47 WHEREAS, this pilot program could be extended through State of Wisconsin (the State) Governor Tony Evers' 2019-2021 biennial budget proposal, which includes 48 \$618,700 for the State Department of Health Services to fund doula training and 49 50 services, including \$426,700 to cover the reimbursement for doula services provided to 51 women covered by Medicaid; and 52 53 WHEREAS, doulas can help improve birth outcomes for low-income women and 54 women of color in the City through improvement of individual behaviors, access to 55 quality healthcare, and reduction of life stressors; and 56 57 WHEREAS, Milwaukee County should encourage the use of doulas, especially in 58 the highest poverty areas in the City to improve birth outcomes; and 59 60 WHEREAS, the Committee on Health and Human Needs, at its meeting of 61 May 15, 2019, recommended adoption of File No. 19-306 as amended (vote 5-0); 62 now, therefore, 63 64 BE IT RESOLVED, the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors (County Board) 65 requests the Director, Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS), to partner with the City of Milwaukee (the City) to develop a doula pilot program in the 53206 zip 66 67 code; and 68 69 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, doula services should include prenatal, labor and 70 delivery, and postpartum visits; and 71 72 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the DHHS is authorized to develop and enter into 73 a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) with the City, and at a minimum, include these 74 broad program guidelines: 75 • Milwaukee County (the County) will provide up to \$52,000 to the City for 76 doula reimbursements at an estimated cost of \$520 per woman \$1,040 for 77 50 women. 78 • The County will market the doula pilot program to eligible women through 79 existing programs aimed at low-income residents, including, for example, 80 energy assistance programs and child support initiatives. 81 The City will administer the program, including reimbursing the doulas, • 82 determining eligibility of both doulas and women, and addressing necessary 83 certifications. 84 Prior to the release of funds from the County to the City, the City will provide to the County a report identifying how the efficiency of the 85 86 program will be evaluated, the timeline for doing so, and the projected long-term need, if the program is effective. 87 88 The City will monitor and provide an assessment of the efficacy of the doula 89 pilot program and, in conjunction with the DHHS, report back to both the 90 County and the City on the same. 91
