## 2025 Fiscal Cliff - Background



- Starting in 2025, the Comptroller's Office projected that DOT Transit
  Division (MCTS) will have <u>exhausted its federal stimulus (ARPA) funding</u> that
  has allowed transit service levels to be maintained during the COVID19
  pandemic (Five Year Financial Report 2024 2028)
- As such, MCTS is facing a <u>fiscal cliff in 2025</u>, driven largely by increasing costs, farebox revenue that remains below pre-pandemic levels, and tax levy funding that is less than half what it was pre-2017.
- The Comptroller's Office estimates MCTS will <u>require an unprecedented</u> \$31.4 million in tax levy to support current operations, an increase of \$22.7 million in tax levy.

## 2025 Fiscal Cliff - Background



- If such funding is not replaced, MCTS estimates 20% of bus service could be recommended for elimination by the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors.
- A cut of this magnitude would mean <u>eliminating nearly half of all routes</u> along with large segments of other routes.
- These cuts would derail the progress MCTS has taken to make service more attractive and increase ridership / revenue:
  - CONNECT 1 Bus Rapid Transit line (start June 2023)
  - MCTS NEXT Network Redesign (completed 2021)
  - North South 27<sup>th</sup> Street Transit Enhancement (in progress)

#### 2025 Fiscal Cliff – Potential Route Eliminations



- 45% of entire routes could be eliminated (16 of 36 routes):
  - Routes 11, 20, 22, 28, 31, 33, 34, 52, 53, 54, 55, 56, 58, 68, 88, & 92
  - Segments of Route 19, 60, 76, and the PurpleLine

- These routes serve riders in neighborhoods across the County:

  - Hampton Avenue
  - Villard Avenue
  - Congress Street


## 2025 Fiscal Cliff – Impacts on Economy / Residents



- Failing to invest in transit will have cascading ramifications for everyone and set back the local economy by exacerbating labor shortages and reducing educational and health outcomes in our community.
  - 2,300 fewer businesses would no longer be near a bus route
  - 70,000 fewer jobs would no longer be near a bus route
  - 125,000 people would no longer live near a bus route:
    - 60,000 persons of color
    - 30,000 people with disabilities
    - 15,000 senior citizens


## 2025 Fiscal Cliff – 2020 versus 2025












#### #2 Supervisor Johnson, Jr. - Potential Route Eliminations




#### #3 Supervisor Wasserman - Potential Route Eliminations






## #4 Supervisor Clancy - Potential Route Eliminations




#### #5 Supervisor Taylor - Potential Route Eliminations






## #6 Supervisor Rolland - Potential Route Eliminations






## #7 Supervisor Martin - Potential Route Eliminations






## #8 Supervisor Shea - Potential Route Eliminations







#### #9 Supervisor Logsdon - Potential Route Eliminations




#### #10 Supervisor Nicholson - Potential Route Eliminations




#### #11 Supervisor Vincent - Potential Route Eliminations








#### #14 Supervisor Gomez-Tom - Potential Route Eliminations








## #17 Supervisor Taylor - Potential Route Eliminations

- MCTS developed the #SAVETHEBUS campaign with the following goals:
  - Inform citizens / stakeholders of the fiscal cliff and potential major route eliminations
  - Ask citizens / stakeholders to contact state legislators and ask them to allow Milwaukee County to create a sustainable funding source for transit.
- Unlike nearly every other major city in the U.S., MCTS is not supported by a dedicated source of funding such as a sales tax.
- Most of the funding to MCTS is provided by the State of Wisconsin. Local funding
  is provided by Milwaukee County through a levy on property taxes and the vehicle
  registration fee.
