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5	AN AMENDED RESOLUTION/ORDINANCE
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7	Amending Chapter 24.02 of the Milwaukee County Code of General Ordinances to
8	reduce the fine for marijuana possession and possession and delivery of drug
9	paraphernalia to no more than one dollar
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12	WHEREAS, Chapter 24, "Possession and Use of Marijuana," of the Milwaukee
13	County Code of General Ordinances (MCGO) prohibits the possession and use of
14	marijuana and the possession, use, and distribution of drug paraphernalia; and
15	manjuana and the possession, use, and distribution of drug paraphernalia, and
16	WHEREAS, Chapter 24.02 outlines that any violation of this ordinance may result
17	in a fine of "not less than two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) nor more than five
18	hundred dollars (\$500.00)"; and

20	WHEREAS, the total forfeiture amount that Milwaukee County assesses for
21	violations of Chapter 24 is \$275; and
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23	WHEREAS, the fine outlined in Chapter 24 is also subject to additional state-
24	imposed fees, such as a Clerk Fee, Jail Surcharge Fee, Penalty Surcharge, Court
25	Support, and more, resulting in total fines and fees of approximately \$484; and

27	WHEREAS, in April 2020, the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) released a
28	report, "A Tale of Two Countries: Racially Targeted Arrests in the Era of Marijuana
29 30	Reform," found that Black people are 3.64 times more likely than white people to be arrested for marijuana possession, despite similar usage rates; and
31	arrested for manifularia possession, despite similar usage rates, and
32	WHEREAS, the report also found that Black people were still more likely to be
33	arrested for possession than white people in states that had legalized or decriminalized
34	marijuana possession; and
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36	WHEREAS, the Wisconsin chapter of the ACLU found that Black Wisconsinites
37	were 4.2 times more likely to be arrested for marijuana possession than white
38	Wisconsinites and that Wisconsin ranks 14th in the country for largest racial disparities
39	in marijuana possession arrests; and
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41	WHEREAS, Wisconsin was one of 17 states that saw an increase in marijuana
42	possession arrests from 2010 to 2018 despite an increasing shift in attitudes towards
43	decriminalization and legalization of marijuana; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin's marijuana laws are less progressive than its neighboring states, including Michigan and Illinois which have both legalized marijuana use for adults and Minnesota which has a medical marijuana program; and

WHEREAS, the Marijuana Policy Project reported that Wisconsin is only one of 19 states that imposes jail time on simple marijuana possession (Wis. Stat. §§ 961.41(3g) and 961.495) and only one of 14 states that do not have compassionate medical cannabis laws; and

WHEREAS, Section 24.01 of the MCGO is reserved for violations of twenty-five (25) grams or less of marijuana; law enforcement is still able to issue State citations, if needed, for possession of larger amounts of marijuana; and

WHEREAS, in 2019, **187 257** citations were issued for marijuana possession in Milwaukee County, some of which were dismissed or changed to a lesser citation, such as littering; and

WHEREAS, some individuals may not be able to afford the fine and fees associated with a marijuana possession citation, which may result in their case being sent to collections or an increased charge, which is less likely to be collected by Milwaukee County and can affect an individual's financial situation, including their credit score; and

WHEREAS, the mission of Milwaukee County is to become the healthiest county in Wisconsin through the achievement of racial equity; and

WHEREAS, in achieving racial equity, disparities in the criminal justice system, including marijuana and paraphernalia possession laws must be eradicated; and

WHEREAS, the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors encourages revision of rules and ordinances that place unfair harm on Milwaukee County's people of color; and

WHEREAS, the Committee on Judiciary, Safety, and General Services, at its meeting of March 11, 2021, recommended adoption of File No. 21-208 as amended (vote 4-1); now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, that Milwaukee County supports the achievement of racial equity through the reduction of marijuana possession and possession and delivery of drug paraphernalia fines to no more than one dollar; and

BE IT FUTHER RESOLVED, that the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors hereby amends Chapter 24.02 of the Milwaukee County Code of General Ordinances by adoption of the following:
