GRANTS (Performing Arts Matching Grant, UPAF Rental Subsidy and County Arts Program Subgrant)

#### Eligibility

A. Any organization submitting proposals to Milwaukee County for funding under the Performing Arts Matching Grant program must conform to the following eligibility rules:

- Be a non-UPAF group with an annual operating budget of less than \$300,000, after exclusions itemized under section below entitled "Criteria for Matching Grant".
- Be a not for profit institution located within Milwaukee County as determined by corporate address and the principle location of arts activities. May not be a Milwaukee County owned institution.
- 3. Be organized for the purpose of production of performing arts within Milwaukee County or presentation of the performing arts within Milwaukee County, with at least 25% of activities dedicated to the production of performing arts.
- 4. Be independent and professional with at least one professional paid staff. Additionally be able to employ a paid administrative and fund raising staff or affiliate itself with an outside agency with paid administrative staff.
- Have been in continuous operation for the previous three years.
   Continuous operation means regular program of public performances during each of the previous three years.
- Be able to provide and maintain financial records in accordance with standard accounting practices.
- Be able to provide an annual financial audit of income with application and prior to dispersal of matching grant.
- 8. Shall have independent fund-raising capabilities and demonstrate same by raising contributions from outside sources.
- 9. Be able to focus on the employment of local talent originating from or residing in Milwaukee County, be able to demonstrate new and innovative ideas for providing community entertainment with limited resources and should attempt to use County facilities for some or all of the performances.

B. Eligibility for the UPAF Group Rental Subsidy is recommended by the Performing Arts Center to the County Board, through CAMPAC and the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture. C. Eligibility under the "County Arts Program" subgrant is currently determined using criteria established by the Milwaukee Artists Foundation's "1985 County Arts Program Guidelines" (see Exhibit 1). Recommendations are submitted to the County Board through CAMPAC and the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture. Programs and Services A. Under the Performing Arts Matching Grant program, any performing arts organization capable of generating a stream of revenue from existing sources is considered by Milwaukee County to be worthy of support. Grants are made on a matching basis and are intended to support the organization's general operations. B. UPAF Group Rental Subsidy is used for hall rental by professional arts groups utilizing the Performing Arts Center. C. Individual artists, arts organizations not served by a major fund drive and community organizations sponsoring arts programs are eligible under the "County Arts Program" Subgrant. Allowable expenses, restrictions on funds, application, reporting and contractual arrangements are all made between the subgrant administrator and the qualifying arts group. Criteria for Matching Grant Milwaukee County's grant under the Performing Arts Matching Grant program will be based on an organization's operating income, considering both earned and contributed income, excepting the following: 1. in-kind contributions 2. income dedicated to capital improvement (i.e. purchase of real estate, construction or purchases of equipment costing over 3. contributions for an endowment campaign 4. contributions received for regranting 5. income dedicated to principal payment of bank loans 6. contributions received from Milwaukee County directly or indirectly. All eligible organizations will be funded. The actual grant received by an eligible organization will be calculated as a percentage of that organization's operating income within maximum percentage limitations. Grants will be awarded on a sliding scale with smaller organizations receiving a proportionately larger grant. The actual grant awarded will - 7 -

depend on the number of organizations that qualify for support. The more that qualify, the smaller the individual award.

#### Allowable Expenses

In the Matching Grant program, funds are intended to support the organization's general operations, not specific programs.

#### Restrictions on Funds

At this time, there are no formal restrictions on the use of funds received under the Matching Grant program.

#### Application

All applications made under the <u>Performing Arts Matching Grant</u> program shall be complete when submitted. They must be properly signed, and fifteen copies submitted by the deadline date with all required documentation as indicated on the application form. Absolutely no late applications will be accepted.

The County Board, through CAMPAC and the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture, will review each application.

#### Contracts

There will be no formal contract between Milwaukee County and the Matching Grant recipients. However, an "Acknowledgement of Receipt of Funding" form must be signed by both the Managing Director and Board Chairperson of the funded organization. This further requires the organization to submit its year end report containing financial statements and a list of performances, performance sites and estimated audiences. Payments will be made within three weeks of County Board approval of Matching Grant awards.

# MILWAUKEE ARTISTS FOUNDATION 1985 COUNTY ARTS PROGRAM GUIDELINES

#### INTRODUCTION

The Milwaukee Artists Foundation (MAF) is a private, non-profit organization whose primary purpose is to support arts activities in the Milwaukee area. MAF programs include the management of Lincoln Center for the Arts in cooperation with the Milwaukee Public Schools, centralized administrative services to artists and arts organizations, audience development programming and financial and technical assistance.

The MAF makes financial assistance for arts projects available to eligible organizations and individual professional artists through its COUNTY ARTS grants program. With funding from Milwaukee County government, the COUNTY ARTS Program is designed to encourage and support artistic and managerial excellence and promote the growth and self-sufficiency of local professional individual artists, emerging and mid-level arts organizations and professionally-directed community and neighborhood arts programs which provide diverse high quality sultural programming for the citizens of Milwaukee County.

### The objectives of the COUNTY ARTS Program are

- Encourage and support new and existing programs of high quality which stimulate and/or leverage new or additional public/private support for COUNTY ARTS grantees;
- 2 Encourage and support programs and projects that fit into a plan to further grantee growth and stability through artistic innovation, greater visibility in the community and expansion of fund-raising potential;
- 3. Support programs that employ local professional arts personnel;
- 4. Provide diverse cultural programming and services to the citizens of Milwaukee County, particularly those communities which are unserved or underserved by traditional arts programming (community is defined as having common demographic, geographic, ethnic or economic characteristics);
- 5. Provide technical and managerial assistance as needed to both grantee and non-grantee artists and organizations.

#### BASIC ELIGIBILITY

Individual professional artists and non-profit organizations located in and having substantial operations in Milwaukee County are eligible for COUNTY ARTS grants.

#### Organizational applicants must:

- 1. Fe exempt from federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and to which donations are allowable as a charitable contribution under Section 170(c) of the Internal Revenue Code as amended or apply jointly with a fiscal agent which meets these requirements.
- 2. Have an active Board of Directors or advisors that meets on a regular basis and which has formally approved all COUNTY ARTS applications,
- 3. Have an on-going program of activities and services which serves the general public.

- 1. Re a resident of Milwauke county for at least one year prior to set application;
- 2 Submit evidence of recognized accomplishment in the form of substantial exhibition or performance credits,
- 3. Demonstrate a commitment to publicly exhibit or perform works in Milwaukee County within the project period.
- 4. Not be a degree credit student.

#### GENERAL FUNDING POLICIES

COUNTY ARTS grants will support activities that are directed to audiences and participants in Milwaukee County. Grant funds can be used for artist salaries and fees, honoraria, production and related administrative costs, equipment rent al, in-County travel costs, marketing and publicity.

## COUNTY ARTS grant funds cannot be used for such purposes as

- Scholaships, fellowships, tuition assistance or student projects

- Capital expenditures which include real or personal property with a value of more than \$500 and/or a usable life greater than one year

- Costs incurred before or after the effective dates of the grant contract

- Deficit financing
- Activities or travel outside Milwaukee County

- Fund-raising events

- Hospitality costs, prizes or awards

- Publication of works not created as part of COUNTY ARTS-funded project

- Activities intended primarily for an organization's membership or which do not serve the general public
- Projects that would raise funds for profit-making groups

- Administrative costs unrelated to the proposed budget

- Projects receiving direct funding from Milwaukee County government

- Indirect costs

#### MATCHING FUNDS

COUNTY ARTS grants are not meant to be the sole source of funding for a project or an organization. Grants generally must be matched with one dollar for every dollar awarded. Proposals that demonstrate evidence of a plausible cash match from earned income, individual, corporate, foundation or government grants will receive priority.

ratial funding of the instanting requirement with in-kind savices is acceptable if the in kind is contributed space, materials, loaned equipment or professional services. Professional services must be determined on a local wage scale acceptable to the MAF. Nonprofessional volunteer time cannot be considered an in-kind service. In-kind donations must be verified by the donor.

Continued funding of the same or similar project over succeeding grant periods will generally require increasing amounts of matching cash.

A COUNTY ARTS grant carries no commitment for future support beyond the term of the project.

Applicants are encouraged to realistically assess and thoroughly document the amount they actually need to complete the project identified in the proposal. Applicants' requests should be made with the understanding that COUNTY ARTS funding is finite and the MAF has the prerogative to approve an amount less than requested. Generally, if the MAF cannot fund 80% or more of an organizational project request, the applicant will not be awarded a grant.

All organizations that meet the Basic Eligibility requirements may apply for COUNTY ARTS grants, but those organizations with operating budgets of less than \$250,000 will receive priority.

Applicants meeting the Basic Eligibility Requirements may submit more than one application per funding round, but they must prioritize their requests.

- 1) Organizational Projects. Organizations whose primary function is to create and produce regular, on-going programming in the literary, performing and visual arts are eligible for funding in this category. Grants in this area are for supplementary funding of new programming, such as performances, exhibitions, workshops, artists residencies, etc. Funds may be used for artists salaries, fees, production, administrative, marketing and publicity costs related to the COUNTY ARTS-funded services. Priority will be given to well-planned projects that foster the professional growth of the applicant through the provision of the proposed community services. Organizational Projects grants will range from \$500 to \$3,000.
- 2) Individual Artist Projects. Recognized professional visual, literary and performing artists with substantial exhibition and performance credits may apply for funding to produce or complete their own work for exhibition or performance to the general public in Milwaukee County. G]

Individual Artist Awards will be limited to up to five awards of \$2,000. Eligible artists may apply to (a) create a body of new work for performance/display to the public in Milwaukee County within one year of the award or (b) provide arts services to the public through extended residencies in community and senior citizen centers, libraries, parks, and other sites open to the public and located in Milwaukee County (schools are generally not eligible for residencies). Proposals to combine both (a) and (b) are also encouraged. Artists awarded grants for (a) above will receive \$1,500 to create the work and \$500 for production/exhibition of the completed work in Milwaukee County. Artists will be selected based on the quality of past work. Awards will be made to artists in a plurality of art forms. No matching will be required. Artists awarded grants for (b) will be judged on the quality of their work, prior experience in public venues and innovation/diversity of the services to be provided and the number/variety of locations to be served. Institutions where services are to be provided generally will be required to provide a cash match.

#### APPLICATION AND REVIEW PROCEDURES

COUNTY ARTS grants will be awarded once in 1985 The application deadline will be 500 p.m. May 16, 1986 for projects occurring between June 15, 1986 and June 15, 1987.

All applications must be made on application forms available from the MAF and must be fully completed and returned to the MAF by the application deadline. Because of the need to meet review deadlines late or incomplete applications will not be accepted!

All applications will be reviewed for completeness by MAF staff and assigned to the appropriate review panel. Review panels will consist of MAF Board members and arts professionals from the community selected by the MAF Board.

After an initial review, panel comments and questions will be communicated to applicants. Applicants will have ten days to respond in writing.

Applicants will have the opportunity to attend an open hearing on their application when the panels meet a second time to make recommendations. Panels will consider the application and make a narrative judgment based on the following criteria:

- Appropriateness of the project to the focus of the COUNTY ARTS program
- Artistic merit of the project
- Anticipated benefit to the applicant's artistic/managerial growth and stability
- Community need, benefit, interest and involvement
- Degree to which local professional artists and arts personnel are employed
- Audience development potential, especially in new or undergreed condituencies
- Applicants ability to successfully implement the project and, where applicable, the ability to continue the project
- Applicants need for COUNTY ARTS funding to implement the project
- Degree of matching resources, especially cash contributions
- The relationship of the project budget to the organization's total budget
- Degree of innovation in proposed programming and non-duplication of existing programming

Panel recommendations or sich applications will be funded and fine that amount will be presented to the full MAF Board of Directors at an open meeting. Recommendations approved by the MAF Board of Directors will then be forwarded to the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors for final action.

As noted previously, the application deadline is May 16, 1986 at 5:00 p.m. All materials must be at the MAF office by that time. The timeline for panel review will be announced after all applications have been received. The MAF Board meeting to consider panel recommendations will be held on June 25, 1986. Notification letters will be sent by the MAF office by July 1, 1986.

Announcements of grant decisions will be made by letter, mailed to all applicants. Payment of grant funds will be made in keeping with the project timeline submitted with the application. Generally 45% of the grant award will be made at the beginning of the project period, 45% at the mid-point of the project and 10% after all required reports have been submitted upon completion of the project. Payments will begin after signed contracts are received by the MAF.

Projects must be completed and funds expended within the project period stipulated in the grant contract.

#### GRANTEE RESPONSIBILITIES

In addition to compliance with all relevant laws, rules and regulations stipulated in the grant contract, each grantee assumes full liability and responsibility for the conduct of the project and agrees to indemnify the Milwaukee Artists Foundation and Milwaukee County, their employees and representatives for any sum which the above entities may become liable to pay in consequence of activities performed in the project. The conduct of any COUNTY ARTS-funded project is the sole responsibility of the grantee.

Funds provided through COUNTY ARTS grants shall be expended solely for the activities described in the approved application. Changes in the approved project can be made only after the Milwaukee Artists Foundation has given written approval to a written request from the grantee. Grantees must maintain records, documents or papers which show proper expenditure of grant funds.

Final narrative and expenditure reports will be required from each grantee within 45 days of project completion or termination.

All promotional material and public announcements must indicate that the project is "supported in part by a grant from the Milwaukee Artists Foundation with funding from Milwaukee County government." Copies of all publicity must be sent to the Milwaukee Artists Foundation upon completion of the project.

WHEREAS, Milwaukee County has long recognized the important role cultural and artistic activities have on the economic vitality and quality of life of the Milwaukee Community; and

WHEREAS, the County Board has through the years annually allocated funds to support community organizations in providing quality entertainment for the entire family, free of charge; and

WHEREAS, Milwaukee County's approach to cultural programming over the years has expanded from the traditional Music Under the Stars series to include funding for numerous community organizations and individuals providing a variety of artistic genres, styles and flavors, all designed to reach a broad range of the County's residents, including those of different economic, social, ethnic, racial, age, and neighborhood backgrounds; and

WHEREAS, a report dated September 23, 1986, submitted by the Chairman of the County Board and Supervisor Dorothy K. Dean to the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture and the Committee on Finance set forth a series of recommendations addressing the County's future approach to funding cultural activities; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the following recommendations contained in said report, and recommended for approval by the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture and the Committee on Finance, be adopted by the County Board of Supervisors:



- That the County Board continue to function as the policy-setting body for Milwaukee County's cultural and artistic programs, and retain authority to establish and approve the total amount of cultural dollars to be spent in the community annually, including the allocation by program component, and approval of the final allocation of awards, whether by contract, grant, loan, subsidy, etc., to individual organizations and groups.
- 2. That the County Board, through the annual budget review process, establish the appropriation level for each program component, and that the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture be responsible for recommending the amount of dollars to be allocated to individual organizations and agencies, and submit same for County Board approval.
- 3. That the Cultural Contributions, Non-departmental Unit No. 1935, and the Performing Arts Matching Program, Non-departmental Unit No. 1968, be abolished in the 1987 budget, and a new non-departmental account, under administrative jurisdiction of the County Board, be established for the purpose of providing a Milwaukee County Arts program to serve a variety of audiences including various ethnic groups, various age groups and residents both in the community and living in restricted settings.
- 4. That for calendar year 1987, the appropriations in the account be allocated among the following program components:

## A. Cultural, Artistic, and Musical Programming Component

Under this program, Milwaukee County through its administrative agent, the Milwaukee Foundation, would enter into contractual relationships with community organizations providing, either at a nominal charge or free to the public, specified cultural, artistic and musical performances, with priority given to those using county facilities.

This program includes two types of service categories:

#### (1) Music Under the Stars

This program category represents Milwaukee County's traditional approach to cultural programming. Under this category a contract(s) would be allocated on a selective proposal basis with one or more local arts groups designed to deliver arts programming to Milwaukee County.

#### (2) Purchase of Service

This program category would provide Milwaukee County the opportunity to go beyond its traditional approach to cultural and artistic programming by allowing for a mix of arts programs based on public input, needs and wants. It is envisioned that this category would allow yearly opportunities to emphasize new priorities by County Board members and changing needs of the community.

Under this program allocation, Milwaukee County would on an annual basis determine the number and type of performances it desires to purchase through the solicitation of "Request for Proposals" based on approved eligibility criteria and guidelines.

#### B. Endowments and Grants Component

Under this program, Milwaukee County recognizes that many fine professional performing arts organization exist in the community and contribute to the quality of life in this community. With the objective of promoting new and existing arts organizations, these grants are designed to help art groups to meet their operational and programming expenses.

This program includes three types of grants:

- (1) Performing Arts Matching Grants. This grant program is designed to provide, with no quid pro quo requirements, a direct subsidy to professional performing arts organizations that meet established criteria. Only groups with an annual operating budget of less than \$300,000, after exclusions itemized under section entitled "Criteria for Matching Grant" as contained in attached criteria and guidelines, will be eligible to apply for a direct subsidy grant.
- (2) United Performing Arts Fund (UPAF) Group Rental Subsidy. Under this program Milwaukee County would provide a direct hall rent subsidy as an incentive for professional arts groups to utilize the PAC. All funds under this account would be forwarded to the PAC. The PAC will, in turn, issue a rent credit in the appropriate amount for each group.
- (3) "County Arts Program" Subgrant. Under this program, an agency is asked to coordinate a County arts subgrant program involving County-based arts groups. Project grants and technical assistance are provided to individual artists, arts organizations not served by a major fund drive, and community organizations sponsoring arts programs, currently using criteria established by the Milwaukee Artists Foundation.
- 5. That the County Board of Supervisors does hereby authorize the Chairman of the County Board to enter into an agreement with the Milwaukee Foundation to administer Milwaukee County's 1987 Arts program under guidelines and criteria approved by the County Board; with said guidelines formulated to encourage a mix of arts programs and genres with emphasis on excellence and diversity and to meet any other requirements set by the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors.
- 6. That the County Board create a Milwaukee County Cultural, Artistic and Musical Programming Advisory Council (CAMPAC). The Council shall be advisory to the County Board, the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture, and consist of nine members, all of whom shall have an interest in the arts. Appointments to the Council shall be made by the Chairman of the County Board and confirmed by the full Board. Of the persons so appointed, the initial terms of four of the members shall be for two years; and the terms of the remaining five members shall be for three years, so that all appointments to CAMPAC do not expire at one time. Each subsequent appointment shall be for a term of three years commencing September 1. CAMPAC shall select a chairman and vice-chairman from among its members. Membership shall be limited to persons who do not currently serve on boards which receive arts funding from Milwaukee County. The Council shall have authority to review all applications received under the cultural, artistic and musical programming and endowment and grant components of County arts funding and to make recommendations for awarding County funds to the County Board through the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture. Additional duties and responsibilities may be assigned as determined appropriate by the County Board.
- 7. That the County Board does hereby adopt the attached guidelines and criteria for awarding the County's 1987 arts dollars.

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## General Overview

The Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors on October 2, 1986, established the Milwaukee County Cultural, Artistic and Musical Programming Advisory Council (CAMPAC), as an advisory council to the Chairman of the County Board, the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture and the full Board. The primary purpose of the council is to advise the Board on how best to allocate budgeted county funds to community arts groups through purchase of services, endowments and grants for the provision of cultural arts programs that best serve and enhance the quality of life in the community.

CAMPAC consists of nine members with an interest in the arts appointed by the County Board chairperson and confirmed by the full Board. No paid staff members or board members or any arts agencies receiving funding from Milwaukee County may serve on the council.

The County Board of Supervisors has authorized the Chairperson of the Board the authority to enter into a contract with The Milwaukee Foundation for the purpose of administering all cultural funds. The County Board has annually appropriated property tax funds to support and encourage cultural and artistic activities in this community. The Board's long standing financial commitment to the arts is based on the belief that such activities have a direct relationship to the economic well being and quality of life of the community.

This commitment, however, should not be construed to lock the County in future budget years to the previous years funding level. It is the desire of the County Board, on an annual basis, to reexamine this commitment to ensure that our cultural dollars provide the best mix possible, maintaining and supporting those traditional activities long identified in the community, while yet remaining flexible to provide support and encouragement for small groups, local artists and new and innovative entertainment. Funding by the County carries no commitment for future support beyond the term of the project.

CAMPAC, under authority granted by the County Board, will use the following rules and guidelines in making their recommendations to the County Board through the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture.

In reviewing applications, The Milwaukee Foundation and CAMPAC evaluates individual proposals based upon service and access to the public, community interest and support for the project, compatibility of proposal and related County Board objectives, and availability of comparable services in the community. The County Board, through the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture will review each project application recommended by CAMPAC with regard to the feasibility and quality of the proposal, the "track record" of the applicant organization's ability to provide the proposed service, and a careful analysis of project and organizational budgets.

Milwaukee County encourages the development of proposals which demonstrate a willingness to cooperate with other agencies through collaborative programs or services and those showing additional sources of financial support for the proposal.

Selection will be based on programs that make a contribution to the range of cultural experience available in the County by artistic discipline, seasonal schedule, target audiences, geographic area and overall impact.

#### Contracts

When Milwaukee County awards funding under the Purchase of Service program and "Music Under the Stars", it is contracting through its administrative agent with an organization to provide services to citizens of the County. The funds must be used as specified in the approved proposal. No changes may be made to the project without notifying the County Board through its administrative agent to request approval of changes in the contract. A revised project budget must be submitted if the applicant organization revises the scope of the program based on a reduction in funding from that originally requested.

The contract must be signed by both the County's designated administrative agent, and by the individual authorized to sign by the organization under contract.

Funds will not be available until the County and its administrative agent have a signed, valid contract. Contracts are usually signed in January.

# Allowable Expenses

In the Matching Grant program, funds are intended to support the organization's general operations, not specific programs.

# Restrictions on Funds

At this time, there are no formal restrictions on the use of funds received under the Matching Grant program.

### Application

All applications submitted to The Milwaukee Foundation made under the Performing Arts Matching Grant program shall be complete when submitted. They must be properly signed, and sufficient copies submitted by the deadline date with all required documentation as indicated on the application form. Absolutely no late applications will be accepted.

The Milwaukee Foundation, through CAMPAC, will review each application and make recommendation as to grant award to the Committee on Parks, Recreation and Culture and County Board.

### Contracts

There will be no formal contract between Milwaukee County and the Matching Grant recipients. However, an "Acknowledgement of Receipt of Funding" form must be signed by both The Milwaukee Foundation and Board Chairperson of the funded organization. This further requires the organization to submit its year end report containing financial statements and a list of performances, performance sites and estimated audiences. Payments will be made within three weeks of County Board approval of Matching Grant awards.
