10 11 12	WHEREAS, infant mortality refers to the death of a child prior to his or her first birthday; and
13 14 15	WHEREAS, the 2017 City of Milwaukee (the City) Fetal Infant Mortality Review (FIMR) Report shows a three-year rolling average from 2012 to 2015 of an overall infant mortality rate (IMR) of 9.8 deaths per 1,000 births; and
16 17 18 19	WHEREAS, for comparison, the overall IMR for the State of Wisconsin over the same period is only 5.7; and
20 21 22	WHEREAS, even more shocking is the racial disparity in the IMR in the City where the IMR for non-Hispanic Blacks is 14.9, over three times more than non-Hispanic Whites (4.9) and Hispanics (4.4); and
23 24 25	WHEREAS, since 2000, the IMR has declined for all ethnic groups in the City, but the disparity between black and white infant deaths persists; and
26 27 28 29 30	WHEREAS, this disparity is also seen throughout the nation, with the United States Department of Health and Human Services-Office on Minority Health reporting an IMR of 10.9 for Non-Hispanic Blacks, which is more than double that of Non-Hispanic Whites (4.9); and
31 32 33 34 35	WHEREAS, the leading causes of infant death include complications of prematurity (55.6 percent), congenital anomalies (20.8 percent), and Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS) (15.9 percent); and
36 37	WHEREAS, the Milwaukee Health Department (MHD) has stated that infant mortality reduction is its highest priority in Milwaukee; and
38 39 40 41	WHEREAS, MHD's programs include clinic services, education, Cribs for Kids, home visitation, teen pregnancy prevention, men's health programs, and more; and
41 42 43	WHEREAS, additionally, the City has its "Strong Baby" campaign and "Best Babies Zone"initiative to reduce infant mortality; and

44 45 WHEREAS, the Milwaukee County Medical Examiner's Office participates in the prevention of infant death by conducting thorough investigations, sharing data, 46 47 participating in FIMR and infant death review committees at the local and state levels, 48 maintaining high professional standards, enhancing public health through education, 49 and protecting deceased individuals and their loved ones; and 50 51 WHEREAS, numerous community partners throughout Milwaukee County (the 52 County) are also working to reduce infant mortality including groups such as: United 53 Way of Greater Milwaukee and Waukesha Counties, The Black Health Coalition of 54 Wisconsin, Inc., Children's Health Alliance of Wisconsin, Columbia-St. Mary's Hospital, 55 Aurora Sinai Midwifery and Wellness Center, Froedtert Hospital and the Medical 56 College of Wisconsin, Sixteenth Street Community Health Center Milwaukee Clinic, and 57 many others; and 58 59 WHEREAS, the FIMR includes the following actions for improving birth 60 outcomes: 61 62 Ensuring the spacing of pregnancies (at least 18 months) • • Preventative and quality care for health conditions including diabetes. 63 64 hypertension, infections (Urinary Tract Infections and Sexually Transmitted Diseases), mental health, smoking and marijuana use, and weight management 65 Improving overall social and economic health and well-being 66 Connecting patients with resources and improving patient engagement 67 • Assuring and increasing patient centered prenatal and infant case management 68 69 Promoting and teaching reproductive life planning 70 Promoting healthy relationships to eliminate coercion, rape, and sex trafficking 71 72 ; and 73 74 WHEREAS, the FIMR also notes that sleep-related deaths are the third leading 75 cause of infant death in Milwaukee and emphasizes the importance of a safe sleep 76 environment in preventing infant deaths; and 77 78 WHEREAS, infant mortality is a major health concern for the County and it is 79 important to bring awareness to the issue, as well as recognize the ongoing efforts to 80 reduce infant mortality and eliminate the IMR racial disparity; and 81 82 WHEREAS, the Committee on Health and Human Needs, at its meeting of 83 January 24, 2018, recommended adoption of File No. 17-796 (vote 5-0); now, therefore, 84

85 BE IT RESOLVED, the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors 86 87 (County Board) seeks to raise awareness of the issue of infant mortality in Milwaukee County (the County); and 88 89 90 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the County Board recognizes the ongoing efforts 91 of the City of Milwaukee to address this health crisis through projects such as the 92 "Strong Baby" campaign and the "Best Babies Zone" initiative; and 93 94 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the County Board also recognizes all the 95 community partners working in the field to improve birth outcomes in the County. 96 97 98 99 100 ars

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
