AN ENGROSSED RESOLUTION

Requesting the ONE Milwaukee Taskforce explore possible collaboration and resource sharing between Milwaukee County, the City of Milwaukee, and Milwaukee Public Schools on operations and maintenance relating to parks and recreation

WHEREAS, in the 2017 study produced by the Wisconsin Policy Forum (WPF), then known as the Public Policy Forum, titled "Joining Forces: Exploring Service Sharing Opportunities for Milwaukee Public Schools", the Wisconsin Policy Forum suggested potential opportunities for the Milwaukee Public School District to collaborate in the realm of parks and recreation with the City of Milwaukee relating to master planning, with the City and County relating to sharing data, and with the County relating to mowing and snow removal, forestry, sharing equipment, playground inspection and repair, and other specialized services; and

WHEREAS, in the aforementioned report, the WPF suggested the Milwaukee Public Schools, City of Milwaukee, and Milwaukee County begin collaboration of service-sharing by doing the following:

- "Align internal and cross-jurisdictional practices in data collection, storage, and sharing"
- "Align the timing of major initiatives, investments, and planning processes"
- "Start with small-scale, low-risk, and low-cost service sharing arrangements"
- "Include service sharing as part of a joint legislative agenda"
- "Establish a formal joint advisory body devoted to shared services between MPS, the City of Milwaukee, and Milwaukee County"

WHEREAS, in File No. 20-137, Milwaukee County co-created the ONE Milwaukee Taskforce with the City of Milwaukee and Milwaukee Public School District "for the purpose of making practical recommendations to share costs and resources, collaborate, and coordinate on potential capital infrastructure and operational needs to better serve the people of Milwaukee"; and

WHEREAS, in the October 2021 WPF study, "Sinking Treasure: A look at the Milwaukee County Parks' troubled finances and potential solutions," the WPF noted

how in inflation-adjusted terms, the County's parks have experienced significant cuts financially and staff-wise while becoming further dependent on earned revenue rather than property tax levy:

- Operations Expenditures in 2019 Dollars
 - 1989: ~\$75 million
 - o 2019: >\$40 million
- Number of Full-time Equivalent Positions
 - o 1989: 1072.7
 - o 2019: 469
- Parks Department Revenue Mix
 - o 1989: 74.4 percent property tax levy, 25.6 percent other revenue
 - o 2019: 43.4 percent property tax levy, 56.7 percent other revenue

(File No. 21-973); and

WHEREAS, in File No. 20-639, the Department of Parks, Recreation and Culture noted, "Milwaukee County Parks is at cross-roads and the funding mechanisms to sustain our parks are broken. This time of global pandemic has magnified and accelerated the reality that the fiscal model that has funded Parks for years is failing, that it is not sustainable, and that new, long-term funding solutions are needed."; and

WHEREAS, in "Sinking Treasure" the WPF repeated its suggestion to collaborate with the Milwaukee Public School and suburban school districts "to enhance programming and support maintenance of recreational facilities"; and

WHEREAS, in Fall 2021 the Milwaukee Public Schools' Milwaukee Recreation became one of 1.9 percent of parks and recreation agencies, and only one of three in Wisconsin, to earn accreditation from the National Recreation and Park Association's (NRPA's) Commission for Accreditation of Park and Recreation Agencies (CAPRA); and

WHEREAS, in February 2022, Milwaukee County adopted File No. 22-132, an updated Milwaukee County Park and Open Space Plan, which is a long-range planning document prepared by the Department of Parks, Recreation and Culture and the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission (SEWRPC) to guide decision making and fulfill the County's State and Federal grant eligibility; and

WHEREAS, as part of the adopted Milwaukee County Park and Open Space Plan, it is recommended that "the County should consider additional opportunities to partner with nonprofit organizations as well as municipal government agencies when possible to implement improvement projects" and there exists a "shared responsibility

between the County and municipal governments for providing needed neighborhood parks," which can be facilitated via the work of the ONE Milwaukee Taskforce; and

WHEREAS, the Intergovernmental Cooperation Council (ICC), which includes the mayor, village president or administrator from each of the 19 municipalities inside Milwaukee County, meets to share best practices in delivery of public services, to discuss ways in which to save tax money and enhance services through cooperative efforts, and to discuss and advocate for change in state and federal law that are of common interest to ICC members; and

WHEREAS, in the interest of serving Milwaukee citizens with increasingly scarce resources due to a State-imposed structural deficit whereby costs to continue services rise faster than revenues; and

WHEREAS, the Committee on Parks, Energy, and Environment, at its meeting of May 24, 2022, recommended adoption of File No. 22-485 (vote 5-0); now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, Milwaukee County hereby requests the ONE Milwaukee Taskforce spearhead the beginning of collaboration efforts between Milwaukee County, the City of Milwaukee, and Milwaukee Public Schools (MPS), the Intergovernmental Cooperation Council (ICC), and ICC individual members relating to sharing resources for parks and recreation maintenance and operations; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the ONE Milwaukee Taskforce shall pursue the development of a plan to bring certain County, City, and MPS, the ICC, and ICC individual members resources into alignment so that the entities can:

Easily share constituent data to better address requests for service and information

 Collaborate on a shared data collection and management program to quickly access and deploy resources

Create easily navigable websites for constituents to access the information they
need, discover which entity is responsible for each service request, and submit
requests for service or maintenance that can be routed to the correct entity

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Taskforce shall provide a report detailing progress on developing the plan, or the completed plan, to the County Board of Supervisors, City Common Council, **and** MPS Board of School Directors, **the ICC, and** ICC individual members by September 2022; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Office of Government Affairs staff are
authorized and requested to communicate the contents of this resolution to the ONE
Milwaukee Taskforce, the City of Milwaukee, and MPS, the ICC, and ICC individual
members and support initiatives which achieve the criteria outlined in this resolution.
