47 48 WHEREAS, Kansas City, Missouri recently approved measures indicating the 49 city will not prosecute or fine any person or organization that seeks, provides, receives 50 or helps someone to receive gender-affirming care such as puberty blockers, hormones 51 or surgery. The resolution also says that if the state passes a law or resolution that 52 imposes criminal or civil punishments, fines or professional sanctions in such cases, 53 personnel in the city will make enforcing those requirements "their lowest priority"; and 54 55 WHEREAS, last year Austin, Texas declared it should be considered a sanctuary 56 for transgender youth and their families, and Harris County, home to Houston, declared 57 it wouldn't pursue cases against parents over gender-affirming care; and 58 59 WHEREAS, California, Minnesota, and Washington have declared themselves 60 sanctuary states for gender-affirming care, as have the cities of Chicago, Minneapolis 61 and West Hollywood; and 62 63 WHEREAS, Dane County, Wisconsin adopted a resolution that declared the 64 county a "sanctuary" for transgender and non-binary individuals; and 65 66 WHEREAS, transgender Americans are four times more likely to be victims of 67 violent crime than their cisgender peers, according to a 2021 study; and 68 69 WHEREAS Milwaukee County values its transgender and non-binary residents 70 and vigorously opposes measures that would allow legal violence toward trans people 71 in accessing gender-affirming care or expression; and 72 73 WHEREAS, the Committee on Judiciary, Law Enforcement, and General 74 Services, at its meeting of September 11, 2023, recommended adoption of File No. 75 23-694 (vote 3-2); now, therefore, 76 77 BE IT RESOLVED, the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors firmly asserts its 78 commitment to protect transgender and non-binary individuals and believes access to 79 health care is a fundamental right and all people in Milwaukee County and the State of 80 Wisconsin should have access to all health care, including gender affirming care; and 81 82 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, if the state of Wisconsin passes a law that 83 imposes criminal or civil punishments, fines, or professional sanctions on any person or 84 organization that seeks, provides, receives or helps someone to receive gender-85 affirming care such as puberty blockers, hormones, or surgery, the Milwaukee County 86 Board of Supervisors urges the Milwaukee County Sheriff to make enforcement their 87 lowest priority; and 88 89 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Milwaukee County be considered a safe 90 place, a sanctuary, for transgender children and adults and their families; and 91 92 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Office of Government Affairs is hereby 93 authorized and requested to communicate the contents of this resolution to Governor
