12 13 14	WHEREAS, it is estimated that up to 65 million people in the United States (U.S.) have a criminal conviction; and
15 16 17	WHEREAS, the U.S. Department of Justice reports that 650,000 ex-offenders are released from state and federal prison every year; and
18 19 20	WHEREAS, expungement is a process by which a record of criminal conviction is destroyed or sealed; and
21 22 23 24	WHEREAS, Wisconsin's expungement law is exceedingly narrow, only allowing for expungement of misdemeanors and certain felonies committed by a person under the age of 25, and only if the request is made at the time of sentencing; and
25 26 27	WHEREAS, even if a person qualifies for expungement, and the court expunges the record, the record is still available through the Wisconsin Department of Justice, which effectively nullifies any benefit of the expungement; and
28 29 30 31 32 33	WHEREAS, this narrowly crafted law does not achieve the ultimate goal of expungement, which is to allow someone who was convicted of a relatively minor offense, paid their debt to society, and is rehabilitated, to reenter society with a second chance to create a better life; and
34 35 36 37	WHEREAS, people of color are disproportionately arrested, convicted, and incarcerated based on their representation in the population as a whole and therefore also disproportionally harmed by Wisconsin's stringent expungement laws; and
38 39	WHEREAS, studies suggest that a criminal record reduces the likelihood of a job callback or offer by nearly 50 percent; and
40 41 42	WHEREAS, a conviction record is a barrier to finding safe and affordable housing; and
43 44 45 46	WHEREAS, studies show that an ex-offender's successful attainment of employment and housing after a conviction substantially reduces the risk of recidivism; and

WHEREAS, the reduced output of goods and services of people with prison records is estimated at \$57 to \$65 billion in losses for the nation's economy; and

WHEREAS, since 2009, at least 41 states and the District of Columbia have enacted over 155 pieces of legislation to mitigate the collateral consequences for certain individuals with a criminal conviction; and

WHEREAS, it is time to reform Wisconsin's expungement law, get people back to work, lower recidivism, lessen the burden on Wisconsin's welfare system, add to Wisconsin's economy, and improve the justice system; and

WHEREAS, the Committee on Judiciary, Safety, and General Services, at its meeting of October 22, 2015, recommended adoption of the resolution (vote 5-0); now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, Milwaukee County supports efforts to give certain rehabilitated individuals a second chance by reforming and expanding the current expungement law including, but not limited to:

- 1. Clearly defining what expungement means.
- 2. Disallowing the use of expunged records in housing and employment matters.
- 3. Ending the age limit on expungement requests.
- 4. Allowing expungement requests to be made at any time not just at sentencing.
- 5. Disallowing disclosure of the expunged record by the Wisconsin Department of Justice to any unauthorized person, except as otherwise required by state or federal law.

; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, Milwaukee County requests the Wisconsin State Legislature reform and expand the current expungement law of criminal records; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Intergovernmental Relations staff shall communicate the contents of this resolution to the appropriate parties necessary to effectuate the passage of such legislation.
