V. South Shore Equity in Recovery Project - Collaborative Health Group

Three health departments started project in spring 2022 Purpose of project is to assess community risks, needs, priorities, strengths, and opportunities for public health. The team reviewed the background of the start of the project. The methods used for data included focus groups and semi-structured interviews. The group reported their key survey findings. These topics included Top Reported Impacts of COVID-19, Top Priorities for Health of our Communities, and Top Strengths of our Communities. There were 5 key themes in the Key Qualitative Findings. Lost in Translation, Not Meeting Basic Needs, Trouble Accessing Services, New Areas of Exploration, and Failing to Address Equity. The group hosted events called Out Community, Our Voice, Data Walks and Participatory Mapping. Next steps include developing communications for various stakeholders, implementing the communication strategy and collaborative and municipality specific action planning. The presentation is attached to the meeting minutes.

VI. Catalis Software Implementation Updated – Catalis/Milwaukee County

Treasurer Cullen and Matt Johnson from Milwaukee County provided updates on the Catalis implementation since the February ICC meeting. To improve communications and coordination they have held two calls with Gobernance Committee, developed key dates and milestones, confirmed list of issues, and working on in progress items. The County reviewed the key dates and milestones status detailing the second, third and final settlement planned activities.

Additionally in the report was a breakdown of all Countywide issues. Catalis has expanded the support hours to 7:00 am - 6:00 pm CT.

VII. Milwaukee County State Park and Ride Discussion

Alec Knutson provided an update from Milwaukee County. Two weeks ago, County attended a meeting held by WISDOT, which included the Housing Department, DA, the Sheriff, MPD and MCDOT. There is a high emphasis that there is a housing plan for the individuals housed at the College and Holt Park and Ride. WISDOT is in the process of creating a plan to address the unique challenges that exist with housing all individuals. President Besson inquired if the County had any knowledge about the



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State wanting to use the Park and Rides for storage, they did not. Mayor Bukiewicz thanked the County for passing information along and their cooperation.





KEY QUALITATIVE FINDINGS - 5 KEY THEMES

Lost in Translation

People in our community identified gaps in communications as it relates to services, programs, and resources including:

- Language barriers
- Low awareness and access
- Lack of trust in media coverage

Not Meeting Basic Needs

People in our community expressed difficulty in meeting their basic needs including:

- Affordable housing
- Food insecurity
- Mental health services
- Recreation
- Safety
- Struggling with social connection.

KEY QUALITATIVE FINDINGS (CONTINUED)

Trouble Accessing Services

People in our community identified various barriers when attempting to access resources and services including:

- Transportation
- Technology
- Mobility
- Paperwork/forms
- Closing/relocation of resources
- Financial barriers
- Time as a barrier
- Access to health care services

New Areas of Exploration

People in our community have the ideas to address community needs and improve engagement including:

- Dental services for low-income
- Teen health programs
- More services for seniors services
- Programs for new moms including peer support groups & breastfeeding courses
- Free healthy cooking classes

KEY QUALITATIVE FINDINGS (CONTINUED)

Failing to Address Equity


Many people shared experiences of discrimination, racism, stigma, and lack of cultural inclusivity at the interpersonal and institutional levels.

- P I don't know anyone who looks like me here. When I first moved here, that was something I worried about. What happens if my neighbors have an issue with me being Black, because I've been the only Black person in the neighborhood before and it's really uncomfortable.
 - ee It's, it's a very powerless feeling to be ignored or mistreated and misdiagnosed by your caregivers.
- He looks very visibly Mexican, darker skin, dark hair, everything.

 He was walking with our young daughters in our neighborhood ...

 three police cars swarmed him, blocked him and my two
 daughters, searched him because he fit a description of
 someone that had been breaking into cars in the area. And my
 children, it affected them. And to have young children like that
 growing up afraid of the police because of their skin color. I just
 think that is, that makes me so sick to my stomach as a mother.







DATA WALKS & PARTICIPATORY MAPPING
