enslavement, execution, and disease inflicted by colonialists, leaving around 200 surviving Taino people; and

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WHEREAS, the idea of Indigenous Peoples' Day was first proposed in 1977 by a delegation of native nations to the United Nations-sponsored International Conference on Discrimination Against Indigenous Populations in the Americas; and

WHEREAS, in an effort to depict a more accurate historical record of the discovery of the Americas, representatives from 120 indigenous nations at the First Continental Conference on the 500 years of Indian Resistance unanimously passed a resolution to transform Columbus Day into an opportunity to recognize the contributions of indigenous people; and

WHEREAS, Berkeley, California, has celebrated Indigenous Peoples' Day since 1994, and South Dakota has celebrated Native American Day since 1990; and

WHEREAS, in 2011 the Affiliated Tribes of Northern Indians, representing 59 Tribes from Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Northern California, Western Montana, and some Alaskan Tribes, passed resolution #11-57, to change Columbus Day—the second Monday of October—to Indigenous Peoples' Day; and

WHEREAS, over 20 communities throughout the United States have renounced Columbus Day, and instead celebrate Indigenous Peoples' Day, including Minneapolis, St. Paul, Seattle, Bozeman, Olympia, Santa Fe, Lincoln, Albuquerque, Anchorage, and Portland: and

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48	WHEREAS, Dane County passed a resolution recognizing Indigenous Peoples'
49	Day in 2015, and the City of Madison followed in 2016; and
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51	WHEREAS, Wisconsin Act 31 mandates that students in public schools be
52	educated about Wisconsin's Native American culture in grade school, middle school,
53	and high school; and
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55	WHEREAS, the County recognizes that native land in Southeastern Wisconsin
56	was taken from the Ojibwa, Menominee, and Potawatomi for the building of our current
57	community; and
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59	WHEREAS, the County recognizes and appreciates the contributions of Native
60	American thought, culture, and technology; and
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62	WHEREAS, the County has a responsibility to oppose the systemic racism
63	towards indigenous people in the United States, which perpetuates high rates of

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67	WHEREAS, native people are not extinct, but their powerful cultures and unique
68	languages must carry on, and are deserving of recognition and commemoration; and

70	WHEREAS, the Committee on Personnel, at its meeting of December 2, 2016,
71	recommended adoption of this resolution (vote 5-0); now, therefore,
