Wisconsin Section 85.21 Specialized Transportation Assistance Program for Counties

BACKGROUND

State financial aid is available to counties through the 2022 Specialized Transportation Assistance Program for Counties, as authorized by Section 85.21, Wisconsin Statutes. This aid is allocated according to each county's share of the state's elderly and disabled population.

A county may use its allocated aid in a variety of ways. It may directly provide specialized transportation service. It may purchase service from, or assist, any other public or private organization that supplies such service or it may directly subsidize elderly or disabled persons for their use of existing services such as taxis. Both equipment acquisitions and operating expenses are eligible, as are the related expenses of coordination, technical studies, and inservice training.

In order to receive its allocation, a county must provide a 20 percent cash match, conduct a public hearing, and submit an application. The due date for submission of the 2022 application is December 31, 2021.

Milwaukee County is scheduled to receive \$2,288,868 in 2022, a 1.82 percent decrease over the 2021 allocation. The funds will provide support to Transit Plus (\$1,636,458) and the Department of Health and Human Services Division on Aging's Specialized Transportation Program (\$652,410). There is a slight bottom-line financial impact to the County as the estimated program funds in the 2022 operating budgets for the respective departments are based on the prior year actuals (approx. \$42,448 decrease).
