Efforts to Mitigate Lost Revenue from Paid Parking (INFORMATION)

## Background

County Board File #18-203 resulted in the moratorium on a new "pay-to-park" program and prohibited the implementation of any new metered parking in or adjacent to County Parks or Parkways. The resolution also stated that "the Department of Parks, Recreation, and Culture shall manage their budget to try and mitigate the parking revenue shortfall without adversely impacting programs and services and shall submit a report to the County Board in December 2018, documenting their efforts to mitigate the lost revenue and requesting, to the extent needed, funds from the Allocated Contingency to offset the loss of parking revenue." This report is a response to the request to manage the revenue loss within the Parks 2018 operating budget.

#### Information

Throughout 2018 Milwaukee County Parks staff have managed a tight budget that has met or exceeded revenue targets in a number of different areas and controlled costs across the organization. The Department has been able to do so without significant adverse impacts on programs and services. Despite this, the operating budget is still short by \$1.6 million which is the hole left by removing paid parking revenue at the beginning of the year.

# 2018 Expense

The primary drivers of cost at the Parks Department, and in turn the areas that are most heavily supported by property tax levy, are park operations, forestry, aquatics, and horticulture. Across the board, the Parks Department has budgeted and spent less on all areas in 2018 from prior years. Despite budgeting and spending less, service levels have been largely maintained in 2018.
