

Milwaukee County Opioid Settlement Fund Summary of Projects Recommended for Funding *Cohort 3 (FY26-28)*

Aging and Disabilities Services Opioid Prevention Project (Department of Health and Human Services)		
Project Summary	This project provides outreach to older adults in Milwaukee County at risk for opioid misuse and overdosing by using data and GIS mapping to conduct door-to-door canvassing, distribute harm reduction supplies, and engage with senior living facilities.	
Accomplishments	 ADS hired an employee dedicated to substance abuse needs among its service population. Outreach workers made 2,815 resident contacts (via door-to-door canvassing, event booths, in neighborhoods, at senior living apartments, and at community events) and distributed 719 doses of Narcan and 1,906 test strips. 	
Target Population	Elders, adults with disabilities, and adults at risk for opioid addiction	
Intended Outcomes	Goal 1: Address the unique needs of adults at risk or older adults in Milwaukee County related to preventing and responding to opioid misuse. Goal 2: Increase Aging and Disabilities Services' ability to identify and track the prevalence of opioid misuse among older adults.

Project Summary	The project provides grants to community-based organizations and collaboratives. Selected applicants will partner with the DHHS Behavioral Health Services—Community Access to Recovery Services (CARS) program to implement projects that align with approved prevention, treatment, recovery, and harm reduction services/activities.	
Accomplishments	Between 2023 and 2025, this project granted dollars to 15 organizations that span multiple municipalities for the first time.	
Target Population	Community-based organizations and collaboratives that target historically underserved, marginalized, and/or adversely affected groups in Milwaukee.	
Intended Outcomes	To reduce silos in local opiate response through targeted efforts that ensure that a variety of community organizations benefit from regranted funds.

Project Summary	DHHS Prevention Integration includes several components: 1. Building the capacity of prevention-related employees and progress across DHHS; 2. Supporting the implementation of DHHS's OSF-funded projects and coordinating community-level education and communication regarding harm reduction and prevention strategies.	

Accomplishments Target Population	 Feedback on Prevention Integration Manager (PIM) has been overwhelmingly positive, with 6 of 8 (75%) project managers rating support received by the PIM as "very helpful" or "critical to project success". The PIM created the <u>Prevention Collective</u>, an interdisciplinary team that has adopted the strategic Prevention Framework across all service areas and identified universal screening tools implemented by all service areas. As a primarily capacity-building project, the main individuals directly involved in the project
	are DHHS staff and community-based organizations that engage in opioid misuse prevention work.

Project Summary	The Harm Reduction Supplies project was first funded in 2023, Cohort 1 of the Opioid Settlement Funds. Two major project activities from 2023 to the current year of 2025 included establishing the Harm Reduction Vending Machines (HRVM) in the community and launching the Online Depot.
Accomplishments	 The original Harm Reduction Supplies project successfully placed 18 vending machines in 16 zip codes and four municipalities. Project staff also coordinated four HRVM Host meetings, created the Harmreductionmke.org website, designed posters, yard signs, demonstration booklets, and an HRVM coordinator guidebook, and purchased DEX Meters to count materials as they leave machines and assist with inventory control.
Target Population	Zip codes with the highest counts of fatal and nonfatal overdoses: 53204, 53206, 53208, 53209, 53212, 53214 and 53215.
Intended Outcomes	Increase Milwaukee County residents' access to harm reduction and prevention supplies.

Staffing Needs (Me	dical Examiner)
Project Summary	The Office of the Medical Examiner will fund three positions through OSF: forensic pathologist (FY26-FY28), medicolegal death investigator (FY26), and forensic chemist (FY26-FY27). These positions support the scope of work of the medical examiner's office and the investigation into drug-related deaths.
Accomplishments	 Using opioid litigation settlements, the office was able to hire a medicolegal death investigator, a forensic chemist, and a forensic pathologist, resulting in: MEs office staying within the National Association of Medical Examiners' accreditation guidelines, and

Intended These additional staffing positions will affect investigations' turnaround time and capacity i the Medical Examiner's Office. Request Amount \$1,755,636 SUD Residential Room and Board (Department of Health and Human Services) Project Summary Building upon the opioid settlement project in Cohort 1 to increase SUD Residential Treatment capacity, this proposal focuses on establishing funding for the room and board (food, utilities) portion of the treatment episode for that capacity, which has been and is being built (87 additional beds). Accomplishments The SUD Residential Treatment Capacity Expande services by adding 87 additional beds of SUD residential treatment capacity. Target Population In 2024, 905 unique individuals received Residential Treatment services funded by BHS. Of those individuals, 55% were male and 45% were female; 55% were Black, 35% were white and the remainder were American Indian, Asian, or listed their race as "other."
