

Overall Sentiment







Please allocate at least 2% of County ARPA funds in arts, culture and creativity. The arts are a powerful tool for healing, growth, and connection - all of which are needed in order for our community to thrive. For example, Ex Fabula - whose mission is to connect Milwaukee through real stories - has hosted StorySlams in ASL and in

Spanish that have helped connect folks of different languages and cultures. We've also hosted affinity group storytelling spaces for People of the Global Majority (aka BIPOC folks); one participant wrote on a survey that "I am a scaredy-cat and that was a perfect environment to get my storytelling feet wet! The hosts were everything and I met a new friend."

Now, you might think, "Someone made a new friend? Big whoop." However, young people of color are leaving our city in droves - and the folks that are staying are ranking the city of Milwaukee as a "fair" or "poor" place to live. Ex Fabula's programming leverages the arts to create spaces where the community can wrestle with these challenges - and build understanding of the root causes - and find a way forward together.

So, let's not let other regions leave us behind. In Denver, for example, they've put 2 million of ARPA funds toward Neighborhood activation grants for community-serving organizations to use toward events and arts and cultural activities and another 1.2 million to Arts and Culture directly (https://www.denvergov.org/files/assets/public/finance/documents/office-of-cfo/stimulus-documents/2021economicrecovery_siac-meeting11-10-2021.pdf).

I know there are many many competing priorities, but sometimes, bandaids won't cut it; you gotta treat the underlying cause of all the owies, and the arts can help us to do just that.



As you consider this unprecedented opportunity to invest ARPA funding for catalytic change in the county, please prioritize Investment in arts, culture, and creativity. Such investments will help Milwaukee be better as we emerge from COVID-19. A vibrant arts and culture community helps to increase community cohesion, inclusion, and equity.

There is no doubt that the County has many fiscal challenges that can't be ignored. Investing in the arts and creativity can be a part of the solution. Yet too often, the arts and creativity is seen as a "nice" to have, when countless examples and studies show its tangible impact on many aspects of a community. Compared to many other cities and counties across the country, Milwaukee ranks towards the bottom of arts funding and creative approaches to improve our community through the arts. The City of Milwaukee invests just .02% of its annual budget in our sector; The County is better because of its relationships with our cultural institutions (MPM, MAM, Marcus Center, Parks and others) however, its programmatic investment through CAMPAC is also around .02%. But, CAMPAC is also only available for performing arts organization. If the County wants to address equity, what about all the artists and creatives working in the poorest neighborhoods of our county?

Here is just one of many innovative proposals that other communities are considering to fund with ARPA dollars. Creative Greensboro, the City of Greensboro's office of arts and culture, will award \$60,000 through a new Catalyzing Creativity Grants program. The grants will provide financial support to nonprofits or individuals to engage historically marginalized communities through creative programming.

Founded in 2019, Creative Greensboro provides support for, ensures access to and drives awareness of Greensboro's creative community. The Catalyzing Creativity Grants program was born out of one of the strategies of the City's arts plan. Applicants must be Guilford County-based with a creative program or project that will occur in Greensboro. Creative programs may include natural sciences, history, architecture, technology, visual arts, performing arts, and literature. Applicants may request up to 50 percent of project expenses, up to \$10,000.

Thank you for the important work you are doing -- be bold, be the change we need.
