### **Technical Notes**

This report utilizes data from a variety of sources. The participant data is taken from program registration and was provided by the Department of Aging. All of the Site, Site (%) and % of All Sites data included in table reflect data from 10/2013-9/2014. All Trend information reflects data from the past three years.

All zip code level data was obtained using either the 2010 Census: General Population and Housing Characteristics, or the 2008-2012 American Community Survey (ACS) 5 year estimates.

- Census data: age breakdown by gender, race, ethnicity, and living alone.
- ACS data: below poverty level, and average household income.

The percentage for living alone reflects the population aged 65+, while percentages for race, ethnicity, and average household income reflect all individuals living in that zip code, regardless of age. All site specific data, however, is based upon a population aged 60+.

In general, gray shaded boxes indicate that no data was available. But in the case of Perceived Health, at the % of zip code level, a gray box indicates that the data available was not significant.

For Perceived Health, the N value, Site, and Site (%) data reflect the number and/or percent of meal participants who answered a particular survey question at that site. It does not reflect the total number of participants who attend that meal site overall. The Site number for perceived health indicates the number of individuals at that site who indicated their health was either fair or poor.

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## Background

Under Title IIIC of the Older Americans Act (OAA), a national Nutrition Program for older individuals was established. The OAA Nutrition Program authorizes both Congregate and Home-delivered Nutrition Services throughout the country. The purpose of these nutrition services is fourfold: To "1. Reduce hunger and food insecurity among older individuals, 2. Promote socialization of older individuals, 3. Promote the health and well-being of older individuals, and 4. Delay adverse health conditions for older individuals."

The Nutrition Programs are designed to address the needs of individuals ages 60 and above, with a particular focus on catering to individuals with the highest social and economic needs. These programs are funded by multiple sources, including the Administration on Aging (AoA), state and local governments, foundations, fundraising efforts, individual meal participant donations, etc.

More specifically, the Congregate Nutrition Services were created in hopes of helping maintain the health of the elderly American population by offering nutritious meals, venues for socialization, information on healthy aging, and opportunities for volunteering. In many cases, the meal from the congregate service provides program participants with more than 50% of their total food intake for the day. In addition, a majority of congregate meal participants indicate that their health has improved due to their involvement in this meal program.

In hopes of achieving the health and wellness goals for older individuals set by the OAA Nutrition Program, at the local level, Milwaukee County has offered a Senior Meal Program since 1973. The Senior Meal Program includes a congregate meal service and a home-delivered meal service as well. For the congregate meal service, there are currently 28 community dining sites throughout the County that serve balanced lunches to individuals ages 60 and above. Meals are offered five days a week with no cost to participants, however, there is a suggested donation of \$2.50 per meal. Funding for the Milwaukee County Senior Meal Program comes from the State of Wisconsin's Bureau on Aging and from Title IIIC of the OAA.

# Approach

The overall goals of the senior meal program are to (a) provide a good nutritious meal to seniors and (b) create opportunities for social engagement and cohesion. This assessment seeks to answer the following questions:

- What sites are effective? (in terms of participation, finances, reaching site goals and those in poverty)
- Who lives in the meal site neighborhoods?
- Who attends each meal site?
- Are the sites in the correct place, understanding the trends from the Face of Aging report?
- What is desired by 'new' older adults and how can the meal program attract them?


To complete this evaluation, the Center worked with the Department on Aging to create a small advisory group (10 people selected by the Department of Aging as having experience/expertise related to the dining program) to guide and provide input and feedback throughout the process, including:

- Inform recruitment processes
- Inform overall evaluation questions
- Assist with interpreting findings and developing recommendations

The evaluation utilized various sources of data including:

- Meal site participation and donation data
- Census data
- Observations, surveys, and focus groups
- Google maps and the internet

This report provides baseline information on how well the program is achieving its goals through two perspectives. It summarizes the individual participants' opinion regarding why they participate, what enables them to attend and what improvements they would like to see. It accomplishes this through a survey at 24 out of the 28 sites and focus groups at two. It also summarizes meal site specific data on participation, reach into the neighborhood and financial trends.

# **Executive Summary**

#### Overview

Older American Act has four goals: (1) Reduce hunger and food insecurity among older adults and (2) promote socialization (3) Promote the health and well-being of older individuals, and (4) delay adverse health conditions for older individuals.

In 1973, Milwaukee County began to offer the local level nutrition program that included the senior meal program.

During the summer of 2014, the Department of Aging approached the Center for Urban Population Health to do an assessment or evaluation of the program. The Center was asked to answer the following questions:

- What sites are effective? (in terms of participation, finances, reaching site goals and those in poverty)
- Who lives in the meal site neighborhoods?
- Who attends each meal site?
- Are the sites in the correct place, understanding the trends from the Face of Aging report?
- What is desired by newer-older adults and how the meal program can attract them?

To accomplish this we utilized information from various sources including:

- Meal site participation and registration forms
- Census and American Community Survey
   data
- Observations, surveys and focus groups
- Google Maps and the internet

We have compiled all the information in the report as a baseline of information. We summarize the information in two ways; first by individual level participation and opinions regarding the program and second through individual meal site participation, reach and financial trends. This executive summary provides the high level findings and recommendations identified through the evaluation and in discussions with an advisory committee made up of site managers, older adults and other stakeholders.

## Findings

### **Participant Perspective**

The Center for Urban Population Health created a 14 question survey. The survey aimed to more fully understand a sample of meal program participants. The survey focused on participation, program goals, program enablers and program improvement.

Center staff trained 20 Senior Research Ambassadors to administer the survey at the meal sites.

A total of 600 surveys were collected from meal participants over a three and a half week period from September to October 2014

### **Survey Findings**

- Respondents tend to attend 5 days a week
- They have been coming for more than the last two years
- Only 9% of respondents decreased their participation in the past 6 months and the main reason was their dislike of food.
- Most aspects of the program was rated very good or excellent, the lowest rated aspect was food quality, still rated good, just not excellent.
- Other than eating, socialization and activities were what keeps them coming back to the program.
- Respondents tend to be healthy and their health overall doesn't get in the way of participating.
- Over 70% of respondents lived on-site or within 4 miles of the meal site and the vast majority of respondents drive themselves to the program.


#### Focus Group Perspective

- Reasons for participation included convenience, cost and the meals themselves. Socialization did come up but not as strong as the survey.
- Reasons for non-participation included quality of food, other dining options nearby, too busy to attend and desire to still cook for themselves.
- Areas for improvement included:
  - \* Food not served at a high enough temperature
  - \* Portion sizes are too small
  - Not enough seasoning used but food often too salty
  - \* Not enough variety
  - \* See report for more details

#### Suggestions

- Expand the meal time to allow for eating in a less rushed environment
- Offering meals 7 days a week
- Extending the deadline for requesting the next day's meal
- Placing menus in a more obvious location including distributing menus
- Offering meals at a higher price to nonseniors who accompany participating seniors
- Being more intentional about integrating site activities with the meal program
- Expanding transit express service to allow potential diners to participate in other activities at the site

Insights from The 2012 Face of Aging Report The 2012 Face of Aging showed demographic trends

within Milwaukee County's aging community. It revealed a few municipalities that demonstrated significant growth in its older adult population. Franklin, Oak Creek, River Hills, and St. Francis all experienced significant positive percent change since 2000. In actual numbers, the City of Milwaukee, West Allis, Wauwatosa, and Greenfield lead in numbers of 60+ individuals.



All these municipalities have at least one meal site except Greenfield. The darker the purple indicates a larger percentage of the population 60 years or older. There could be an opportunity to partner with an organization to offer the meal program within 53129/53220. 
**Poverty** One goal of the meal program is to reach older adults in need. The



darker the purple area indicates the greater percent of the population 65 and older living in poverty.

Participant surveys found that over 70% of respondents lived on-site or within 4 miles of the meal site and the vast majority of respondents drive themselves to the program. The greatest density of older adults in poverty have meal sites within 4 miles.

There could be an opportunity to partner with an organization in the 53209 zip code, considering it is in the next lighter purple area or the area with a slightly less density of older adults living in poverty and does not have a meal program currently. Diversity The darkes: purple area marks the highest density of racial/ethnic diversity among



older adults in the map below.

When considering poverty and diversity, three zip codes were considered; 53209, 53224 and 53225. These zip codes represent areas within the Milwaukee County that are both more diverse and experience more poverty than many other site neighborhoods and do not have a meal site currently. One of these zip codes could support a meal site if there was interest in expanding and an eligible location was identified.

The table above provides an overview of participation, costs and income for each site in 2014.

Note there are a tremendous amount of variability in what makes a site successful, effective and impactful. The data above does not reflect all the variation among sites and contracts and therefore should not be used to compare sites.

The table does provide an aggregate view of the effectiveness of the program, its participation, costs and income.

**Participation.** Total meals served in 2014 is down slightly from 281,102 the previous year to 279,977. Average meals served per day is quite variable ranging from 97 a day to the lowest 11 meals.

**Financial**. There is a large variance in total costs per site, ranging from \$199,175 to \$14,425. Total costs are made up of the costs of food plus the site supervisor costs. The variability in large part is due to the variability in participation.

Average cost per meal is down to \$7.00 from \$7.03 in the previous year.

The suggested donation amount is \$2.50 per meal and the average actual per meal donation is \$1.05. Although the donation is not intended to cover the full cost of the meal, it is meant to cover a gap in funding from the Federal program. Average donations at \$1.05 make it improbable that the program can offer the same level of service.

# Recommendations

#### Financial

#### Increase income.

Identify methods to increase per meal donations.

- A. Improve the system for collecting donations. Make it more private so that older adults are not able to keep track of those who do and do not donate.
- B. Create a method for family and friends to donate money/gift cards to seniors that would go directly towards paying for their meals.
- C. Sign up for programs through businesses like Target and Pick N' Save that would donate money to the Senior Meal Program as you spend money at their establishments.
- D. Advocate for additional state and federal funding for the program based on the growing cohort of older adults.

#### Decrease costs.

- A. Consider funding each site based on participation and average cost per meal versus the flat amount that each site receives.
- B. Consider adapting contracts to include site specific goals that would need to be reached in order to continue to receive funding. Goals would be focused on improving areas of efficiency or effectiveness. Example areas include participation, cost of meals and participant satisfaction. Goals should be co-created with the site supervisors to ensure success. One place to start is with meal programs who have average meal costs above the average\$7.00; seek ways to work with the sites to reduce their per meal cost.
- C. Identify opportunities within sub-contract relationships or among sites who have low daily average meals served to share a site supervisor and reduce costs.

#### Awareness and Communication

Create a centralized communication and marketing campaign that has a unified message across sites that aims to increase participation and per meal donations. It should inform participants about the program, how it works, why donations are important and how families can get involved.

- A. Engage the business and the greater community in the creation and implementation of the campaign.
- B. Frame a campaign that facilitates the community to understand that the program meets a community need not a senior need. – "this is not a senior issue, but a community issue".
- C. Seek opportunities to cross promote programing that targets older adults. For example, through a partnership with Stockbox, Hunger Task Force and older adult serving organizations like pharmacies.

#### Quality

- A. Identify capacity at each site to increase the temperature of food during the distribution and serving. Based on site capacity, identify methods to support sites in increasing the temperature of food during the distribution and serving.
- B. Identify opportunities to increase social activities before and after the meal program.
- C. Work with transportation vendors to provide seniors more time to eat and socialize.

#### Location

There is not a current recommendation to add an additional meal site, specifically prior to working with current sites to increase participation, increase income and decrease costs.

- A. In considering any future meal sites, choose sites that are connected to a senior center or program that offers additional opportunities for social programming for participants.
- B. Meal sites located in housing can increase participation through working with surrounding churches and community based organizations to inform older adults of their service. These sites also require signage notifying the public of the program.
- C. All meal sites should be accessible and make arrangements to be accessible for their older adult participants.
- D. When appropriate, explore opportunities for a site within Greenfield. This municipality has the a large density of older adults (Face of Aging 2012) and an 4+ mile gap in meal site coverage.
- E. Additionally explore opportunities to offer a meal site within zip codes 53209, 53224 and 53225. These zip codes represent areas within the Milwaukee County that are both more diverse and experience more poverty than other site neighborhoods and do not have a meal site currently.
- F. Conversely, there are three meal sites within 53202, a high education, high income and restaurant rich area. Explore opportunities to consolidate service for this area or partner to reduce costs.

#### **Cross-Site Collaboration**

Convene Senior Center directors and meal site supervisors.

- A. Identify opportunities to collaborate and strengthen programming and referrals among sites that are close in proximity.
- B. Identify opportunities to reduce costs and improve access to meals. Examples include hiring one site supervisor that could manage two sites that are close in proximity and reduce the number of days each site is open, or offering bagged meal options on Thursdays for participants to take home for Friday.

# **Participant Perspectives**

### Survey Summary


The Center for Urban Population Health created a 14 question survey. The survey aimed to more fully understand a sample of meal program participants. The survey focused on participation, program goals, program enablers and program improvement.

Center staff trained 20 Senior Research Ambassadors to administer the survey at the meal sites.

A total of 600 surveys were collected from meal participants over a three and a half week period from September to October 2014. Participants were surveyed at 24 of the 28 meal sites throughout Milwaukee County. There were no surveys conducted at Ascension Lutheran Church, Lakeside Senior Enrichment Program, Lapham Park, or OASIS. Furthermore, while some meal sites surveyed only a handful of participants, other sites surveyed over 50 participants.

## Participation

In the past month, how many days per week did you usually attend this or another meal site?



Over half of all respondents (50%) frequent this or another meal site four to five times a week

# Approximately how long have you been eating at this dining site?



58% of respondents have been dining at the specific dining site indicated on their survey for 3 years or more


In the past 6 months, 19% increased their participation while 9% decreased participation and 72% had no change in participations.

Of those who decreased, about a quarter of them decreased because they disliked the food.

In general, about half of the respondents rated the various program aspects as very good and excellent, with exception to the quality of food.




Reasons for decreasing participation:



### Program Improvement

Over 60% of respondents indicated that socializing was an extremely or quite a bit important factor for participation in the meal program.



When asked how to improve the program, responses were split. 30% said no improvement was needed, while about 30% responded that the food could be improved.

#### See details below:

It's fine/ no improvement needed: 33.3%

#### Improve the food: 29.4%

(Food should be hotter, increase portion sizes, increase seasoning, prompt timing of meals, more soup, more variety, etc.)

#### Add more activities/events/guest speakers: 8.9%

(Answers included exercise classes, exercise equipment, cards, music, bingo, games, counselors to discuss health, cooking classes, arts and crafts, computers, pool table, senior advocates to inform seniors about services available to them- such as what types of federal and state services they qualify for, chess, evening pot lucks, field trips, a social services representative to talk with the seniors, etc.)

In addition to the meals, about 30% of respondents reported that they would like to see more activities available at this dining site when asked what else they would like offered at the meal sites. See responses below:

1. Activities: 30.7%

(Cards, field trips, games, bingo, arts and crafts, computers, music, dancing, movies, entertainment, bowling, cribbage, parties, knitting, short plays, readings, sing-a-longs, drumming, weaving, etc.)

- 2. None/no other services needed/everything is fine: 21.6%
- 3. Health related services/opportunities and education (exercise classes, equipment, flu shot, nutrition education, etc.): **12.5%**
- 4. Food related response: 8.3%
- 5. Educational classes/Informational speakers: 6.1%

# When asked what keeps you coming back to this meal site, over 50% responded friends and socializing.

- 1. Friends, socializing, people, companionship, company, fellowship (and other variations of these words): **53.9%**
- 2. Eating, meals, nutrition, food (and other variations of these terms): 36.0%
- 3. Location, close to home (and other variations): 9.3%
- 4. Activities (bingo, cards, movies, etc.): 6.3%
- 5. Cost/cheap/reasonably priced (variations of this concept): 4.7%
- 6. The staff: 4.3%
- 7. Don't have to cook/less cooking (variations of this concept): 3.5%
- 8. Volunteer/work at the site: 3.5%
- 9. Convenience: 3.3%
- 10. Getting out of the house: 2.8%
- \*A few positive quotes that stood out when answering the question:

"The people - they are my family"

"This is like my second home"

When asked to list two top concerns, almost a quarter of responses indicated quality as a concern in one way or another – with a focus on temperature and the food not being hot enough.



  - o Undercooked/Overcooked: 4.2% [UC 2.4%; OC 1.8%]

  - o Healthfulness of food (high fat content, nutrients boiled out, balanced meals, etc.): 2.2%

#### Chicken was a favorite when asked to list two favorite meals/entrees served.

- 1. Chicken 27.7%

- 3. Meat loaf 8.7%
- 4. Beef **8.0%**
- 5. Seafood 6.7%

### **Program Enablers**

When asked to describe their health, 68% of respondents described their health as good or very good.





A majority of the respondents' health status effects their participation at the meal site a little or none of the time.

Almost 70% of respondents reported that they lived on-site or within 4 miles of the meal site.

Over 328 respondents reported driving their car to the site when asked their primary means of transportation.





## Focus Group Descriptions and Summaries

The Center for Urban Population Health developed interview guides for focus groups with meal program diners and non-diners. The interviews primarily explored reasons for participation or lack of and desired program improvements.

Center staff conducted five focus groups between October and November 2014. A total of 36 individuals, recruited with the assistance of meal site staff, participated. Two groups, one with diners (n=12) and one with non-diners (n=5), were conducted at a senior housing site. Two groups, one with diners (n=6) and one with non-diners (n=3), were conducted at a senior center site. Finally, one focus group with nondiners (n=10) was conducted with members of a church-based volunteer group. All participants were either white or African-American and all groups were conducted in English.

#### **Reasons for Meal Program Participation**

Focus group participants echoed several of the reasons cited in the survey. These reasons included convenience, cost, and the meals themselves. As one senior housing site participant stated, "The food is good and it cuts into the cost that you would have to pay for the food budget, so, and it's convenient because we live in this building." For some senior housing residents, particularly those with mobility issues, an on-site meal program was especially convenient. Inclement weather could also play a role in encouraging on-site dining. As one resident said, "It's very icy in the winter. You could fall."

While over half of survey respondents cited socialization as a primary reason for using the meal program, socialization did not appear as important for focus group participants. Socialization was discussed but participants in general emphasized other reasons. That being said, it is clear that the opportunity to socialize does play a role for some. As one senior housing site diner who lived off-site explained, "I come here and eat because it breaks my day up, and I've made lots of friends." It is evident from the group discussion that what constitutes socialization and what individuals are seeking in terms of it varies widely. As one resident described, "But you know it is a social event where you come and you say hi and you see people and in that regard it's a social event."

Regarding socialization and the potential effect that meal program participation could have on diners, senior center meal site volunteers shared the following story when asked whether many diners come and eat on their own. "[I try to encourage them and] tell them to sit with other people and they eventually really like it. They'll open up and start telling their stories. ... Joe is a good example. When he first started coming here, you know his wife passed away and it was like he didn't think he could live without his wife, and I know a lot of people, including myself, you say hi Joe, how are you doing, when he comes in. Now he says hi first. So it really, I think, has made a difference in his life, you know, just that little bit of socialization. And he doesn't stay around long, but just even that little bit has helped him out tremendously."

Finally, many non-diners could see the benefit of the senior meals program although they themselves do not participate in it. As one non-diner shared, "I think it's a very good program because there are people who are not able to cook, people that don't like to eat alone and that's one meal that they can have with other people and fellowship and the conversation and all that. I think it's a real good program."

#### **Reasons for Non-Participation**

Non-diner focus group participants included individuals who had never eaten in the meal program as well as individuals who had some experience with it either in the past or on an occasional basis.

Past or occasional diners cited food issues as one of the reasons they did not currently attend the meal program on a regular basis (please see "Areas for Improvement" below for a description of these issues). Other reasons for irregular or nondining currently included the availability of other dining options nearby, being too busy, and wanting to cook for themselves.

Non-diners with no meal program experience shared these later reasons. As one church-based focus group participant explained, "Although I'm old enough, I'm still very busy, very busy. But I could see me taking advantage of something like this in my later years, like when I'm in my 80s when I'm not so busy. I think it will be a wonderful program. It could be. I mean, just to have the opportunity to get a balanced meal and then, take advantage of some of the other activities. I could see myself doing that, but right now, I'm just so active still, working part-time and volunteering and so, I just wouldn't have the time right now. But in my later years." This participant's situation was shared by several others in this focus group.

Non-diners from the senior center focus group offered a different perspective and framed their non-use of the meal program in terms of need. As one participant shared, "My wife is a month and four days older than I am, but she's still working and she still does all of our cooking except for the lunch and that's usually is a soup and sandwich, a cup of yogurt for me. But she does the meals at night and so we haven't had any need for coming just yet." Participants in this group agreed that if and when their life circumstances changed, that they would probably take advantage of the meal program.

Finally, the question of using the meal program as an opportunity to socialize was discussed with non-diners. Participants of both the churchbased group and the senior center group felt that currently they did not need additional opportunities for socialization. They did see the meal program, however, as potentially beneficial to those senior living alone or with limited interaction with others.

#### Areas for Improvement

Focus group participants mentioned several areas for improvement. Their suggestions fell into to two broad categories: food and logistics/ process.

As would be expected with a diverse group of individuals each with their own preferences and needs, there were sometimes contradictory statements made regarding the food served in the program. Despite this however, many of the same food-related issues that were cited in the surveys were raised in the focus group discussions. Among these were:

- food not served at a high enough temperature,
- portion sizes too small,
- not enough seasoning used but food often too salty,
- not enough variety in the types of dishes served,
- presentation and appeal sometimes lacking, and
- not enough options for those on restricted diets, e.g. diabetics, lactose intolerant.

When asked why he rarely ate with the meals program, one senior housing resident explained, "Some of it is not appealing. And then to me they don't have a big enough of variety. I don't know. Just better appealing food. Like the fish, for instance. Every time we have fish it's always mixed up with tomato or something. It's all not appealing." The issue of balancing variety and appetizing was discussed in both diner focus groups. A senior center group participant stated, "Well, when you're looking at the menu, you got it all fancied up. Just tell us what it is;" to which a fellow group member offered the following suggestion: "I think good old-fashioned stuff. At least it could be marketed as old-fashioned stuff. And there was meatloaf and mashed potatoes and gravy and corn. Now that would, I think would be more well-received than Hawaiian pork loin or whatever fixings - good oldfashioned things." Participants from the senior housing meal site supported the idea of having an occasional "around the world" menu that offered meals from different cultures.

Finally, variety and appeal was framed by the church-based non-diner group as an issue of who is preparing the meals for the program. The African-American participants of this group noted that there are different menus for different ethnic groups and questioned why there was no such menu for African-Americans. They suggested tapping into seniors themselves as possible cooks and/or menu advisors and rather than having meals delivered to sites, take advantage of on-site kitchen facilities and volunteers. As one participant offered, "If you had somebody who is retired and really loves [cooking], you could probably save some money doing it on-site with people who would be more than willing to volunteer. It might be more money [than an outside contractor

servicing several meal sites], but I think something on-site is always better."

Focus group participants also had several suggestions for improvements to non-food aspects of the meals program. Their suggestions included:

- Expanding the meal time to allow for eating in a less rushed environment
- Offering meals 7 days a week
- Extending the deadline for requesting the next day's meal
- Placing menus in a more obvious location including distributing menus to each apartment (senior housing specific)
- Offering meals at a higher price to nonseniors who may want to accompany participating seniors
- Being more intentional about integrating site activities with the meal program
- Expanding Transit Express service to allow potential diners to participate in a site's other activities/services


