## **A RESOLUTION**

Authorizing and directing the Government Affairs Liaison to request the United States Department of Justice examine the State of Wisconsin's shared revenue system

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin Shared Revenue Program provides general unrestricted aid to counties and municipalities through various programs and according to the 2017 Legislative Fiscal Bureau Informational Paper 18, Wisconsin's Shared Revenue Program has declined significantly in the past two decades; and

WHEREAS, in 1994-1995, shared revenue was 12.5 percent of the total general fund budget and in 2016-2017, shared revenue made up just five percent, so as state shared funding has remained flat, Milwaukee County is constantly tasked with doing more with less funding; and

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin's shared revenue system and the funding formulas used to determine annual distribution amounts for municipalities, is not treating citizens of Milwaukee County equally; and

WHEREAS, according to the Wisconsin Department of Health Services, Black residents comprise 6.1 percent of the state's total population, while Milwaukee County is home to 69.4 percent of Wisconsin's Black residents; and

WHEREAS, the City of Milwaukee makes up 63 percent of the County's total population, including 96 percent of the County's Black residents and 81 percent of the County's Latino population; and

WHEREAS, therefore, the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors represent the majority of the people of color in the State of Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, annual shortfalls in shared revenue distribution to Milwaukee County has diminished the county's funding capacity for a variety of critical public services; and,

WHEREAS, consequently, the state shared revenue system and current funding formulas disproportionately impact Milwaukee County's Black and Latino residents' access to adequate public services, including transportation and public safety; and

WHEREAS, the plight of the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors warrants a federal Department of Justice examination of Wisconsin's shared revenue system and funding formulas as Milwaukee County's revenue share is not consistent with the cost of inflation; and

WHEREAS, the Committee Judiciary, Safety, and General Services, at its meeting of January 20, 2022, recommended adoption of File No. 22-296 (vote 5-0); now, therefore, BE IT RESOLVED, the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors authorizes and directs the Government Affairs Liaison to submit a request that the United States Department of Justice review examines the State of Wisconsin's shared revenue system and funding formulas under the Civil Rights Act of 1964, and the 14th Amendment of the U.S. Constitution; and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Government Affairs Liaison shall request raw data from the State of Wisconsin for all 72 Wisconsin counties regarding the shared revenue payments and disbursements for the past ten years; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Government Affairs Liaison shall provide the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors a written copy of the request within 30 days of adopting this resolution.
