Dear James,

This communication is in response to the letters you have submitted to the Company on various issues. In your letters you raise concerns related to mechanical problems with buses and fare boxes. With respect to the fare boxes, MTS has been in ongoing communications with the Union with respect to the fare box project, sharing both the time line for each phase and the unanticipated setbacks we have experienced. MTS continues to take affirmative steps to ensure the fare box project will be successful. Regarding the concerns raised about mechanical problems on the bus, when MTS took delivery of the 5400's there were issues related to the brake interlock system as well as the kneeling feature. Those problems have since been resolved by the manufacturer, New Flyer.

The Union has also raised concerns about transit security, specifically that the current security contractor should be permitted the option to use tazers. We believe our buses are safe and 99.8% of rides are incident free. As you know MTS takes the following security measures to ensure bus operators and passengers are safe:

- All buses are equipped with on-board cameras and a silent alarm (direct contact to the Dispatch office and activation of on-board microphone)
- Dispatchers have transit security on speed dial.
- G4S personnel carry pepper spray and use it sparingly only when dealing with elevated situations off the bus (this occurs on average twice a year).

If ATU has information, including reports and statistical analysis from comparable transit systems where the use of tasers have been effective in deterring and reducing on-board bus security incidents, MTS is willing to review such information. MTS continues to be committed to working with ATU on exploring reasonable and cost-effective solutions to improving security on transit buses.

Finally, the Union has requested that the Company create a maintenance training program in order to create an advancement option for cleaner-tankers who may want to become bus mechanics. While MTS believes this subject would be best discussed at the bargaining table, we are open to discussing mechanic training program models in advance of the upcoming labor negotiations. If ATU has information on mechanic training program models that are successful at other transit properties, please provide me with the training program details, including structure and curriculum.

I write to urge you to move swiftly to begin the rulemaking process on a proposal to protect transit operators from assault, as required by the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act, Public Law 114-94.

The threat faced by bus and transit operators every day is real. The recent assault by a passenger using a jar of urine against a bus operator in Washington DC is only the latest in a string of violent attacks directed towards drivers. Last year, a driver for the Milwaukee County Transit System related her trauma from seeing the police shoot a passenger who had assaulted her as well as officers who came to her aid. Sadly, such incidents are no exception. These attacks not only threaten the health and well-being of these public servants, but it also directly affects the safety and security of their passengers.

In response to rising concerns about the safety of transit operators, Congress included a requirement in the FAST ACT (sec. 3022) that the U.S. Department of Transportation propose a rule to protect public transportation operators from assault within 90 days of completing a review of public transportation safety standards. It is my understanding that the safety standards review was released in January 2017.

Despite a host of events in the last year to gather information from the public and stakeholders on the problem of assault and violence against bus and transit operators, the Federal Transit or helpful.

New rules cannot prevent every assault. However, they can help create national standards that transit agencies can use to create a safe environment for the men and women who are responsible for the transportation of tens of millions of Americans each day. The FTA has rightly acknowledged in the past that "any form of violence against transit workers poses a serious

Thank you for contacting me about the importance of public transportation. I appreciate you sharing with me the concerns of the Amalgamated Transit Union Local 998.

Public transportation is one of the most vital components of a 21st century infrastructure network. I have always been a strong partner in advancing Wisconsin's transportation projects that connect people to jobs. Efficient and affordable public transportation will positively benefit our society, environment and economy.

President Trump has called for a \$1 trillion investment to rebuild our nation's crumbling infrastructure. Assist in the drafting, lobbying and passage of legislation that would prohibit any person from carrying a loaded firearm on any public transportation conveyance (vehicle) in the State of Wisconsin. This could be included in Wisconsin State Statute 941.235, Carrying firearm in public building. All exclusions mentioned in Wisconsin State Statute 941.23, all sub-sections, would apply. This would be considered a Class A misdemeanor or Class I felony.

Assist in the drafting, lobbying and passage of legislation that would prohibit any person from throwing or expelling bodily fluids at any public transportation operator or official, operating or staffing any public transportation vehicle, in the State of Wisconsin. Public transportation operators or officials could be included in Wisconsin State Statute 941.375, Throwing or discharging bodily fluids at public safety workers. This would be considered a Class I Felony and could also be used in conjunction with Wisconsin State Statute 940.20 (6), (a), (b), sub.1,2 and 3, Battery to Public Transit Vehicle Operator, Driver, or Passenger (also a Class I Felony).

Assist in the drafting, lobbying and passage of legislation that would enable regions around the state to form Regional Transit Authorities. We believe this type of legislation could assist communities through the combining of certain resources to achieve not only multi-modal transportation choices, but routing that spans several parts of individual regions at affordable prices.

Assist in the drafting, lobbying and passage of legislation that would create a dedicated funding source for state-wide public transportation. Although ATU998, the state's largest union representing transit operators and mechanics in the southeastern area of the state is based in Milwaukee, we recognize the importance of proper funding for every public transportation system in the state. In the past eight years and under a different administration, public transportation has seen a decrease in assistance from the state that has caused many public transit systems to raise fares, cut routes, and operate vehicles well past their FTA useful life span.

Dear Supervisor Mayo:

At this time, our local is aware of the county board's search for a solution in bringing our workers in-house. As stated previously, it is our desire that Milwaukee Transit Services remain the overseer of the company (Milwaukee County Transit System). We are very interested in your attempt to restructure the top two executives as county employees. It is the local's understanding that there will be no transitions of the employees. Other alternatives that were presented to us regarding the RFP, would not benefit the need to serve the riding public.

I am asking the county board to consider allowing the Sheriff to manage the security firm (G4S) for Milwaukee County Transit System. Our security suffers the need of accountability for the safety of our drivers and passengers. We believe working with the Sheriff and deputies would help make a difference in providing the safety needed for the protection of our drivers and passengers.

In the past, a solution had been presented to the board in reference to my above request, but at that time, a former county supervisor stated that it could not be done, due to MCTS overseeing the security, during the contract. I believe with the combined effort of the Sheriff, deputies, and the security firm (G4S), we can accomplish our goals, with the needed security for the protection of our drivers and passengers.

As you are aware, due to the Concealed Carry of Firearm law, many of our passengers are carrying weapons on the bus. Even though there may be passengers who are licensed to carry a concealed firearm, there are others who are unlicensed to do so. I have asked that our security be allowed to carry Tasers for their safety when confronted by a life-threatening situation or when needed. The security officers have backgrounds in the Military Law Enforcement and other security backgrounds. They are capable and trained to carry Tasers.

Dan Boehm and I are working on other issues of concern. Yet, questions remain concerning the justification of recent promotions.

In closing, thank you for your support. As in the past, we will definitely support you in the near future.

PRELIMINARY DRAFT - NOT READY FOR INTRODUCTION

AN ACT to amend 175.60 (2g) (a); and to create 175.60 (16) (a) 9. and 941.22 of the statutes; relating to: possessing a weapon on a motor bus used for public transit and providing a criminal penalty.

Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

This bill makes it a Class I felony to possess, with certain exceptions, a weapon on a motor bus that is used for public transit. Under current law, a person may generally carry a weapon that is not concealed. A person who has a license to carry a concealed weapon may generally possess the concealed weapon into any area, but may not possess a concealed weapon in certain excluded areas, including in law enforcement or court buildings, in correctional facilities, in certain mental health institutions, beyond security checkpoints in airports, on school grounds and premises, in taverns if the person is consuming alcohol, at special events where organizers don't allow it, or in businesses or on private property where the owner prohibits or limits concealed weapons.

Under this bill, only a person who is a current or former law enforcement officer or a game warden may possess a weapon on a bus that is used for public transit, regardless of whether the person has a license to carry a concealed weapon. A person who does so is subject to a fine up to \$10,000, imprisonment for up to three years and

six months, or both.

FARE DISPUTES

TO ALL OPERATORS:

When a question arises with a customer as to payment of a fare, the correct fare, or the validity of a pass, ticket or transfer, the Operator should inform the customer of the proper fare and request the fare only once, in a polite manner.

If the customer persists, the Operator should not further request the proper fare. Operators should not inconvenience other customers by delaying service due to a fare dispute unless it is unsafe to continue. For the safety of Operators and customers, Operators should not become verbally aggressive toward the customer. Operators should never attempt to detain a customer for any reason.

Operators should contact the Dispatcher using the Fare Dispute message when a customer boards with a blocked M•CARD or to request assistance with customers who repeatedly board without paying the proper fare. Operators should also file an Operator Security Report if additional assistance by Transit Security is needed.

Concealed Carry Facts for MCTS Employees

On November 1, 2011, the state of Wisconsin the concealed weapon law. It is now legal in Wisconsin to OPEN carry and CONCEALED carry a hand gun on an MCTS bus without interference.

Here are some frequently asked questions about the law:

Who is qualified to get a license?

Those persons over 21, without a felony conviction, and who are not otherwise prohibited by rule of the courts can carry a concealed weapon. The state requires proof of 4 hours of training before obtaining a license.

What does this mean?

The license is for a "weapon" to be carried concealed on a license-holder's person. Wisconsin State Statute § 941.295 (1c)(a) defines "weapon" as a handgun, an electric weapon (like a Taser), or a knife (other than a switchblade), or a club. Carrying concealed on your "person" means that the weapon is being carried somewhere on a person's body and hidden completely from view.

What are the requirements to carry concealed weapons (CCW)?

A person who is carrying a concealed weapon must have a valid Wisconsin CCW license and a valid state photo ID with them at all times.

ONLY LAW ENFORCEMENT CAN ASK A PERSON TO SEE HIS OR HER LICENSE!

Where does the law prohibit people from carrying?

- Any portion of a building that is a police station, sheriff's office, state patrol station, or the
 office of a special agent of DOJ
- Any portion of a building that is a prison, jail, house of correction, or correctional facility
- Any secured unit or secured portion of a mental health institution
- Any portion of a building that is a municipal, county, state, or federal courthouse
- A place beyond a security checkpoint in an airport
- In a school or on a school playground

Can people carry a weapon on a bus?

Yes. Law prohibits us from denying access to persons with weapons.

Can people who are licensed carry a weapon into a MCTS Building?

NO. Milwaukee County is passing an ordinance that prohibits persons from carrying a concealed weapon in buildings that are posted. All MCTS buildings will prohibit weapons

Can employees who have a CCW license carry a weapon while working?

NO. MCTS work rules prohibit employees and contractors from being in possession of a weapon (concealed or not) while on duty.

Does the new law affect open carry?

The new law specifies that "qualified" persons may "open" carry without a license and will not be charged with a disorderly conduct citation.

Can a person be drunk or drink alcohol and carry a weapon?

NO. A person cannot be under the influence of an intoxicant or controlled substance while carrying a weapon (concealed or not)

What do I do if I see a person with a weapon in an MCTS building?

- 1. Assess the behavior of the person who is armed: Are they calm and in control, or based on their behavior, do they seem unstable?
- 2. If the person is calm and seems law abiding, carefully approach the person and inform the person of the firearms restriction in our facility.

If an employee does not feel comfortable speaking with an armed person, contact dispatch to have the Security Manager or Route Supervisor assist.

 to a safe location away from the armed person and contact dispatch. (414)9373277

A person may be subject to a **Class B forfeiture** if he or she carries a firearm on the property after being notified not to remain on the property or remain with a specific type of firearm. We have the obligation to notify that person that weapons are prohibited in MCTS buildings before we contact law enforcement.

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Legal Issues for bus operators

General Comments:

Times are difficult and more and more people are using the bus, thereby exposing drivers to more and more people under stress. When people are the most unruly – St. Patrick's Day or New Year's Eve – we encourage them to ride the bus!

Challenges

There are 4 legs of the justice system, and all have to be working together to ensure the outcome is satisfying to the victim.

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- 1. Law enforcement
- District Attorney's Office
 Judges

 - 4. The Correctional system

The police have to charge the offender correctly if the DA is even going to see the case. The DA can work hard to gather evidence to suggest maximum penalties, but it is ultimately the judge and prison system that determine how long someone stays in jail, prison or the house of correction.

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Battery: Felony or Misdemeanor?

- Bus operators are important to the community and therefore, they; like public school teachers. police officers and firefighters, are a protected class. If there is a battery committed on a bus to a driver or passenger – instead of being a misdemeanor, the act could be charged as a felony. Operators tend to underplay the severity of incidents - so report all incidents.
- Battery Definition: (SS 940.20) Person(s) intentionally causes physical pain or bodily harm to another without consent. (The penalty for battery increases with the amount of bodily harm caused.)
- The Operator who was involved must be the complainant in case of battery. If unwilling to press charges, no one else can charge on his or her behalf.
- Battery to a public transit operator or passenger is a class I felony with a maximum penalty of 2 years in prison and/or up to a \$10,000 fine V and product a specific and the second se

Disorderly conduct (DC) 947.01

- A person who recklessly, knowingly, or intentionally:
 - (1) engages in fighting or in tumultuous conduct;
 - (2) Makes unreasonable noise and continues to do so after being asked to stop; or
 - (3) Disrupts a lawful assembly of persons;
- According to Wisconsin's disorderly conduct statute, the types of behavior that can be considered to be disorderly include: abusive, violent, indecent, profane, boisterous, or unreasonably loud behavior, which includes drunk and disorderly. Whether conduct qualifies as disorderly is at the police officer's discretion.

What happens after perpetrator is charged criminally?

- 1. Operator will receive a call from an Asst. DA within 48 hours.
- 2. Within 10 days of charge, the operator will need to attend a preliminary hearing where he/she takes the stand and says what happens. This hearing will be very brief and led by the DA. These hearings are usually waived by the defendant.
- 3. A "no contact" order with the operator is issued after the preliminary hearing.
- 4. DA will first review if perpetrator has drug/alcohol addiction problem or history of mental illness before felony charges are issued. The goal is not to criminalize these problems.
- 5. If there is no addiction or mental illness, the DA will recommend incarceration.

Stress Management Effects of Stress

The type of stress matters

Stress can affect you both instantly (acute stress) and over time (chronic stress).

Acute (*short-term*) stress is the body's instant response to any situation that seems demanding or dangerous. Your stress level depends on how intense the stress is, how long it lasts, and how you cope with the situation.

Most of the time, your body recovers quickly from acute stress. But stress can cause problems if it happens too often or if your body doesn't have a chance to recover. In people with heart problems, acute stress can trigger an abnormal heartbeat (arrhythmia) or even a heart attack.

Chronic (long-term) stress is caused by stressful situations or events that last over a long period of time. This could include having a difficult job or dealing with a chronic disease. If you already have a health problem, stress can make it worse.

Stress causes changes in your body. It also affects your emotions.

How stress affects the body

Common symptoms of acute stress include:

- A fast heartbeat.
- A headache.
- A stiff neck and/or tight shoulders.
- Back pain.
- Fast breathing.
- Sweating, and sweaty palms.
- · An upset stomach or nausea

Over time, chronic stress can affect your body:

Immune system

Constant stress can make you more likely to get sick more often. And if you have a chronic illness such as diabetes, heart disease or even skin disorders, stress can make your symptoms worse.

Heart.

Stress is linked to high blood pressure, abnormal heartbeat (arrhythmia), blood clots, and hardening of the arteries (atherosclerosis). It's also linked to coronary artery disease, heart attack, and heart failure.

Muscles. Constant tension from stress can lead to neck, shoulder, and low back pain. Stress may make rheumatoid arthritis worse.

Stress Management Reducing the Effects of Stress

What can you do to avoid stress?

- Not come in to work...
- Not pick up problem passengers
- Ignore everyone

Are these feasible?

If stress is unavoidable, what can you do?

- Don't try to control the uncontrollable. Many things in life are beyond our control— particularly
 the behavior of other people. Rather than stressing out over them, focus on the things you can
 control such as the way you choose to react to problems.
- Reframe the problem Try to view stressful situations from a more positive perspective. Rather than fuming about a traffic jam, look at it as an opportunity to pause and regroup
- Look at the big picture Take perspective of the stressful situation. Ask yourself how important
 it will be in the long run. Will it matter in a month? A year? Is it really worth getting upset over?
 If the answer is no, focus your time and energy elsewhere.
- Adjust your standards Perfectionism is a major source of avoidable stress. Stop setting
 yourself up for failure by demanding perfection. Set reasonable standards for yourself and
 others, and learn to be okay with the way things are.
- Focus on the positive When focusing on the behavior of a few, take a moment to reflect on all the good passengers you encounter and remember that they are the majority. In your down time, reflect on things you appreciate about the job and the things that you are really great at. Try to keep things in perspective.

ACTIVE SHOOTER INFORMATION

An active shooter is an individual actively engaged in killing or attempting to kill people in a confined and populated area, typically through the use of firearms.

How to respond when an active shooter is in your vicinity

- 1. Evacuate
 - a. Have an escape route and plan in mind
 - b. Leave your belongings behind
 - c. Keep your hands visible to law enforcement
- 2. Hide out
 - a. Hide in an area out of the shooter's view
 - Block entry to your hiding place and lock the doors
 - c. Silence your cell phone or other personal electronics
- 3. Take action
 - As a last resort and only when your life is in imminent danger
 - b. Attempt to incapacitate the shooter
 - c. Act with physical aggression or throw things at the shooter

CALL DISPATCH OR 911 WHEN IT IS SAFE TO DO SO

When law enforcement arrives:

- Remain calm and follow instructions
- Put down any items in your hands (i.e., bags, jackets, phones, etc.)
- Raise hands and spread fingers
- Keep hands visible at all times
- Avoid quick movements toward officers
- Avoid pointing, screaming or yelling
- Do not stop to ask officers for help or direction when evacuating they will be focused on stopping the shooter.
