12	WHEREAS, the May 25, 2020 murder of George Floyd has reignited the national
13	conversation on race, poverty, and inequality; and Wisconsin Counties, as arms of the
14	State of Wisconsin, fulfill many vital State-mandated services and are on the frontlines
15	in addressing the social ills facing many Wisconsinites; and
16	
17	WHEREAS, the Pew Research Center's "Race in America 2019" report
18	uncovered the following statistics regarding racial bias in the United States:

20	 Approximately 65 percent of Blacks "say someone has acted suspicious of them
21	or as if they weren't smart" compared with 37 percent of Latinos, 34 percent of
22	Asians, and 25 percent of Whites
23	Approximately 78 percent of Blacks, "say we haven't gone far enough in giving
24	blacks equal rights with whites" compared with 37 percent of Whites agreeing
25	Approximately 64 percent of Blacks are pessimistic toward the notion "we will
26	eventually achieve equality"

29 30	WHEREAS, in 2018, in the University of Wisconsin – Madison "Supplement to
31	the 2016 Wisconsin Poverty Report", university researchers found:

33	 Using the Wisconsin Poverty Measure, in 2016 30.3 percent of Blacks and 18.5
34	percent of Latinos and other minorities lived in poverty compared to 10 percent of

38	"These data suggest that improving economic and social outcomes for

; and there is a well-established common understanding of the correlation between poverty, crime, and social achievement; and

WHEREAS, the Wisconsin Superintendent of Public Instruction issued a press release on October 30, 2019 relating to Wisconsin's 2019 National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP), noting, "Wisconsin's scores reflected a wider gap between the performance of black and white students than any other state or jurisdiction except one, the District of Columbia."; and

WHEREAS, Milwaukee County has worked toward addressing the societal ill of racial inequality by:

- Creating the Office of African American Affairs in April 2017 (File No. 16-726)
- Declaring racism a public health crisis in April 2019 (File No. 19-397)
- Prioritizing federal Community Development Block Grant dollars toward projects which improve local community and economic development rather than routine public works maintenance in April 2019 (File No.19-153)
- Co-creating the Milwaukee City-County Joint Taskforce on Climate and Economic Equity in July 2019 (File No. 19-582)
- Creating Chapter 108 Achieving Racial Equity and Health in the Milwaukee County Code of General Ordinances in April 2020 (File No. 20-174)

WHEREAS, the Wisconsin Counties Association Board of Directors unanimously passed the Milwaukee County resolution in File No. 20-576 which called upon the State of Wisconsin and Wisconsin counties to address systemic racism and inequality on December 11, 2020; and

WHEREAS, the Reverend Doctor Martin Luther King Jr. once said at the 1963 March on Washington, "We are now faced with the fact that tomorrow is today. We are, confronted with the fierce urgency of now. In this unfolding conundrum of life and history, there 'is' such a thing as being too late. There is no time for apathy or complacency. This is a time for vigorous and positive action", and

WHEREAS, the Committee on Finance, at its meeting of June 17, 2021, recommended adoption of File No. 21-548 (vote 7-0); now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, Milwaukee County calls upon the State of Wisconsin and all Wisconsin counties to seize the moment to constructively work toward positive change against systemic racism and inequality through the creation and implementation of constructive policies addressing inequality; and

 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, Office of Government Affairs staff are authorized and directed to provide this resolution to the Wisconsin Counties Association for consideration in its 2021 Legislative Platform.
