AN ENGROSSED RESOLUTION

supporting a policy that video and telephone agreements for the Milwaukee County
Office of the Sheriff and the House of Correction provide residents of Milwaukee
County's correctional facilities with at least 75 minutes of free video calls per week and
at least 75 minutes of free voice calls per week

WHEREAS, residents at the Milwaukee County Jail and the House of Correction (HOC) are able to make both voice and video calls throughout their stay to communicate with family, friends, and members of their legal team, which is critical for them to receive familial and financial support, retain legal advice, and communicate about their needs; and

WHEREAS, a 2011 report from the Vera Institute of Justice, "Close to Home: Building on Family Support for People Leaving Jail", found that residents who maintain contact with supportive family members are more likely to succeed after their release and reintegrate back into their communities; and

WHEREAS, the same report found that, of family members surveyed, 39 percent indicated that the cost of phone calls is a significant barrier to communication; and

WHEREAS, a 2006 article in Family Law Quarterly titled "Recidivism and Paternal Engagement" found that increased communication between residents and their children positively impacts recidivism rates and suggests that facilities should encourage developing parent-child relationships while incarcerated; and

WHEREAS, voice and video call usage has increased during the COVID-19 pandemic because in-person visits are not possible and in-person visits are positively correlated to an individual's chances of successful reentry into their communities; and

WHEREAS, when in-person visits are possible, there is not a direct bus line to the HOC, requiring passengers to transfer one or more times or find alternative forms of transit and visitation hours end at 6 PM, making it difficult for loved ones to visit after work or school; and

WHEREAS, the HOC is actively working on securing a new contract for phone and video call services, but it has not yet been brought to the County Board for approval; and

WHEREAS, under the current contract, the HOC charges \$0.21 per minute for a voice call and residents receive two free phone calls per week, which they can place at any time; and

WHEREAS, the HOC charges \$0.40 per minute for a video call, which is charged in minimum 30-minute blocks of time; and

WHEREAS, in May 2021, 80,899 phone calls were made at the HOC, totaling 696,511 minutes; and

WHEREAS, the Office of the Sheriff, in the 2021 Adopted Budget, contracted with CenturyLink, Inc. for Inmate Phone Commissions and Video Visitation Commissions in the amounts of \$1,350,000 and \$50,000, respectively, although based on changing population amounts and the COVID-19 pandemic it is not guaranteed that they'll receive these budgeted for amounts; and

WHEREAS, the Office of the Sheriff charges \$0.21 per minute for a voice call and residents receive two free phone calls which they can place at any time during their stay; there is also a free phone line that residents may use to place phone calls to the Public Defender's Office at any time during booking or in their assigned housing units; and

WHEREAS, the Office of the Sheriff charges \$0.40 per minute for a video call, which is charged in minimum 30-minute blocks of time; and

 WHEREAS, in August 2020, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) released a proposal that would reduce its interstate rate caps in federal facilities, which are currently \$0.21 per minute for debit and prepaid calls and \$0.25 per minute for collect calls, to \$0.14 per minute for debit, prepaid, and collect calls from prisons and \$0.16 per minute for debit, prepaid, and collect calls from jails; and

WHEREAS, the 2022 Recommended Budget reduces telephone revenue by approximately \$700,000 with the aim of reducing the cost of phone calls placed by occupants in the House of Correction and the Milwaukee County Jail by 25 percent; and

WHEREAS, the prison phone call industry brings in nearly \$1.4 billion according to the 2012 Bloomberg article, "Prison Phones Prove Captive Market for Private Equity", which is a burden that largely falls on families that are already struggling to support their loved ones financially and emotionally; and

85 WHEREAS, a June 2021 Business Insider article found that women of color are 86 more likely to interact with the criminal justice system: 44 percent of Black women have 87 an incarcerated family member, which means they bear the financial and emotional 88 brunt of supporting their family member through their experience; and 89 90 WHEREAS, the same article found that one-third of prison or jail residents are 91 Black, indicating that the primary spenders of jail phone or videos calls are Black men and women, which deepens the racial wealth gap in America; and 92 93 94 WHEREAS, a 2015 study by the Prison Policy Initiative, "Screening Out Family 95 Time: the for-profit video visitation industry in prisons and jails," cited a "rigorous study 96 by the Minnesota Department of Corrections [which] found that even a single visit 97 reduced recidivism by 13% for new crimes and 25% for technical violations"; and 98 99 WHEREAS, the HOC has made many positive strides to prioritize reentry for 100 residents by focusing on workforce development, educational programs, inside and 101 outside resident work crews, mental health services, the fatherhood initiative, special 102 programs for women, and other services to reduce recidivism and set residents up for 103 success when they return to the community; and 104 105 WHEREAS, the more connections residents can make to the outside and to their 106 families, the less likely they are to reoffend; and 107 108 WHEREAS, providing free video or voice calls to residents provides an 109 opportunity for connection to community, family, friends, and lawyers; and 110 111 WHEREAS, because connection to one's community is positively correlated to 112 reduced rates of recidivism and successful reentry, the Milwaukee County Jail and 113 House of Correction should facilitate the ability for residents to communicate with 114 individuals in their community; and 115 116 WHEREAS, the Office of the Sheriff and HOC should prioritize reducing 117 recidivism, preparing residents for successful reentry into the community, and 118 rehabilitation over punishment; and 119 120 WHEREAS, the Committee on Judiciary, Safety, and General Services (JSGS), 121 at its meeting of September 9, 2021, laid over File No. 21-763 for one meeting 122 (vote 4-1); and

WHEREAS, the Committee on JSGS, at its Special Virtual Meeting of
