Calling upon the United States Federal Government to normalize diplomatic and economic relations with the Republic of Cuba

A RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, while the United States of America now maintains diplomatic relations with the Republic of Cuba, the United States government has maintained an economic embargo against Cuba since the Cuban Revolution overthrew the dictatorial regime of Fulgencio Batista, which bans almost all trade with Cuba from American businesses, foreign businesses in the United States, and Americans in general; and

WHEREAS, the United States Government Accountability Office wrote in November 2007 (GAO-08-80), "The stated purpose of this embargo – the most comprehensive set of U.S. economic sanctions on any country – is to weaken the Castro regime by denying it hard currency."; and according to the United States Department of State, the embargo is presently maintained in statutes from the:

- Sections 5 and 16 of the Trading with the Enemy Act of 1917
- Foreign Assistance Act of 1961
- Cuban Democracy Act of 1992
- Cuban Liberty and Democratic Solidarity Act of 1996
- Trade Sanctions and Export Enhancement Act of 2000

; and

WHEREAS, the United Nations General Assembly every year from 1992 to 2019 (A/Res/74/7), almost unanimously issued resolutions on the "Necessity of ending the economic, commercial and financial embargo imposed by the United States of America against Cuba" by among other things, "Reaffirming, among other principles, the sovereign equality of States, non-intervention and non-interference in their internal affairs and freedom of international trade and navigation, which are also enshrined in many international legal instruments"; and

WHEREAS, the October 2, 2017 *Georgetown Journal of International Affairs* article titled, "Doing More with Less: Lessons from Cuba's Healthcare System," found the "United States' high healthcare costs do not yield corresponding health outcomes for its citizens. Conversely, Cuba, with less than a tenth of U.S. expenditures, has

attained comparable outcomes on many indicators, particularly life expectancy and infant mortality"; and

WHEREAS, February 9, 2019 *Berkeley Political Review* article titled, "Cuba's Healthcare System: A Political, Social, and Economic Revolution," argued, "The common expectancy when it comes to socialist or government-controlled forms of health care is that the country is unlikely to produce innovations and advancements in the medical field. However, not only as the health care system in Cuba introduced significant innovations to the world, but it has also financed the [Cuban] national economy as well"; and

WHEREAS, Milwaukee County and Wisconsin are home to several prestigious medical institutions which could play a role in fostering collaborative medical research and treatment for the benefit of humanity, via cooperation with Cuban medical professionals with a change in United States foreign policy; and

WHEREAS, the City of Madison has a sister-city friendship with Camagüey, Cuba and in 2019 called for a resumption of a policy of engagement between the United States and Cuba in RES-19-00793 (Madison File No. 58362); and

WHEREAS, United States policy to overthrow the Castro Regime has failed and the current US policy works against American interests, hinders commerce and medical research, and is a violation of Cuban sovereignty; and

WHEREAS, the Committee on Intergovernmental Relations, at its meeting of April 14, 2021, recommended adoption of File No. 21-330 (vote 4-1); now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors hereby urges the United States Congress and President Biden to normalize diplomatic and economic relations between the United States of America and the Republic of Cuba, terminate all restrictive legislation toward Cuba, and end all special restrictions on the right of Americans to travel to and trade with Cuba; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, should this policy come to pass, the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors encourages those who work directly or academically in the healthcare fields in Milwaukee County and Wisconsin to collaborate with their Cuban peers to exchange healthcare successes, particularly in reducing infant mortality and amputations stemming from diabetes; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors 81 hereby requests the County Clerk provide this resolution to the President of the United 82 83 States, United States Secretary of State, and the Wisconsin Congressional Delegation. 84 85 86 87

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
