Family Living programs respond to local needs through education and partnerships that support stability and well-being of families and strengthens our community. Our professional development programs enhance knowledge and skill levels of staff serving families in community-based organizations, home visitation programs, social service agencies, early childhood education and health care.

The Nutrition Education program provides interactive education to income eligible seniors, families and youth at no cost. Nutrition lessons help learners make healthier food choices, keep foods safe, and balance food intake with activity.

Pre-college programs focus on science, engineering, and technology to lay the groundwork for success in the new economy. Youth develop skills through hands-on, practical, research-based, fun activities. Through these activities, they also explore their cultural heritage, learn entrepreneurship and develop pride in their accomplishments.



Horticulture & Urban Agriculture: Gardening for Sustainability, Health, and Profit

Did you know that gardeners eat twice as many vegetables and get twice as much exercise as non-gardeners? Or that the value of your home increases 15-25% with attractive landscaping? In Milwaukee County, Extension rents gardens to urban residents who need space to raise vegetables and fruit to feed their families, donate to food pantries and sell at farmers markets. Extension also helps homeowners learn to manage their landscapes in ways that save money, protect the environment, feed their families and add value to their property.


About Milwaukee County Cooperative Extension (MCCE)
