SUBJECT: Revised Report from the Director, Department of Health and Human Services,

Requesting Approval to Allocate the Anticipated 2012 Community Development

Block Grant (CDBG) Funding

Background

The Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) is submitting a revised 2012 Community Development Block Grant report that incorporates recent HUD clarifications as well as conversations the DHHS – Housing Division has had with several agencies regarding the documentation that is needed to receive CDBG funding. The changes are included in the detailed project list below and will ensure compliance with HUD regulations.

As part of the annual Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) process, all applicants were invited to attend a public hearing and present their proposals to the Economic and Community Development Committee on March 5, 2012. For 2012 funds, a new review process was put in place by staff to objectively rank projects based on a scoring system (see Attachment A) to make final recommendations. A panel was arranged to score each project based on this system. The panel members were chosen due to their vast experience with CDBG regulations. The panel consisted of two representatives from the Milwaukee County Housing Division; a representative from the City of Milwaukee Community Development Grants Administration; and a representative from the City of West Allis.

Once the County Board approves the projects, the 2012 Annual Plan will be published for comment for 30-days, as required. Any public comments will then be incorporated into the final 2012 Annual Plan and the Plan will then be submitted to Federal Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for approval.

Issue

The 2012 Milwaukee County CDBG allocation totals \$1,267,877. Twenty-percent of these funds can be used for Administration and fair housing (\$253,575). Fifteen-percent of the funds can be set aside for public service projects (\$190,181). In previous years, the allocation continued to be split between at large competitive projects and municipal projects. Due to several non-profit projects not being eligible this year per HUD guidelines, suburban projects were funded at fifty-four percent verses forty-six percent for at large applications. There were four projects that had been previously recommended for funding that have withdrawn their applications due to not being able to meet HUD's recent clarification on jurisdictional guidelines. These projects included Grandville Interfaith

Program, Milwaukee County Parks, Easter Seals, and the Eisenhower Center. Although the municipal projects were not scored and ranked for the purpose of this report, they are included to show the complete allocation. As in years past, County CDBG staff will continue to review municipal projects to ensure that applicants meet national objectives and are following the Consolidated Plan. Staff is in discussions on how to potentially rank municipal projects in future years.

For the competitive applications, the recommendations in this report are based on the total points received for each project. Projects were ranked based on the following criteria:

- Project Approach
- Jurisdiction
- Experience and Qualifications
- Need and Justification
- Past Performance
- Benefit to Low-and-Moderate Income Persons
- Budget and Other Sources of Funds

Through this process, the Review Panel commented that several projects that requested funding do not appear to be able to meet the jurisdictional requirements set forth by HUD. If projects are not able to provide specific documentation that they are serving the Milwaukee County CDBG jurisdiction and that they are serving low-to-moderate income individuals, Milwaukee County will not be able to provide reimbursement per HUD regulations.

Housing Division staff will require a mandatory meeting with all potential recipients prior to the submission of the Annual Plan. Staff will explain relevant HUD regulations, specifically regarding income limits and jurisdictional requirements. Staff also is in the process of developing a subrecipient manual that will outline CDBG regulations and the expectations placed on recipients. Each agency will be required to sign off that they have received the manual. Milwaukee County will not disburse funds to agencies if they are not able to provide sufficient documentation that their projects meet HUD guidelines.

Recommendation

The Director, Department of Health and Human Services, recommends that the County Board of Supervisors approve the Housing Division to allocate the anticipated 2012 Community Development Block Grant funds to the following projects:
