Subject: Report from the Milwaukee Public Museum

Results for the 11 month period ended July 31, 2021

The Mission of the Milwaukee Public Museum is to inspire curiosity, excite minds and increase desire to preserve and protect our world's natural and cultural diversity through exhibitions, educational programs, collections and research.

#### **Current State of the Museum during the Pandemic**

The Museum remained open to the public from Thursday's through Sunday's from 10AM – 5PM since its March reopen date. All exhibits and operations are now open but the café/coffee kiosk remain closed. We plan to add another day of operation (Monday) starting mid-October and we hope that the café and coffee kiosk will open then. We continue to operate in the safest possible way – requiring masks of all staff and visitors as well as social distancing. We also continue to have enhanced cleaning.

Overall, our day to day numbers are well below the last "normal" year but our attendance met or exceeded our projected expectations for the year. Attendance was projected at 97,000 for the year and we had 93,000 for the 9 months we were open. We also exceeded our attendance revenue by about \$200,000 because of the mix of paying vs member visitors as well as a small increase in price during the run of the Mandela exhibit. MPM hosted *Mandela: The Official Exhibition*, an exhibit about one of the greatest freedom fighters of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century, for its US Premier. This exhibit closed on August 1<sup>st</sup> and met our expectations. We had over 23,000 people attend in person and hosted virtual tours for more than 6,000 MPS students. We also partner with 23 black-owned/run businesses and organizations in the community. We partnered with America's Black Holocaust Museum to present this exhibit and brought together a community council to guide us with programming and outreach.

We continued to utilizing social media and other web-based platforms for programming and worked directly with public school teachers and parents to make the best possible efforts to continue its primary mission and deliver on its commitment to serve the County and its citizens.

Requests for collection data, information and photos are at high levels with staff responding to over 200 external requests. The museum is now open to external researchers however we control how many can come in at any one time. Collection work, digitization and grant tasks continue.

MPM has worked diligently to control operating expenses and to maintain cash. We have been as efficient as possible during the pandemic to preserve cash flow.

#### **Fiscal Summary**

For the eleven months ended July 31, 2021 MPM consolidated financial statements report an operating surplus of \$900,000 compared to \$1 million in the prior year and \$1.2 million in FY2019 – pre-pandemic year. Overall, the change in net assets was an increase of \$2.5 million vs. a \$400,000 decrease in the prior year and \$200,000 decrease in FY2019.

Consolidated operating revenue was \$8.7 million vs. \$10.1 million in the prior year and \$12.2 million in FY2019. This decline is mainly due to the continued COVID-19 impact as MPM partially opened with limited capacities throughout FY2021. To offset this lower operating revenue, overall releases from restrictions were higher than the prior year by \$800,000.

Consolidated operating expenditures for the year were \$7.8 million vs. \$9.1 million in the prior year and \$11.1 million in FY2019. All operating expenses were lower due to MPM being partially closed from the lingering effects of COVID-19.

In other non-operating activity, MPM and the Endowment investments reported market gains of \$1.2 million. MPM received \$2.8 million in governmental stimulus to help offset declined revenues and cover operating expenses. For the FY2021, distribution from the MPM Endowment Fund totaled \$50,000, a historically comparable figure to prior years. MPM continues to have to a fiscally conservative course of significantly reduced reliance on MPM Endowment earnings than in the decade prior.

### Capital Investment Summary County Funded Capital Projects

Major County funded projects that are currently in process or will hopefully be in process soon at the Museum include:

- Fire panel/fire safety system replacement not yet scheduled.
- Repair dome theater roof the roof is completed. Repair to interior walls damaged as a result of leaking during repair work is yet to be completed.
- 1<sup>st</sup> floor stairwell/bathroom issues ongoing.

#### **MPM Federally Funded Projects**

Collection Manager Julia Colby submitted a grant proposal to the National Science Foundation for \$996,000 to care for the amphibian and reptile collections and ready them for a move.

Dr. Jennifer Zaspel, VP/Academic Dean continued working on the \$4.3 million grant from the National Science Foundation (NSF). This project is a national effort to digitize more than 1.3 million arthropod specimens, including parasites like fleas, ticks and mosquitoes, to develop a nationwide database of historical records. She successfully completed deliverables on this grant and a second.

Ms. Patty Burke is well into the 4<sup>th</sup> year of an Institute of Museum and Library Services grant to digitize and organize the collection of Ordovician fossils in the Museum (\$362,887).

#### Reaccreditation

As part of the reaccreditation process, MPM had a number of items necessary to show the progress to ensure we would be accredited next year after being tabled for one year. One part of that is the state and county showing the financial support to allow us to start the capital campaign for the new museum. This is a necessity as the accrediting body has concluded, as has MPM, that long term sustainability in the current building is not possible.

A second part was to develop a bridge plan to ensure those collections at the most risk to damage from building conditions are appropriately cared for while we remain in the building. With funding secured from the county for materials and supplies and MPM's commitment to hire staff, the bridge plan is underway. Phase 1 was completed – hanging plastic sheeting over all open shelving. Phase 2 has begun – doing a complete inventory of the most vulnerable collections in preparation for Phase 3. Phase 3 will begin early next year – packing the most vulnerable collections to protect them and ready them for a move.

MPM submitted an interim report to the Accreditation Commission in August and is required to submit a final report in February. A decision on whether to accredit the museum will happen after that.
