## A RESOLUTION

requesting the creation of a pilot reentry program that provides incarceration and postincarceration support for individuals returning to the community and requesting the Milwaukee County House of Correction working in conjunction with the Milwaukee County Department of Health and Human Services, the Behavioral Health Division, and the Office of the Sheriff to develop a pilot reentry program that assists individuals postincarceration with navigating housing resources, economic resources, mental health services, and trusted community members to prepare them to successfully reenter the community, maintain productivity, and become less likely to reoffend

WHEREAS, the Milwaukee County House of Correction (HOC) is a low security detention facility operated by the County and authorized to house up to 1,766 individuals with sentences of 12 months or less; and

WHEREAS, the HOC operates a Reentry program in partnership with Employ Milwaukee and the Benedict Center's Women's Reentry Program; Employ Milwaukee assists with career planning, job readiness, skills planning, and an employment action plan and the Benedict Center assists women with cognitive behavioral therapy, trauma coping, nurturing, parenting, employment assistance, violence prevention and more; and

WHEREAS, the Milwaukee County Office of the Sheriff, Detention Services Bureau is responsible for operating and maintaining safety in the jail; and

WHEREAS, the jail is authorized to house up to 960 individuals and most individuals housed at the jail are awaiting trial or transfer to other correctional facilities; and

WHEREAS, the Milwaukee County Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) provides an array of services such as housing assistance, youth justice reforms, disability services, and behavioral health services; and

WHEREAS, the Behavioral Health Division Adult Services Unit has a Community Access to Recovery Services (CART) program for individuals ages 18 and older that provides prevention services, case management, treatment, and recovery support; and

WHEREAS, the Wisconsin Department of Corrections (DOC) operates a robust reentry unit that partners with the Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) to assist individuals with completing a pre-release Medicaid application; and

WHEREAS, the DOC assists disabled individuals with obtaining federal and state benefits to maintain economic security and the Opening Avenues for Reentry Success program managed by DHS assists individuals with mental illnesses gain self-sufficiency upon returning to the community; and

WHEREAS, the Reentry Unit of the DOC has been successful as recidivism continues to trend downward across all genders and age groups since 2000, according to the Wisconsin Recidivism Data Dashboard; and

WHEREAS, recidivism, as defined and tracked by the DOC, is committing a criminal offense that results in a new conviction and sentenced to confinement at a DOC facility or supervision by DOC; and

WHEREAS, the American Psychological Association noted that it is essential for reentry preparation to begin on day one of incarceration as individuals released from incarceration often face difficulty securing housing, employment, and often don't qualify for public assistance due to the nature of their conviction(s); and

WHEREAS, strict housing policies can make it difficult for an individual released from custody to secure public housing assistance as individuals convicted of certain crimes are ineligible for public housing; and

WHEREAS, obtaining employment can be a challenge for individuals postincarceration as some employers are often reluctant to hire an individual due to their lack of employment, lack of skill, and limited education, this often results in individuals working low skill and low wage jobs; and

WHEREAS, individuals seeking food share benefits in the State of Wisconsin must disclose if they have been convicted of a felony drug offense in the past five years and if they have been convicted they are subject to a drug test in order to receive benefits; and

WHEREAS, according to the DOC more than 95 percent of individuals under the custody of the DOC will return to their community and individuals housed at the HOC will return to their community within a year; and

WHEREAS, the HOC could redefine its reentry program to include partnering with the Milwaukee County Department of Health and Human Services and Behavioral Health Division to begin the process of preparing individuals to return to their community on day one of admission into the facility and at least one year and six months postincarceration; and

WHEREAS, including the Office of the Sheriff on this endeavor could further provide helpful insight and recommendations for potential services that both facilities could provide to prepare individuals being released into the community; and

WHEREAS, the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors adopted File No. 20742 to enter into a contract for Credible Messengers, people with relevant life experiences that mentor and guide youth transitioning back into the community after being involved with the justice system; and

WHEREAS, Credible Messengers support youth transitioning back into the community, and a similar model could be implemented for adults involved in the criminal justice system on day one of incarceration; and

WHEREAS, trusted community members that relate to those incarcerated would take on a mentorship role and guide those individuals towards making positive decisions and avoid recidivism; and

WHEREAS, those community members would also be required to participate in a mentorship training to ensure they are prepared to fulfill the duties of the role; and

WHEREAS, preparing individuals to return to their community on day one of admission and with a team that includes trusted community members to advocate for the individual, case managers to assist with housing and economic services, access to mental health services, and support groups will help the individual overcome challenges and avoid recidivism; and

WHEREAS, redeploying resources to support individuals incarcerated and postincarceration will help them become more productive, make them less likely to reoffend, make their communities safer, and strengthen their family; and

WHEREAS, the Committee on Health Equity, Human Needs and Strategic Planning, at its meeting of September 15, 2021, recommended adoption of File No. 21-859 (vote 4-0); now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors supports a pilot reentry program that supports individuals while incarcerated and for a period postincarceration to aid in the successful return to their community; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Milwaukee County House of Correction is authorized and directed to work in collaboration with the Milwaukee County Department of Health and Human Services, the Behavioral Health Division, and the Office of the Sheriff to develop a pilot reentry program that assists individuals returning to the community with accessing housing resources, economic resources, mental health services and trusted community members to prepare them to successfully reenter the community, maintain productivity, and become less likely to reoffend; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the House of Correction shall provide a written report to the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors during the December 2021 committee meeting cycle that includes criteria for admission to the pilot program, collaboration options with the Department of Health and Human Services, the Behavioral Health Division and the Office of the Sheriff, cost, and a projected timeline to implement the program.
