Veto of County Board File RES 11-695 on Shakespeare in the

Courts Pilot Program

I am vetoing County Board File RES 11-695 pursuant to the authority granted to me by Article IV, Section 23(a) of the Wisconsin Constitution and Section 59.17(6) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

The County Board approved a resolution to spend \$65,000 to authorize the Chief Judge of Milwaukee County to collaborate with the Peck School of the Arts' Theater Program at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee to develop a Shakespeare in the Courts pilot program as a sentencing alternative for youth offenders.

Given the historical deficits in the Courts and other fiscal pressures, spending money without conclusive evidence or a thorough process seeking out the best diversion programs is not something I can support. As a steward of taxpayer dollars, I am driven by the certainty that spending must produce results. Thus, despite my passion and support for the arts and for Shakespeare, and despite my interest in evidence-based programs for juvenile offenders as both a powerful variable in public safety and in these youths' future, I am vetoing this resolution.
