


facts about alzheimer's disease, elder care and the workplace

Alzheimer's disease is one of the primary reasons elder care is needed

- 43.5 million adult caregivers are giving care to a person at least 50 years old.¹
- The top two reasons recipients need care:
 - > Old age (12%)²
 - > Alzheimer's disease (10%)²
- More than 15 million people provide unpaid care to a person with Alzheimer's or other dementias.⁴
 This is 17.4 billion hours of unpaid caregiving valued at over \$210 billion.⁴
- 86.1% of large companies surveyed offer some elder care services to their employees.³
 - > 69.6% of companies offer EAP elder care counseling with less than 10% of the workforce utilizing the service (with a single digit average).³
 - > 68% of working caregivers have to make accommodations for their loved one while working.1




- > 67% of caregivers are between the ages of 35-64 years.4
- > About 70% of caregivers are women.4
- > Nearly half are employed full or part time.4

Alzheimer's disease impacts 6.6 million employees who provide elder care4

- Many caregivers of people with Alzheimer's reported making major changes to their work schedules because of caregiving responsibilities.⁴
- Caregivers of persons with Alzheimer's or other dementias experience high levels of emotional stress and depression.⁴
- On average, caregivers for people with Alzheimer's disease have to provide care longer than caregivers for other older adults.
 - > 32% of caregivers for persons with Alzheimer's or other dementia have been providing care for five years or more compared to 28% of caregivers of older adults.²
