1 By Supervisors Taylor (5), Logsdon, Eckblad, Vincent, File No. 25-221 2 Gómez-Tom, Martin, Bielinski, Capriolo, Martinez, 3 Coggs-Jones, O'Connor, Shea, and Rolland 4 5 6 7 A RESOLUTION 8 9 Recognizing February 18 as Vel Phillips Day in Milwaukee County to celebrate the life 10 and legacy of The Honorable Vel Phillips 11 12 13 WHEREAS, The Honorable Vel Phillips, who was born Velvalea Rodgers on 14 February 18, 1924, grew up in Milwaukee County on Milwaukee's south side and 15 graduated from North Division High School; and 16 17 WHEREAS, Phillips lived in Bronzeville, a majority African American 18 neighborhood in Milwaukee, where she began her career; and 19 20 WHEREAS, Phillips accomplished many "firsts" in her life while building critical 21 connections across racial divides to influence change in Milwaukee County: 22 23 Phillips was the first Black woman to graduate from the University of 24 Wisconsin Law School. 25 • Phillips was the first woman and first African American elected to the 26 Milwaukee Common Council. 27 Phillips was the first female judge in Milwaukee County and the first African 28 American judge in Wisconsin. 29 • Phillips was the first woman and African American elected to serve as 30 Secretary of State. 31 32 ; and 33 34 WHEREAS, Phillips is known for these "firsts" and is revered for her determined. 35 non-violent advocacy for civil rights and fair housing; and 36 37 WHEREAS, while on the Milwaukee Common Council, she introduced the 38 Phillips Housing Ordinance in 1962 which would have outlawed racial discrimination 39 among landlords and real estate agents in Milwaukee; and 40

41 WHEREAS, Phillips remained committed to public service, continuing to speak to 42 school groups and serve on the boards of the Wisconsin Conservatory and America's 43 Black Holocaust Museum; and 44 45 WHEREAS, Phillips passed away on April 17, 2018, at the age of 95—50 years 46 after the passage of federal fair housing legislation; and 47 48 WHEREAS, across Milwaukee County, there are several reminders of her legacy including: North 4th Street, from Bronzeville to downtown, named in her honor; and a 49 50 greenspace in downtown Milwaukee, also named for her; and 51 52 WHEREAS, on January 30, 2009, Milwaukee County honored Phillips by 53 renaming the Milwaukee County Children's Court Center to the Vel R. Phillips Juvenile 54 Justice Center; and 55 56 WHEREAS, at the dedication of the Vel R. Phillips Juvenile Justice Center, 57 Phillips explained that she was inspired by Winston Churchill's quote, "We earn a living 58 by what we get. We make a life by what we give," —a testament to the service and 59 character of Phillips; 60 61 WHEREAS, Phillips insisted that the words juvenile justice be made part of the 62 building's name, "Some of the poor kids who came out there didn't get much justice. I 63 was very determined that while I was there, justice would be distributed evenly;" 64 65 WHEREAS, Milwaukee County is dedicated to celebrating the life and legacy of 66 The Honorable Vel Phillips and is appreciative of the work she did to make Milwaukee 67 County stronger and more equitable; and 68 69 WHEREAS, the Committee on Intergovernmental Relations, at its meeting of 70 April 7, 2025, recommended adoption of File No. 25-221 (vote 5-0); now, therefore, 71 72 BE IT RESOLVED, the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors hereby 73 recognizes February 18 as Vel Phillips Day in Milwaukee County to celebrate the life 74 and legacy of The Honorable Vel Phillips annually on her birthday; and 75 76 BE IT RESOLVED, the community is encouraged to celebrate Vel Phillips and 77 her legacy annually by learning about her contributions to civil and housing rights and 78 supporting causes that align with her advocacy for racial equity. 79 80 81 82 04/07/25 s:\\committees\2025\april\igr apr 7\resolutions\25-221 taylor (5) vel Phillips day.docx
