# MILWAUKEE COUNTY Inter-Office Memorandum

SUBJECT: Report from the Interim Executive Director, Department on Aging, requesting

authorization to enter into 2021 purchase of service contracts from January 1,

2021 through December 31, 2021 at a cost of \$4,856,260

#### Issue

The Interim Executive Director, Department on Aging, is requesting authorization to enter into 2021 purchase of service contracts at a total cost of \$4,856,260 from January 1, 2021 through December 31, 2021 to provide services to Milwaukee County's older adult residents.

## **Background and Rationale**

The recommended contract allocations will allow the Department on Aging to provide services to senior residents of Milwaukee County through 2021. Purchase of service contracts constitute the majority of spending by the Department on Aging in service to Milwaukee County's seniors.

Services provided through these purchase of service contracts support seniors in a variety of ways, from addressing immediate needs related to food access and transportation, to helping seniors help themselves and others by supporting aging caregivers and rejoining the workforce. The overarching goal of the Department on Aging is to affirm the dignity and value of older adults in our county, and these purchase of service agreements with overwhelmingly community-based vendors are how the department pursues that goal.

The department staff coordinates and monitors these programs and receives monthly reports from vendors. Department on Aging staff use these reports to:

- Evaluate performance of the vendors
- Track spending
- Analyze federal indicators

## **Nutrition Programs**

Supporting senior nutrition is one of the mandated services under the Older Americans Act (OAA), and meals and nutrition services are the largest piece of the OAA funds. This program has become increasingly critical during the COVID pandemic, particularly the delivery of meals to seniors who previously visited congregate meal sites.

The "Meals on Wheels" Program delivers food to homebound seniors. The Department on Aging recommends an \$80,000 increase to the Meals on Wheels contract to recognize the 11 percent projected growth in meal delivery between 2019 and 2020 and increased demand for qualified drivers in a COVID economy as well as the targeted case management of the program.

Congregate meal dining is hosted by the five county-owned senior centers and an additional 17 community-based sites. Meals served at these locations also provide opportunities for socialization, education and connection to additional services.

During the COVID pandemic, these meal sites were able to pivot and develop systems for food distribution to meal site clients in partnership with Able Access Inc. and the United Community Center in order to allow seniors to shelter safely in place. Not a single day of meal service was missed due to the pandemic.

The table below identifies the 2021 recommended contract allocations for meal sites and social programming. A reduction of \$9,000 is reflected in the proposed contract amount to Greater Galilee Community Development because the agency indicated that due to the COVID pandemic, it would not be able to spend down the full \$20,000 allocated to the social programming portion of its contract. Greater Galilee is located in 53206 and serves an almost entirely African American population. Department on Aging staff is assisting Greater Galileee to develop social programming that can be presented in a way that is COVID-safe in order to continue to serve their customers. Another provider, the Asian American Community Center, chose not to pursue a renewal for 2021, citing uncertainties due to the COIVD-19 pandemic, and is not included in the recommendations.

## **Socialization and Outreach:**

Isolation and loneliness are serious concerns for seniors, and the Older Americans Act specifically allocates funds that support the socialization of seniors. The three contracts below specifically focus on outreach and social programming for seniors. An increase is recommended for the services provided by the Milwaukee LGBT Community Center in recognition of the actual costs of these services. LGBT older adults are a significantly underserved population within the aging community, and the Department on Aging considers it a priority to connect them to available resources and services, and to train other service providers to have policies and language that are LGBT friendly.

#### Access:

The Department on Aging has a portfolio of partners that connect seniors to jobs, legal benefit services, transportation services, and other programs and services. No funding changes are recommended for the services that are being provided by the vendors listed below. However, the Department's primary transportation vendor opted to not contract with Milwaukee County in 2021 due to COVID-19 and other cost factors. Aging staff are working on a plan to transition transportation services to another vendor and will submit the new contract under a separate File for review and approval by the County Board.

#### Social support programming

In pursuit of the ideal that seniors will have the resources to live as independently as possible in their communities, the Department on Aging works with several vendors that provide specialized services. These agencies support seniors in a variety of ways, increasing awareness of issues that concern the senior population including Alzheimer's Disease, end of life concerns, and caretaking of adult children with developmental disabilities. Specific activities, including supporting caregivers and providing care for adult children, enable families to cope with the long-term consequences of Alzheimer's disease, and engage in culturally-specific outreach for underserved groups (African Americans, Latinos), education, outreach, training, and support.

There is increased funding for Alzheimer's services from the state allocation for Alzheimer's Caregiver Support, and so the department recommends increasing the contract with the Alzheimer's Association.

The Department is recommending an increase to Eras Senior Network in recognition of the importance of neighborhood outreach and the services Eras continues to provide in the most underserved areas of Milwaukee County. Eras staff does direct outreach that connects seniors to resources and services. Additionally, in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, there has been increased demand for their volunteer driver program as well as delivery assistance with the Hunger Task Force StockBox program.

The Hmong American Friendship Association has not received an increase in overten years, despite supporting a community with professional and culturally specific services. The Life Navigators contract is being increased to more fully support the program and acknowledge the additional tasks that the agency has assumed. The contract with Jewish Family Services is being reduced to reflect the actual costs billed by the program in 2019 and 2020.

#### Recommendation

It is recommended that the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors authorize the Interim Executive Director of the Department on Aging to enter into 2021 purchase of service contracts with community-based provider agencies per the narrative above and in the amounts specified in the accompanying resolution.

At their November 13th meeting, the Commission on Aging passed a motion that supports the contract recommendations in this report. The Commission did express concerns about the level of funding being provided to the senior center social programming contract that is coordinated

by Serving Older Adults of Southeast Wisconsin. Commissioners and Aging staff will be working with SOA in the months ahead to ensure that expenses are appropriate and that SOA is coordinating as many social activities as possible, particularly in a COVID-19 (virtual) environment.

# **Fiscal Effect**

A total of \$4,856,260 is reflected in the recommended purchase of service contracts. A fiscal note form is attached.
