15 16 17	WHEREAS, there have been over 25,000 documented cases of missing persons in Mexico since 2007; and
18	WHEREAS, this human rights crisis became even more evident when 43
19 20	students from Ayotzinapa, Guerrero, were taken by force in September 2014; and
21 22 23 24	WHEREAS, in spite of an exhaustive investigation, the Government of Mexico, with help from the United States (US) government, has only identified the remains of one of those students; and
25 26	WHEREAS, the investigation into the students disappearance has highlighted a disturbing trend of collusion between authorities and organized crime groups; and
27 28 29 30	WHEREAS, although over 100 people, mainly police officers, were detained in connection with the missing students, there are still many questions that are unanswered; and
31 32 33 34	WHEREAS, this lack of prosecution, accountability, and information is not unusual, and tens of thousands of families are still waiting for information on their lost loved ones; and
35 36 37 38 39	WHEREAS, on June 19, 2015, the Congresswoman from the 4 th District and many of her colleagues sent a letter urging the Secretary of State to make the defense of human rights a fundamental part of any bilateral agreements between the US and Mexico; and
40 41 42 43 44	WHEREAS, the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors supports the protection of human rights in Mexico by adhering to internationally recognized standards of investigation, due process in the criminal justice system, and the dismantling of collusion between organized crime and authorities; and
45 46	WHEREAS, the Committee on Intergovernmental Relations, at its meeting of
