Requesting ratification of the Proclamation of Existence of a County Emergency, dated January 17, 2020, requesting the Governor to provide state disaster relief for Milwaukee County and if necessary, to request a declaration by the President of the United States in order to secure public assistance as offered through the Robert T. Stafford Disaster

Relief and Emergency Assistance Act

REQUEST

The Director of the Office of Emergency Management (OEM) respectfully requests ratification of the January 17, 2020 Proclamation of Existence of a County Emergency in order to continue damage assessments from the January 10-12 winter storm to determine eligibility for state and federal disaster relief and public assistance grants.

BACKGROUND

Milwaukee County sustained flooding and major damage to its shoreline during the January 10-12 winter storm with was an intense low-pressure weather system producing powerful waves, 50-60 mph winds, and accumulating ice of over a quarter inch. This resulted in low-level area-flooding, bluff erosion, and significant damage to public infrastructure. The elevated state of Lake Michigan, four feet above average heights, has exacerbated losses.

Initial cost estimates include the following:

Debris Removal — \$198,500 Emergency Protective Measures — \$32,000 Roads and Bridges — \$590,250 Water Control Facilities — \$2,724,500 Public Buildings and Equipment — \$467,170 Public Utilities — \$185,459 Parks and Recreation Facilities — \$6,535,000

Total — \$10,732,879.

These damage assessments include costs from Milwaukee County Parks, Port of Milwaukee, City of Milwaukee Water Works, City of Cudahy and the Village of Whitefish Bay with further investigation of additional damages ongoing. Additionally, current snow cover and additional unseen failures may grow the estimate as melt and thaw occur into the Spring.

Local municipal and county insurance coverage policies will affect eligibility as well as historical evidence that natural features of the lakeshore have been improved, including beach nourishment, bluff replenishment, riprap, man-placed rock (breakwater), boat docks, piers, ports, benches, bike path, etc., which are eligible for state and/or federal funding.

A Proclamation of Existence of a County Emergency has been signed by the County Executive, in accordance with State Statute 323.14(4)(b), which states the County Executive shall exercise by proclamation the request to the Governor for public assistance when the governing body is not in session.

This Proclamation serves as the formal request for disaster assistance from the state and, if necessary, FEMA, should eligibility criteria be met.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the County Board of Supervisors ratify the Proclamation of the Existence of a County Emergency in order that Milwaukee County damages can be further surveyed in order to determine eligibility for state disaster relief and federal public assistance.

FISCAL IMPACT

Early estimates total \$10,732,879 in damages. The Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act PL 100-707 guides both the FEMA Public Assistance grant program and the Wisconsin Disaster Fund state-funded reimbursement program, which have varying reimbursement formulas.

The state damage formulas are based on reimbursement of 70% (estimate \$7,513,015), and the remaining 30% (estimate \$3,219,864) becomes the responsibility of the affected government; the federal damage formulas are based on reimbursement of 75% (estimate \$8,049,659.00) from federal, 12.5% (estimate \$1,341,610.00) from state, and the remaining 12.5% (estimate \$1,341,610.00) the responsibility of the affected government.
