1 By Supervisors Vincent, Logsdon, Shea, Eckblad, File No. 25-358 2 Nicholson, Capriolo, Rolland, O'Connor, 3 and Coggs-Jones 4 5 6 AN AMENDED RESOLUTION 7 8 Urging state lawmakers to pass legislation that would set a minimum age of 21 to 9 purchase tobacco products, vapor products, marijuana, synthetic cannabinoids, and drug paraphernalia 10 11 12 13 WHEREAS, the Wisconsin Department of Health Services reported that 66% of 14 high schoolers said it is "easy to get tobacco products;" and 15 16 WHEREAS, Wisconsin's underage tobacco sales rate is more than double the 17 pre-pandemic rate - up to 13.6% in 2023 from 5.5% in 2019; and 18 19 WHEREAS, in 2023, 16.2% of high school aged youth in Wisconsin had used 20 marijuana one or more times in the previous 30 days; and 21 22 WHEREAS, vaping can harm young people's mental health and brain 23 development by exacerbating anxiety and depression as users become addicted; and 24 25 WHEREAS, in 2019, the federal legal age for purchasing tobacco was raised 26 from 18 to 21; and 27 28 WHEREAS, 2019 Assembly Bill 422 relating to raising the legal age for tobacco 29 and vaping to 21 passed the State Assembly, but the companion State Senate bill was 30 not brought to a floor vote; and 31 32 WHEREAS, in his written testimony on Assembly Bill 422, then State Representative David Crowley said, "In an internal document from 1982, a tobacco 33 34 researcher stated that, 'If a man has never smoked by the age of 18, the odds are 35 three-to-one he never will. By age 24, the odds are twenty-to-one.' That is why it is 36 critical to keep Wisconsin youth shielded from becoming regular smokers;" and 37 38 WHEREAS, in 2022, similar legislation was reintroduced and passed the State 39 Assembly but was not brought to a floor vote of the State Senate; and 40

41 WHEREAS, these state bills received vast community support, including from 42 parents, students, healthcare workers, educators, school administrators, law 43 enforcement, and retailers; and 44 45 WHEREAS, Wisconsin remains one of only eight states that has not passed a 46 statewide Tobacco 21 Law that would raise the minimum legal age in Wisconsin for 47 tobacco products to 21; and 48 49 WHEREAS, local law enforcement agencies are not mandated to enforce the 50 federal legal age without a comparable law at the state; and 51 52 WHEREAS, a report by the National Academy of Sciences projected that if the 53 entire country enacted Tobacco 21 legislation there would be a 25% drop in smoking 54 initiation among high school students; and 55 56 WHEREAS, implementing a requirement for retailers to confirm the age of 57 customers of tobacco products, vapor products, marijuana, synthetic cannabinoids, and 58 drug paraphernalia with a photo ID is critical to ensure that retailers are compliant with 59 statewide Tobacco 21 legislation; and 60 61 WHEREAS, Milwaukee County is committed to being the healthiest county in 62 Wisconsin; and 63 64 WHEREAS, the safety and wellbeing of the residents and young people of 65 Milwaukee County, and the state of Wisconsin are of paramount importance to policy 66 makers, and 67 68 WHEREAS, local governments and their elected representatives have a 69 responsibility to advocate for policies that promote the safety and security of their 70 communities, even when preempted from creating local regulations on this issue; and 71 72 WHEREAS, at the County Board of Supervisors meeting on June 26, 2025, concerns were raised that legislation such as 2019 Assembly Bill 422 may 73 74 contribute to the increased criminalization of young adults, instead of focusing 75 accountability on retailers and other businesses that illegally sell products to 76 individuals under the age of 21; and 77 78 WHEREAS, the Committee on Intergovernmental Relations (IGR), at its meeting 79 of June 9, 2025, recommended adoption of File No. 25-358 (vote 5-0); and 80 81 WHEREAS, the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors, at its meeting of 82 June 26, 2025, referred File No. 25-358 to the Committee on IGR (vote 16-0); and

WHEREAS, the Committee on IGR, at its meeting of July 7, 2025, recommended adoption of File No. 25-358 as amended (vote 5-0); now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors urges the Wisconsin State Legislature to enact legislation to set a minimum age of 21 to purchase tobacco products, vapor products, marijuana, synthetic cannabinoids, and drug paraphernalia, and to ensure that enforcement of this policy focuses on holding retailers and businesses accountable for illegal sales, rather than criminalizing young adults; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors urges the Wisconsin State Legislature to enact legislation to implement a requirement for retailers to confirm the age of customers of tobacco products, vapor products, marijuana, synthetic cannabinoids, and drug paraphernalia with a photo ID to ensure compliance with the Tobacco 21 legislation; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Milwaukee County Office of Government Affairs is authorized and requested to communicate the contents of this resolution to the Governor, members of the Wisconsin State Legislature and the Wisconsin Counties Association to promote legislative action that will help keep Wisconsin youth healthy and safe.
